

Cherry Festival Lives On!

North San Juan has been the site of an annual Cherry Festival since 1895. Founded by prospector Christian Kientz in 1853, the town of North San Juan's population grew quickly as men flocked to the area to work in adjacent hydraulic mining operations. The town's population swelled to several thousand when a flume from mountain lakes ushered in an era of prosperity by providing water to the townsfolk and surrounding mines. Soon North San Juan became headquarters for water companies that supplied the mines, and water ran above the town in elevated flumes. The end of hydraulic mining in 1884 marked the beginning of a decline in population for the foothill mining town. Over the years three major fires swept through the town, destroying the homes and businesses in its path. Resilient then, as now, North San Juan has survived; and through boom or bust, fair weather or foul, the Cherry Festival has endured. The global pandemic may have put a damper on last year's festivities, but things are looking up and the Cherry Festival is back!

This year's Cherry Festival will be on June 5th, from 10 am to 6 pm. Although there will be no parade this year, there will still be plenty of fun. There will be music from bands playing throughout the day, as well as children's games, tacos by Angie, and vendors, including Papa Crow's Forge. Raffle tickets for a variety of prizes donated by local businesses and artisans will be available at 1 for \$1 and 6 for \$5.

Vendors can still reserve a spot by calling Sue Bauer at 292.9525. The Cherry Festival is North San Juan Community Center's annual fundraiser. Every penny raised at this family friendly event goes to keeping the Community Center's doors open and the lights on.

Malakoff Diggins State Historic Park provides not only a glimpse, but an experience of Sierra Nevada Foothill history.

When you visit Malakoff, plan to make a day of it. Pack a picnic lunch to enjoy at one of many shady picnicking spots in the historic town of North Bloomfield, at Blair Lake, or elsewhere in this beautiful 3500 acre park. As well as a charming spot for a picnic or barbeque, Blair Lake is stocked with trout and bass, so don't forget your fishing pole. In addition to hiking on over twenty miles of well maintained trails, gold panning and a scavenger hunt are also available to park-goers.



MDSHP's clean, well equipped campgrounds opened on May 21, and cabins may become available later this summer. The park's visitor center is open daily, 10 am-6 pm. 
Meet North San Juan's New Innkeeper



Get Your Go Bag Ready

Our fervent wish is that the Ridge has the good fortune of being spared from devastating wildfires. Although we've been lucky lately, there is still a chance that a fast moving fire may threaten our homes. In that case it's good to have a plan. First of all, know all possible evacuation routes and locate temporary refuge areas on the Ridge. Then load up your family and pets, grab your go bags and head toward safety. Although specific needs may differ from person to person or family to family, the following is a good list of items that should be considered and packed into a go bag that is easy to grab on your way out the door when you are in a hurry.

Following are recommendations from Ready Nevada County and can be found at mynevadacounty.com:

- Three-day supply of non-perishable food and three gallons of water per person
- Map marked with evacuation routes
- List of important numbers in case your cell phone is lost
- Prescriptions, special medications*
- Assistive devices or durable medical equipment
- Battery-powered radio
- Extra batteries
- Pet & service animal supplies (food, water, carrier, leashes)
- Change of clothing/Sturdy shoes for walking
- Extra eye glasses or contact lenses
- N95 mask
- An extra set of car keys
- Credit cards, cash, or checks
- Flashlight
- Sanitation supplies
- Copies of important documents (birth certificates, passports, etc.)
- Cell phone charging cord and extra battery/Laptop
- Diaper bag
- First aid kit
- Your Ready, Set, Go! Handbook

*At least a week-long supply of prescription medicines, along with a list of all medications, dosages, and any allergies

All Burn Permits Suspended!

CAL FIRE has suspended <u>ALL</u> burn permits for outdoor residential burning within Nevada, Yuba and Placer counties. Because of increased fire danger posed by the high volume of dead grasses and hotter, drier conditions in the region, all residential outdoor burning of landscape debris (leaves, branches, etc.) is banned.

As of this writing, CAL FIRE and firefighters across California have responded to 2038 wildfires since January 1; and it's still May! This looks like it's going to be a long, hot, dry summer accompanied by the threat of a particularly severe wildfire season.



Now is the time to make sure that there are 100 feet of defensible space around homes and outbuildings and to be prepared to evacuate if the time comes. Here are some tips from CAL FIRE that will help protect your home and property:

- Clear all dead or dying vegetation 100 feet from around structures.
- Landscape with fire resistant plants and non-flammable ground cover.
- Find alternative ways to dispose of debris like chipping or hauling to a biomass energy/green waste facility.

Love the River Like a Local

No doubt about it, on the San Juan Ridge, summer is River Season. Once days start warming up, the Yuba beckons us to take a dip in her cool, fresh waters. Could anything be more enticing on a sweltering summer day? Generations have made afternoons at the River the centerpiece of their summers. Beautiful? Yes. Refreshing? Yes. Dangerous? Unfortunately, yes.

Nevada County in coalition with the South Yuba River Citizens League and the Yuba River Safety Cohort have some suggestions that will make your trips to the Yuba safer while having fun:

"River safety is your responsibility. An average of five lives are lost each year on the South Yuba River due to high, fast, cold water. Please enjoy our beautiful trails and beaches, but during high flows...stay out and stay alive!



- ◆ Do not stand in moving water. If pulled downriver, lie on back, tuck arms, and point feet downstream.
- Always LOOK first! The river is constantly changing. Scout safe routes.
- Drinking alcohol and swimming don't mix and never bring glass bottles to the area.
- Wear a life jacket for all river activities. Watch children and pets at all times.
- Stay out of the water during high flows.
- NO FIRES allowed in the river canyon.
- No cell service in river canyon.
- Obey all parking signs. Fines now \$162."

In addition to the above safety guidelines, here is a guideline for being a decent and responsible human being. DO NOT LEAVE TRASH, including cans, bottles, food, wrappers, baby diapers & toilet paper (yuk!), etc. at the river. If you brought it in, you can take it out. Please consider the health and safety of the river itself, the forest and its creatures, and other river goers when you are there. It's important to preserve life and to preserve this precious resource as well.
