This afternoon Martha & I spent some time at Jerry's Heavenly Home, a facility dedicated to providing dignified support to seniors in the last days of their time on earth. The visit was the result of an invitation from the facility to provide a "Final Salute" to a veteran resident there.

Lieutenant Colonel B. Lewis Avera, Jr., USMC, Retired served two tours in Vietnam; the first in 1963, supporting operations at numerous outposts. The second in 1970. His DD214 outlines a list of awards, including a Bronze Star and a Marine Corps Commendation Medal, both with "V" devices. The moment was originally organized by Lisa Moncur, of our Auxiliary, and was meant to allow more veterans to show their respect, but Col. Avera has taken a turn for the worse and the larger event had to be cancelled.

It was an honor to be asked to represent the local veteran community in expressing our appreciation for Col. Avera’s service. The only other people present were his wife and daughter. I was also asked to present a Certificate of Appreciation from the Orange County Board of Supervisors.

Tomorrow Comrade Al Hicks will be honoring a veteran at his 100th birthday celebration.

**Remembering Those Who Serve:** During the holiday season, as we gather with loved ones, we need to be reminded of the extraordinary gift given to us by those who serve the gift of freedom, safety and peace. Americans are able to celebrate the holidays at home because of the contributions of millions of service members throughout our history who have given of themselves so that our country can be free.



One such Army Nurse and POW shared some feelings about Christmas in confinement at the Santo Tomas prison camp in the Philippines. **Major Josephine Nesbit Davis**, faced the season stripped of nearly everything that once gave it comfort or ceremony. Like other U.S. Army nurses held there after the fall of the Philippines, she endured hunger that gnawed constantly, made sharper by memories of holiday meals back home. The internees' rations were meager and unreliable, and the winter months unhospitable. Christmas Day arrived without decorations, music, or gifts, marked instead by roll calls, uncertainty, and the quiet ache of separation from family an ocean away. On their first Christmas in captivity, Josie reminded the group, "Prisoners or not we are much better off than last year when the Japanese were dropping bombs on us." For Davis, the holiday underscored the loss of freedom and the cruel irony of celebrating peace while confined by war.

Army nurses were ordered from Manila to Bataan at the end of December 1941. Most of the nurses thought they would be assigned to a hospital, but soon figured out they were the about to become the first group of American military nurses sent onto the battlefield for duty. There they tended wounded soldiers in outdoor hospitals under battlefield conditions. The hospital where they were assigned, was a "jungle hospital."

Davis was second in command of the Army Nurse Corps in the Philippines during WWII. After the attack on Pearl Harbor, Japanese troops rapidly advanced through the Philippines, overwhelming American and Filipino defenses. She stayed to care for the wounded and sick until capture was unavoidable. She was evacuated to Corregidor in April 1942 but captured by the Japanese the next month, sharing the fate of hundreds of other Army nurses who endured years of internment until liberation in 1945. She retired from the military in 1946 with numerous awards, including a Bronze Star, as a major with 28 years of service. She lived to the age of 99 in Alameda County, CA.
