Our first morning in Houston, we joined Priscilla at the Rice Women's Faculty Book Club to discuss Sandy Tolan's "The Lemon Tree." Priscilla then drove us down the coast to the Inn at Fulton Harbor, where we spent 3 nights within short walking distance to the birding boat and nearby restaurants and watering holes.

In spite of predictions for rain and thunderstorms, we had marvelous weather the entire trip. In the morning we boarded the birding boat "Skimmer" at Fulton Harbor for a trip to the nearby marshes and shell islands to get our first views of the cranes - and dolphins, and much more numerous herons, hawks, pelicans, cormorants, ... Fascinating! These dramatic cranes are the tallest North American birds; they mate for life and migrate from their nesting spots in northern Canada as couples with one or two juveniles to this region of the Gulf of Mexico coast. We drove back up the Coast to Aransas National Wildlife Refuge [free with a National Parks' Golden Age Passport!], stopping as we saw a few crane families along the road. At the Refuge we saw more cranes, many other birds, deer and alligators - the latter a bit too close for comfort!
