

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


HISTORY OF COGGON PUBLIC SCHOOLS


The first school in Coggon was built in 1890, and was a four-room frame building. At first only two rooms were used, later on three, and four years later, the fourth room was equipped. This building was used for nineteen years, and eleven persons held the office of Superintendent.

The present school grounds were acquired in 1908, and a new building erected in 1909. The first class of twelve grades was graduated in 1911, and the school was accredited for the full course a year or so later. A fire, which partially destroyed the contents of the building, occurred in 1911.

The first class to be graduated from C. H. S. (1893) was composed of Jessie Willis, Anna Belle Knox, Leona M. Vinton, George T. Main, Edgar A. Brazleton, and Andrew DeWoody.

The largest classes of nineteen members each, were graduated in the years 1924 and 1925. The smallest group (1900) included Ione McQueen and Duane Hunt.

Martin acted as advisor. As usual, the most important event in every Freshman's life was the initiation party, the committee of which was composed of Harriette Crosby, Frank Detlefson, and Josephine Woodward.

Two Freshman girls, Ellyn Main and Harriette Church, were star players on the girls' basketball team, and Elmer Jossie and Kenneth Stebbins played in the high school orchestra. The Freshman girls' Domestic Science class served the Junior-Senior rainbow banquet. That year we specialized in theatre parties.

We entered the Sophomore class with ten members, and elected Thomas French president. Miss Kinchner, now Mrs. H. J. Kenyon, was our class advisor, and directed our paths over the rough trails of Geometry. Our class was represented in the orchestra and Junior play by Marian Johnston and on the basketball teams by three girls and two boys, Marian Johnston, Ellyn Main, Harriette Church, Patrick Kinley and Lawrence Hill.

The assembly doors opened the next fall for nine Juniors. The officers elected were Patrick Kinley, president; Ellyn Main, vice president; Irene Kirkpatrick, secretary and treasurer; and Mrs. Hastings, class advisor. Corn and blue were chosen for the class colors. Two girls and two boys played basketball, and Marian Johnston played in the orchestra. Miss Naylor coached the Junior play, "Ruth in a Rush." We entertained the Seniors at a very elaborate circus banquet late in the spring.

The school bells rang out again and eight "dignified Seniors" marched stalwartly into the assembly, seeking to make the last year as worthwhile as possible. One girl, however, decided that the appeals of matrimony were too tempting for her, so only seven were left in the class.

The present year the officers are: President, Patrick Kinley; vice president, Marian Johnston; secretary and treasurer, Irene Kirkpatrick; and class advisor, Miss Dake. Orchid and gold were chosen for class colors and the sweet pea for the flower. Everything went well, the Seniors having the highest class average for the first semester. Patrick Kinley, captain, and Lawrence Hill are members of both the basketball and baseball teams. Irene Kirkpatrick is editor-in-chief of "The Evergreen" and the annual, and Thomas French is business manager of the annual.

We wish to take this method to thank the faculty for their untiring efforts in directing our footsteps safely to the shores of graduation. We shall always hold them in high esteem and retain the golden memories of the many pleasant hours we have spent with them.

The honor students for the year were Merrill Main, Clarence Fowler, Fern Andrews and Erma Workman.



COGGON SCHOOL ORCHESTRA

The Coggon School Orchestra was organized in 1922 by Miss Kemman, now Mrs. D. D. Hastings. It then consisted of eight members: Eda Larson, violin; Goldie Marvin and Darwin Schaum, saxophones; Harland Jossie, cornet; Elmer Jossie, clarinet; Fay Johnston, trombone; Kenneth Stebbins, drums; and Miss Kemman, piano.

The first musical instruction was introduced into the school in 1924 by Supt. A. E. Mahaney. The orchestra was composed of about twenty members and much advancement was made.

In 1925, under the supervision of Supt. J. R. Gerberich, Mr. Di Tella of Dubuque, who is a very efficient director, was engaged. He gave private lessons and conducted the orchestra. A very successful concert was given in March of last year.

The present year, Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Lyman, of Cedar Rapids, give private instruction, and Mr. Lyman directs the orchestra. This is the first year that school credit has been given for instrumental music. A program of both orchestral and solo numbers was presented this spring and the orchestra made an excellent showing at the district contest at Belle Plaine.

Donald Weeden, playing his second year at center, outjumped many taller players and was runner-up in total points scored. Bert also is a Sophomore.


Ivan McCammon played a good guarding game until lost to the team by moving to Central City.
