The planning committee organized a variety of tours - historical, governmental, cultural, artistic, and magical (Monuments by Moonlight); plus times to be together and talk - the opening dinner at the Old Ebbitt Grill, the dinner at Anita's, the Bridges Luncheon at Mary Lee's, the dinner at Nancy's, and the champagne brunch at the Cosmos Club. Above all, we reconnected with old fiends and made new ones.

To quote Lynn Skinner Bayliss "despite the widely different routes we have traveled since then (MHC) we will always be women who have a lot in common. Whether we shared four years at the college or only one, two or three years there, we were transformed by that experience. Ever since then we have been confident that we will not only be comfortable together but even stimulated and exhilarated by sharing ideas and new experiences. And so we were in Washington!"

WEDNESDAY JUNE 10


Tour of Dupont Circle: Wednesday afternoon we walked the neighborhood around Dupont Circle, which is a major Metropolitan area and close to the Cosmos Club where about half of us stayed. Mona Hanford, Nancy Goff and Sue Koch are members of the Club, a lovely former home. The 1900's era of city mansions, which were built for entertaining in the 'social' season, preserve elegance and charm [and gardens] in under 6 stories. Many foreign embassies also cluster here; and, within 2 blocks, are the Phillips Collection and the famous Nora restaurant, America's first certified organic restaurant.

The Dupont Circle area hosted the Gay Pride parade on the Saturday of our stay in DC.

Dinner at the Old Ebbitt Grill: About 35 of us gathered for dinner in a courtyard space at the Old Ebbitt Grill, a historic oyster bar and grill near the White House. Some of us learned to use Uber [the taxi alternative] application on our smart phones. Jean Vnenchak noted Priscilla Morse Huston's and Wendy's evolving expertise with the Uber

application each day. "They got rides to materialize in DC and beyond."

For Wendy, the biggest DC improvement since interning in 1963 was the Metro system. She commented "I had been ignorant of how many of the grand government buildings were completed from 1933 to1936, as the US struggled to recover from the Depression."





THURSDAY. JUNE 11

The Department of Justice (DOJ) offered some history to go with its lovely Library. Before retiring, Mary Lee Warren had worked at DOJ for 34 years, first at the US Attorney's Office in New York City and then at "Main Justice" in DC under Attorney General Holder when he was Deputy Attorney General under Reno, and then again when he was Attorney General. She was visibly moved by his portrait that had been recently hung in the building. Every tour had been pre-booked and was led by docents seemingly, able to answer any questions.

And, we certainly were a group with wide-ranging curiosity.

From Ellen Nutter: The DOJ building contains many murals created in the 1930's as

part of a government sponsored art program meant to enhance art appreciation and provide support for needy artists.

One of the murals, which is part of the "Society Freed through Justice" series includes Frances Perkins depicted as a worker (in the black dress) comparing life in an unjust system with life in a happy family.

The Supreme Court was so moving that I (Wendy) have no photos. Being in the room with 'The Nine' chairs only 30 feet away left me with such empathy for the institution and our framing documents. As Jean Vnenchak pointed out "the chamber is where the decisions around same sex marriage and the continuation of subsidies for the Affordable Care Act were read a few weeks later."


