I am very happy to report that the Cornell Seminar on Appraising was an enormous success, proving during these uncertain times we could hold an in-person event. We also proved that hybrid learning could be done so that both in-person and online groups could benefit from the excellent education that only NYSAA can provide. Huge congratulations to Warren and Tracy for an excellent job in pulling it off with so many uncertainties to deal with. It was another major step in NYSAA adopting technology to advance our education programs into the current standards.

Legislative issues have been front and center as well, the James Maloney "Dark Store" legislation passed both the Assembly and the Senate and is waiting for the governor to sign it. Congratulations to Scott and Maggie and NYSAA for their inspired efforts to achieve this.

The New York State Department of Tax and Finance announced its model for solar and wind farm valuation. Representatives from NYSAA took part in the development of the statewide model to ensure that local municipalities don't lose revenue to a model that favored the solar industry.

Legislation passed in the 2021-2022 New York State budget requires solar and wind farms to be valued according to the discounted cash flow methodology. With NYSAA input, the model is now much more streamlined and user-friendly, compared to the model proposed by the solar industry. Assessors now have a model that can be applied consistently across New York State.

The preliminary appraisal model and discount rates are now available on the Department of Taxation and Finance's website. See <u>Appraisal methodology for solar and wind energy projects</u>. 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CORNELL SEMINAR ON APPRAISING WRAP-UP

The 2021 Cornell Seminar on Appraising was held July 11-16 at the Hotel Ithaca in Ithaca, NY. Current COVID-19 pandemic restrictions meant we could not hold any classes on the Cornell University campus this year; however, we welcomed 90 students in person for classes at the hotel, and 71 students took classes online, for a total of 161 individual attendees in our first-ever hybrid seminar!

MEMBER PROFILE

Steve Harris Assessor

More than a lifelong career, assessment valuation is a family affair!

Stephen Harris was raised in the arena of mass appraisal, when his father worked for the New York State Office of Equalization & Assessment (which later became ORPTS, then dropped the "T" to ORPS, then added the "T" to become what we now know as ORPTS, Office of Real Property Tax Services.) The elder Harris worked in the Property Valuation Bureau and later was regional manager of Local Assessment Services, both divisions of NYS Equalization & Assessment.

Steve began his career in the early 1980s with Finnegan Associates, first as a data collector in Stony Point, moving into a valuation project and field review in Dutchess County, and later regional manager in Herkimer County. His main project was data collection, as many assessors did not have inventory data and the state was enforcing the legal requirement to retain inventory. This led to reassessments in some towns. As regional director he was responsible for similar data collection and valuation projects in other counties.

During his tenure with Finnegan, Steve became assessor in the Town of New Paltz, and after leaving Finnegan in 1992 he was hired as assessor for the town of Cazenovia, where he recollected inventory data and performed a revaluation of assessments

While working in Cazenovia, he took assessor positions in additional municipalities: City of Norwich, Town of McDonough, and Town of DeRuyter.

Today, Steve is Chenango County Director of Real Property Tax Services with 21 towns, one city, and approximately 35,000 parcels. He also remains assessor for the Town of DeRuyter in Madison County with 1,250 parcels. Since becoming county director, Steve has been instrumental in assessors maintaining their own RPS files in Chenango County. Several towns have done reassessments where none had been done in many years. He assisted in hiring qualified assessors into positions in the county and has made changes within his office to be more "assessor oriented."

Steve has been president of the County Directors Association and is currently a board chairman. He has been president of Chenango County and Madison County Assessors' Associations.

His career is vast. When asked what role he prefers, Steve said "I like them all. But it depends on the time of year. At times I wish I was just the assessor, other times I wish I was just the county director. As for reval work, you do the project and leave everything behind to the assessor, which can be good or bad."

Aside from the name changes (E&A, ORPTS, ORPS, ORPTS), Steve has seen many changes in the working relationship with the state. There is less assistance available to assessors than was offered in the past as a result of fewer personnel, lack of appraisal training, and credentials. He recalls a time when assessors could call Albany and ask their attorney a legal question.


"Things are a lot different than they used to be – hey, we'll see how ACES goes! I'm hoping it won't just be a tool for the state and not the assessors," Steve said. He cites that taxes are different too, (mostly higher), and taxpayers are different (feeling greater tax burden).

They live in Sherburne, NY. Steve said his situation is a unique thing, with much of his family involved in assessments and valuation. His father was a regional manager of Local Assessment Services, his sister was an assessor in the Town of Gardiner, his wife Shelly is the assessor in the Towns of Sherburne and Hamilton, and his son Dylan is a municipal law and tax law attorney. Steve said, "It makes for interesting family get-togethers!"

When he is not working or doing home improvements, Steve loves to ride his Harley. He and Shelly enjoy taking motorcycle trips together and, although it rained most of the ride, they enjoyed their trip to Nashville, Tennessee.
