

The screening technicians have become a constant in the Mowbray Maternity Hospital wards. Their bright smiles, and even brighter scrubs are achieving coverage rates of over 100%. This is essential for a successful programme.

A screening programme does not only consist of screening the babies, but tracking those babies who require rescreening to ensure that those babies with hearing loss are identified and receive early intervention.

We are currently tracking those babies and there are 380 babies who still need rescreening.

The Screening Team

The screening and administration team have grown so much in 3 months. These women are an example of resilience. strength, perserverence and kindness. HOPE has had its fair share of challenges in these first few months and were it not for their unwaivering support and belief in the project, it would be difficult to get up morning and continue pushing ahead with our shared vision.


In May we screened our 3000th baby.

We also had our first external examiner assessment. The programme that these ladies are engaged with has been compiled by HOPE in conjunction with the University

of Cape Town's audiology department. Screening technicians offer a wonderful task shifting opportunity to improve access to screening by making it more affordable.

technician The screening training programme offers a standardised training programme guaranteeing that screeners are adequately trained. Overseeing audiologists will register with the Health Professions Council of South Africa to ensure accountability.

A Necessary struggle

Did you know that the most common birth anomaly is hearing loss? Without a universal newborn screening and early intervention programme, these children are only identified on average at 3 years old.

The language centre in our brains starts developing months before we are born. The critical period for language development is the first year of life. Children who do not receive language stimulation within that first year - are never able normal to acquire language. If, however, they receive intervention months old, it has been shown that they develop like their typical hearing peers.



The First Universal Newborn Hearing Screening Programme

HOPE-hear established the only universal newborn hearing screening programme at a public health facility at Mowbray Maternity Hospital on 1 February. We screened our 1000th patient in March (image above).

The goal is that this project serves as blueprint for universal screening at a regional, provincial, and eventually a national level.

born Babies at Mowbray Maternity Hospital are currently offered hearing sreening and early intervention according to best practise guidelines on par with the best centres in the World. This service is only available in the private sector at Netcare Hospitals and we hope that this will encourage the other hospital groups to prioritise universal newborn hearing screening.
