### Housekeeping

### Mowing

The mowers are provided to help members keep their plots tidy. It's important that they are kept in good condition and they should only be used for mowing grassed areas and should **NEVER** be used on growing areas. The mowers are one of the main items of expenditure for the Committee and keeping them in good conditions is in everyone's interest. If we have to constantly spend money on replacing mowers, then there is less money to spend on other member benefits.

Think of them as your own mowers - if you wouldn't treat them like that at home, then you shouldn't at the allotment either!

### **Padlock combination**

It's important to ensure that the padlock combination is kept secure. So, the basic principle is:

If you are the first person to open the gate or the last to leave, ensure that you don't leave the padlock with the combination showing. If you open the padlock, change the combination. If you close the padlock, change it once you've locked the gate.

### Shed opening hours

Just a reminder that the shed opening hours are Sundays from 11.00am to 12.30pm, from the end of February to the end of September.

## How big is a plot?

# Every year, you receive an invoice for your plot, calculated as an amount per pole. But how many of us actually know what a pole is?

Allotments are traditionally measured in rods or poles (they're the same thing), which is an old Anglo-Saxon unit named because it was the length of the rod used to control a team of eight oxen, which was about 5.5 yards in length. A pole has now come to mean an area rather than length and is a measure of area equal to 5.5 yards by 5.5 yards, or 30.25 square yards. Most of the plots on the Digswell and Broadwater sites are 5 and 7 pole plots, and so are about 150 square yards or 212 square yards respectively.
