## St. Patrick's Episcopal Day School DAY SCHOOL EARLY CHILDHOOD SCIENCE TEACHER MARTHA ESTROFF RECEIVES PRESIDENTIAL AWARD [Posted January 9, 2014]

President Obama named 102 mathematics and science teachers as PAEMST recipients representing all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and

Department of Defense schools throughout the world. The awards are made annually to outstanding Kindergarten to Grade 12 science and mathematics teachers selected by a panel of distinguished scientists, mathematicians, and educators following an initial selection process at the state level. Each year, the award alternates between teachers from Kindergarten to Grade 6 and teachers from Grade 7 to Grade 12.

In his letter to the state-level selection committee in support of Martha's nomination for the Presidential award, Head of School Peter A. Barrett wrote, "Martha Estroff is indeed a gift to the young people she teaches, to the colleagues with whom she works, to the broader learning community of which she is an essential part, and to the profession to which she has dedicated her life."

Winners of this Presidential honor receive a \$10,000 award from the National Science Foundation to be used at their discretion. Recipients will be honored at an awards ceremony later this year. "These teachers are inspiring today's young students to become the next generation of American scientists, mathematicians, and innovators," President Obama said in the statement released by the White House. "Through their passion and dedication, and by sharing their excitement about science, technology, engineering, and math, they are helping us build a promising future for all our children."

Martha has been teaching Nursery School and Lower School science classes at St. Patrick's since 2001. In 2011, she became the fourth recipient of the Day School's Love of Teaching Award in Honor of Mark Humphreys. In support of that recognition, one colleague wrote, "Martha has a connection to students and families that is evident throughout the day as children run to the science lab to share their latest discoveries. She always makes time to share this excitement with them, asking questions, giving her observations, and helping them with the next stepâ€"looking up a specimen in a guide book, giving students a container to bring living things back to the classroom, or offering to help them return their discoveries back outside. She always gives students a time to be heard and connect with her."

As another colleague wrote, "Children flock to Martha with ideas and 'treasures,' and she always enthusiastically listens to each one like they have just discovered a new species (the common ant) or unearthed a new scientific law (yes, gravity does make things fall!)." As another put it, "While she would never characterize herself as such, Martha glows with a patient wisdom that is so rare in the fast-paced world that we live in today. It is this patient wisdom that nurtures and fosters curiosity and confidence in her young . . . students as they embark along paths of inquiry in the classroom. Upon a student's discovery, no matter how big or small, Martha's excitement provides a springboard for continued discovery."








with our husbands and are eager to reconnect with other classmates. I'm attaching a photo of Gee Gee and me taken in my living room. (Submitted 4/15/14)

I have received a significant honor. Three of my large wall pieces--all abstracts--have been placed into the Permanent Collection of the Federal Reserve Board in Washington D.C.

I shall quote from the 2011 Acquisitions Catalog to give you a glimpse of why I am so excited and honored by the selection of my work....

Together, recent additions to the Federal Reserve Board's permanent collection offer a rich experience for employees and visitors alike. Yet, many people may not be familiar with the forces that moved photography from a purely technical 'craft' to an art form, nor with its concurrent and reciprocal influence on painting....

The Collection contains work by the early masters of photography---Stieglitz, K?sebier, Steichen, and Clarence White.

In response to hard economic times shared by so many Americans, photography during the 1930s took a turn into social documentary.

Photographers from this group in the Collection include Walker Evans, Jack Delano, Esther Bubley, Berenice Abbott and Aaron Siskind.

Other photographers featured in the Collection made their mark on American art and image-making generally. Many succeeded in the world of photojournalism... others applied their unique visual approaches to New York City.... In 1963, the sale of color film surpassed that of black-and-white film for the first time.

Increasingly artists used color photography to capture contemporary life. The Collections includes examples of works from Margaret Bourke-White, Alfred Eisenstaedt, Steve Alterman, Chan Chao, Larry Merrill, and Lee Friedlander among several others who created exemplary works.

Recent additions to the Board's Collection ... include well-known names alongside regional artists whose work is achieving wider recognition....


In the Federal Reserve's collection are examples of pure abstraction as well as realistic images. Abstract artists in the Collection include Ellsworth Kelly, James Hilleary, Barbara Takenaga and Beatriz Milhaze. There are also significant works by Adolph Gottlieb, Wayne Thiebaud, Alexander Calder and Robert Rauschenberg. The list of exemplary artists goes on and on. My breath stops when I consider that my work will be joining that esteemed group in the Permanent Collection.




# Suzanne Selby Grenager, author of "Bare Naked at the Reality Dance," invites you to visit her website, check out her wild & woolly blog, and be in touch!

### Joyce Davenport inducted into the U.S. Squash Hall of Fame.

We thank the Alumnae Office for informing us that Joyce was inducted on October 8, 2012 at the U.S. Open Squash Championships at Drexel. One of the highlights of our campus mini-reunion last October was a tour of the new athletic facilities. When we were shown the four Olympic standard squash courts, several classmates commented that we had a world class squash player in our class who had to get up early on Sunday mornings to go to Amherst to practice since there were no courts on our college campus at that time. That player was, of course, Joyce.

The lack of courts on campus did not deter Joyce. As The Daily Squash Report described: "Joyce Davenport began playing in the early 1960s under the tutelage of Cynwyd Club coach Norm Bramall. She won the national singles in 1965 and 1969. She won the national doubles in 1969, 79, 80, 81, 82, 87, 89, 90, 95 and the national mixed doubles in 1980, 81, 84, 89, 92, 93. She played number one on two Wolfe-Noel Cup teams. She has won more than thirty more national age group titles in singles and doubles."

The article from the Inquirer has a wonderful picture of Joyce at her induction. In addition to describing her many career accomplishments, the reporter writes that: "Joyce Davenport has enjoyed squash so much that she continues to compete in tournaments at the age of 70. ..... An all-around athlete, Davenport is a talented tennis player who competed in 1969 at Wimbledon and at the U.S. Open."

Mary Lee also attended the Friday evening J-Show performance, and provided this account of the evening: The show was opened with the cast, joined by the audience (Chapin Auditorium was about 1/4 to 1/3 full), singing the Alma Mater (words on the screen as an aid), and then closed with the singing of the Anti-Alma Mater ("O, Mt. Holyoke we pay thee tuition..."). The set piece was Camp MoHo -- MoHo being the current student nomenclature for the college. Students, i.e., the cast, sat around the campfire telling ghost stories, which were played out as skits or vignettes of less-than-loved aspects of MHC life. Mary Lyon and Emily Dickinson made appearances after having been roused from the grave either because of a toxic spill from the chemistry labs or the around-campus miasma of beer, box wine, and urine. Mary Lyon and Emily were not surprisingly befuddled by references to Facebook, YouTube and the like by the students.

"I've been a reproductive rights activist since I marched in the first demonstration for legal abortion in New York City in March 1970. Since then, I helped found two reproductive rights organizations in NYC, one in 1977 and one in 1989. Currently I volunteer with Haven; we provide dinner and a place to sleep for women and escorts who come from out of state for second-trimester abortions.



"In 1979 I could see that those who oppose legal abortion were getting more and more media attention - a la Jerry Falwell's so-called "Moral Majority" - so I decided to write a pro-choice novel. Why fiction? Because a story about conflict within a family can often illuminate a political issue better than dozens of essays. It took me 32 years, three drafts, and self-publication to accomplish that!

"Now I need to publicize my book, which is particularly timely given the prominence of reproductive rights in this election. And that's where you can help me. Rings and Roses Ceremony: The ring and rose ceremony is a special event held in the spring semester to acknowledge the 'half way mark' of a student's MHC career. Sophomores who ordered class rings receive them this night and the class celebrates each other with semi-formal presentations and a dessert reception. All Sophomores are invited to attend.

### **Impressions:**

I was surprised at how moving this simple ceremony turned out to be for me.

As I looked at and interacted with the Sophomores assembled in the large meeting room of Willets, I saw: great promise, youth, energy, and unjaded enthusiasm balanced against concerns about exams and projects to be completed before they really were at the halfway point of their Mount Holyoke experience, concerns for summer jobs/internships, and concerns for how to make successes of their lives after leaving college.

I was intrigued by how different the rings presented to the sophomores were from our 1964 rings. Instead of a stone, there was a seal embossed on the ring, and the rings were smaller and more delicate than ours. Mary Lee and I both had our 1964 rings, which the students seemed to think were lovely. I wondered when the change from stones to seals occurred. I went back to the Internet and found: a picture of the current ring and the history of Mount Holyoke jewelry, including the early Tiffany pin at: http://www.mtholyoke.edu/courses/rschwart/hatlas/traditions/jewelry.htm

When I talked with 2014ers about what they would like to get from us 1964ers, I frequently heard - we'd love to see pictures of and hear stories about your time on campus. They also wanted to hear how our lives evolved after leaving Mount Holyoke.

This got me thinking - what was the 50-year class when we were graduating? Yikes, it was 1914!! That was - at the start of World War I, before women got the right to vote, before so many things we take for granted ever existed. I wonder if the students looking back to 1964 sense as big a historical and cultural gap with our era.

I echo Mary Lee's comments and delight in the fact that many of the students of 2014 really do want to establish bonds with the women of our class, and that they are very willing to work with us to make it happen.

2014 students, as a group at the recent Rings and Roses ceremony and in individual conversations, were eager, enthusiastic, and vocal in their interest to have a 1964/2014 connection. At the Rings and Roses ceremony students spontaneously (and loudly) applauded when it was mentioned that three from the "grandmother" class were in attendance. Individually, they wanted to learn more about what Holyoke was like when we were there and what we did after graduation. In one poignant encounter, a student grabbed my hand and softly whispered that she wanted a "grandmother."

In small group conversations with international students, they spoke of their special needs for connecting with others as their own homes and families are so far away.

### Intro to 2014 Project from Mary Lee Warren

This will serve to introduce the so-called "grandmother/granddaughter project" that will activate a special relationship between the Class of 1964 and the Class of 2014.

This type of project, pioneered by the Class of 1960, pairs the graduating class with the 50th year reunion class. The project has taken different forms with successive classes and need not follow any particular design for our class. From recent visits to the campus, one astonishing sentiment is clear, namely, the MHC Class of 2014 is passionately enthusiastic about developing such a relationship with our Class.

This project can serve two purposes: i) offering opportunities for us to provide moral support and informal counsel to the students leading up to their graduation (and thereafter, if we/they choose); and ii) offering our class further means of connecting to the college. Individual participation in the project - on both sides - is intended to be purely voluntary and to be at whatever level, extent, or commitment as might feel appropriate at any time.

The 1964/2014 project is at a formative stage and all ideas, suggestions are solicited, but we need to begin forging means and methods of connecting sooner rather than later. Some examples of how 1964 might proceed include:

- collecting profiles of classmates who are thinking of participating (might list major at MHC, career path followed, geographic location today and/or through the years, challenges of balancing professional and personal lives, areas of interest today, and more) and making these available in a restricted access way to 2014 students who are interested in making a one-time, several time, or continuing connection;
- asking our classmates who live within 100 miles of the campus to attend Class of 2014 events to signal 1964's interest in their efforts and progress;
- participating in a panel on campus during the September Mini-Reunion to present a kaleidoscope of our on-campus and after-MHC life stories (this is a special request from the 2014 Class Board);
- focusing particular attention on the greatly increased number of international students at MHC who miss the geographically closer family network of their American classmates;
- Continued...

finding ways to use our international interests, travel, work and/or living in foreign lands to work with the new Center for Global Initiatives and the Class of 2014; and
so much more...

Connections to students in the Class of 2014 might develop as one-on-one on a continuing basis or might be a one-time offer of experience or insights in a particular field, graduate study, city, country, or what we took from MHC that has had lasting effect, etc. Such connections could be helpful as 2014 students plan for Intercession, summer internships, or after graduation. The way the connections proceed, once established, would be a individual matter. We, as a Class working with the 2014 Class Board, need to provide a means of making this connection -via the net, at on-campus activities, in our states/cities/communities and foreign lands.

What is needed now is a signal of interest from our Class and it would be helpful to learn who personally would like to participate (with no commitment regarding to what form or extent that participation might take later on). Please email Mary Lee Warren who is coordinating the start-up of the project with your interest and ideas. One other thing, it is generally agreed that we might like to consider calling this project something other than the "Grandmother/ granddaughter project." Please email your suggestion(s) for a better identifier.

In November 2006 we went to the Big Island and rented a vacation home for three months. Lots of visits from friends and family but as we prepared to return home we realized we weren't quite through with Hawaii. We leased a condo in Hilo on the rainy side of the Big Island and spent a year moving between our mile high, arid home in Albuquerque and our sea level, damp condo in Hilo.

Dwayne and I are enthusiastic birdwatchers and that has inspired most of our travels. In 2008 we went to India for birds and tigers. We saw four tigers - three of them from elephant-back - as well as innumerable birds, the Taj Mahal and an amazingly colorful country.

For the last three years we have spent two or three weeks in Brazil for birds and jaguars. We traveled in the Southern Amazon and the Pantanal. The Pantanal is an amazing wetland roughly the size of France which floods during the rainy season and teems with wildlife as the receding water concentrates them during the dry season.

Last year we went to Africa for the first time; Tanzania, more specifically, to experience the wildebeest migration in the Serengeti. Truly an amazing experience! We stayed in a Serengeti tented camp in May right in the middle of hundreds of thousands of wildebeests along with their accompanying zebras and predators. One morning I was awakened at 3AM by the sound of wildebeests right outside the tent - so close I could hear them pulling up grass and chewing.

This year the big trip is Panama - again for birds but we have added butterflies and photography to our quests. Dwayne has started a photo card business, which allows him to share his photographs in about 8 local outlets including our natural food co-op and the Nature Store at Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge.


