Carmine Jewel:

- Ripens before other dwarf cherries
- Rich color that goes through all the fruit
- High balance of sugars & complement of acids
- Up to 30 lbs. of fruit per plant
- Hardy to -40 degrees F



- Can't wait for cherry season? Carmine Jewel ripens before other dwarf cherries, so you can enjoy full-sized, purplish-red fruits sooner. Fruits have a high balance of sugars and a complement of acids, creating a rich flavor—and the rich, dark color goes through the entire fruit, giving maximum color to juice, ice cream and other recipes. Its firm flesh lends itself to making dried fruit. Carmine Jewel is a heavy yielder, loading up with 15+ lbs. by its fourth year, and 20-30 lbs. in its fifth year. Growing to only 6 1/2 ft. tall, this is a naturally dwarfed bush is easier to maintain than typical cherries. Extreme cold hardiness and few

problems from disease and pests make this beauty a breeze to grow and harvest. Self-pollinating. Hardy to -40 degrees Fahrenheit. Zones 3-8.

Juliet:



- Rich, complex balance of sugars and acids
- Large, deep-red fruits
- Yields up to 25 lbs. of fruits
- Grows just 5-8 ft. tall
- Hardy to -40 degrees F
- Our sweetest, tastiest bush cherry yet.

Flavor sensation! Juliet can obtain up to a 20-brix sugar level (higher than sweet cherries) with a delightful complement of acidity, making for a rich, complex flavor.

Large, attractive fruits. Deep-red cherries are our favorite for eating fresh, but are delicious when used for baking, jams and ice cream, and freeze beautifully. Yields up to 25 lbs. of fruits.

Easy to manage. Growing just 5-to 8- ft. tall, Juliet is a breeze to care for and harvest, and easy to fit into the landscape or large containers.

Ideal for edible landscape. Abundant, white flowers, glossy green foliage and attractive bush habit allow it to double as an ornamental. Self-pollinating. Hardy to -40 degrees Fahrenheit. Zones 2-7.

Romeo:

- Full-sized, deep crimson fruits
- Incredible sugar levels for a tart cherry type
- Up to 25 lbs. of fruit per plant
- High flesh-to-pit ratio
- Hardy to -40 degrees F
- Grows 5-8 ft. tall
- Newly available in the US. Larger, sweeter, and juicier than Carmine Jewel but with the same great plant

Yields up to 25 pounds of fruit per plant, providing plenty for baking, canning, wine making, and, of course, fresh eating. Self-pollinating. Hardy to -40 degrees Fahrenheit. Zones 2-7.
