## **COMMANDER'S CORNER**

March is the national salute to women month. What better way than to showcase nine famous women veterans who served in the military?

## 9 FAMOUS FEMALE VETERANS WHO NOT ONLY SERVED BUT MADE HISTORY. By Syrena Felty

Bea Arthur: Arthur was one of the first members of the Marine Corps Women's Reserve. Before she was a Golden Girl, Dorothy was a Marine. She served as a typist and a truck driver. She was honorably discharged in 1945 and earned the rank of Staff Sergeant.

**Harriet Tubman:** Tubman was a military leader and as a Union Army spy led a group of Soldiers to free slaves in South Carolina in 1863. This made Tubman the first female *and* the first *black* female Veteran. Tubman also served as a recruiter for the Union Army.

**Grace Murray Hopper** is one of the notable female veterans on our list. She joined the Navy during World War II, was promoted to lieutenant in 1944, and contributed to the Harvard Mark I computer project. Her military career continued to progress, leading her to achieve the rank of Rear Admiral.

**Gal Gadot:** Yes, Wonder Woman herself enlisted in the IDF. Before wielding the Lasso of Truth on the big screen, Gal Gadot served two years in the Israel Defense Forces as a physical fitness specialist at the age of 20.

**Eileen Collins:** Collins was one of the first female Air Force and space pilots. In addition to being NASA's first female shuttle commander, she was also the Air Force's first female flight instructor. She was among the first four women to undergo pilot training in 1978. In TIME magazine, she wrote, "The Air Force was testing whether women could succeed as military pilots. My philosophy was to be the best pilot I could be."

**Amelia Earhart:** Although she wasn't a military Veteran herself, she is known as one of the earlier women to appear on the aviation scene. Her work was crucial to the advancement of women in the military, inspiring women to serve their country.

**Sarah Emma Edmonds:** In 1861, Edmonds fled her home to escape an arranged marriage. She adopted the identity of Franklin Thompson and joined the Union Army's 2nd Michigan Infantry as a male nurse. She later worked as a courier, mail carrier, and spy behind Confederate lines. In 1863, she contracted malaria and feared that her true identity would be discovered. Consequently, she decided to desert rather than risk exposure, and as a result, she could not claim the pension or recognition that other Union veterans received.

**Queen Elizabeth:** During World War II, Queen Elizabeth served as a truck driver. At the age of 18, she persuaded her father to allow her to contribute during the war. She joined the Women's Auxiliary Territorial Service in England. Not only did she drive military trucks, but she also trained as a mechanic.

**Jenifer Marshall**, better known as Susan Hargrove, served in the U.S. Navy from ages 17 to 22. During her time there, she worked as a forklift operator, aircraft handler, and logistics specialist. Additionally, she contributed to the USS Theodore Roosevelt Sexual Assault Victim Intervention Program.

Tops on **MY** list of famous women remain unnamed, yet they serve in extremely hazardous conditions. These women are the spouses, significant others, or mothers of servicemen who have returned from combat duty damaged. Most veterans are not physically affected, but nearly all suffer mentally. They have stayed up nights, worrying as the nightmares struck, holding hands and offering soothing words to calm the veterans down. It has taken a toll on many, yet many more have persisted, caring for the veterans who have given so much. These brave women have endured the horrors of war, witnessed the damage firsthand, and remained ever faithful. They have suffered in silence; still, to this day, they have very few support groups. They endure PTSD alongside their spouses, yet very little is said or acknowledged. These courageous women faced this ordeal alone, yet they have done more for our veterans than anyone can imagine. <u>The Hello Girls:</u> Recent legislation on Dec. 26, 2024-The Hello Girls Congressional Gold Medal Act - finally awards the Congressional Gold Medal to more than 220 American women who served as essential telephone operators with the U.S. Army Signal Corps during World War I. While it is honorable that this has finally happened, the award now is be presented to their *grandchildren*.



medical positions in the U.S. Army and be officially deployed to a combat zone.

With telecommunication in battle still relatively new at the time, General Pershing was looking for experienced individuals that could improve communication on the front lines. As the telephone operator field was dominated by women, General Pershing made the decision to form the specialized unit comprised solely of women for the first time. It was required that the women be bilingual in both French and English so that they could effectively communicate and coordinate with French and American forces. By the end of the war, the Hello Girls had connected over 26 million calls in support of the war effort, and even continued to serve in Europe to organize the return of American forces following the armistice. These women were acknowledged by General Pershing for their exemplary service, only to be sent home and dismissed by the government, prompting a 60 year fight before benefits were awarded in 1977 and many more decades for this recognition.
