

<u>TAPS:</u> Sadly we must say a heartfelt adieu to our comrade and friend **Bruce Hunt**.

Bruce was one the most dedicated individuals to helping Veterans that I ever met. He was always volunteering either for our Post, the American Legion, the Mission Viejo Marine & Sailors Adoption Committee, Wounded Warriors, or for multiple charities for active duty Marines at Camp Pendleton and anyone else that needed his help.

A Marine himself, he enlisted when he was 17 and served in Korea and later in Japan attaining the rank of Sergeant. A rank that served him well in later years as he organized and took charge of all kinds of events for Veterans.

During his years as a Life Member of our Post, he served in several capacities including as a Trustee from 2016-2020. He was always first on the scene to help set up and serve at our VA Hospital BBQs and Pizza Parties. During our Buddy Poppy



campaigns on Memorial Day and Veterans Day he stationed himself in front of the local Albertsons store all day long for 3 or 4 days until his health would no longer permit it. Even now, when our members sit at that store, customers ask about Bruce.



After all of his years of helping others, Bruce finally did something for himself and went on the Honor Flight to Washington, DC in October 2019. He returned with lots of pictures and unforgettable memories.

He said his most cherished memory from his time in DC was at the Korean War Memorial. He was both honored and humbled as many Korean visitors bowed and thanked him profusely for whatever small part he had in making it possible for there to be a free Korea today.

Bruce's contagious smile, boisterous laugh, and gentle persona will be missed by all of our Post members who had the privilege of knowing him.



<u>How it all Began (briefly):</u> We all know the story Canadian doctor John McCrae and his poem, 'In Flanders Fields', which he wrote while serving during WWI in Ypres, Belgium in 1915. Poppies were a common sight on the Western Front since they flourished in the soil churned up by the fighting and shelling.

After his poem was published in Britain, other countries began adopting the red flower to honor veterans and the war dead. Artificial poppies were first sold in Britain in 1921 to raise money in support of ex-servicemen and the families of those who had died in the conflict. The

poppies were supplied by Anna Guérin, who had already been manufacturing the flowers in France to raise money for war orphans. Selling poppies proved so popular, in 1922, the British Legion founded a factory to produce the flowers themselves, staffed by disabled ex-servicemen, which continues today.

In the United States, the first organized sale of poppies took place in 1921 when the Franco-American Children's League sold poppies made by children in French orphanages for the benefit of children in the wardevastated areas of France and Belgium. Moina Belle Michael, an American working for the YMCA Overseas office, campaigned to make the poppy a <u>symbol of remembrance</u> of those who had died in the war. Her initiative gained momentum, spreading across the United States, Great Britain, France, Canada, Australia, and beyond, with donations raised through the sale of silk poppies.

Before Memorial Day in 1922, the VFW conducted their first poppy distribution, becoming the first veterans' organization to organize a nationwide distribution. The poppy soon was adopted as the official memorial flower of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States. In February 1924, the VFW registered the name <a href="Buddy Poppy">Buddy</a> Poppy with the U.S. Patent Office. A certificate was issued on May 20, 1924 granting the VFW all trademark rights under the classification of artificial flowers. VFW "Buddy"® Poppies would be assembled by disabled and needy veterans who would be paid for their work to provide them with financial assistance. The next year, disabled veterans at the Buddy Poppy factory in Pittsburgh, PA began assembling VFW Buddy Poppies.
