A promise was made towards the end of Avahan III phase project with a vision of continuing our support to the sex worker community- building sustainable institutions, nurturing strong leadership and fostering a resilient network that will continue to thrive-without or without Swasti. Taaras was born out of this promise as a collective vision, to support women in sex work & their community organisations and provide them with a platform to rise over ideologies, barriers, reclaim their voices, and pursue a life of dignity. Swasti, as the national secretariat, along with partner organisations came together to form this transformative coalition in October 2016 with the aptly chosen name, 'rapid progress'.

Today, as we stand in the 7th year of this transformative journey, I am humbled to say that we have kept our promise and learnt a lot. Taaras over the years has evolved into a powerful entity, driven by the passion and resilience of over 1000 women leaders, who have found their voice and purpose. Witnessing the way they advocate for themselves and their community, charting their own path to a better future, fills our hearts with pride and joy. Together, we have anchored Taaras in five states and 21 regions, working alongside 62 community-based organizations. This vast network has enabled us to touch the lives of more than 100,000 community members.

Leaders and COs have enabled marginalized communities to access essential services, exercise their rights with dignity, and significantly reduce vulnerability to health risks and socio-economic challenges. Taaras Commenced-A New Chapter of Empowerment



Women in sex work continue to struggle in realising their fundamental human rights. In most places, mainstream financial security, a life of safety and access to services is difficult to imagine, let alone live, among the sex worker community. Over the last 2 decades, women in difficult circumstances have been collectivised by different interventions, agencies and movements across India.

With both National and International funding declining, community organisations, especially those of the marginalized communities, find that there is no support available to them. NGOs and other civil society organisations are also often unable or unwilling to support given the absence of financial resources to do so.

With the Avahan III project nearing its conclusion, a collective vision to ensure ongoing support for women in sex work prompted the collaboration of Swasti and its partner community organizations. This harmonious effort led to the formation of a coalition in October 2016, with Swasti serving as the national secretariat. This coalition, named Taaras, encapsulates the essence of 'rapid progress'.


Taaras Coalition & what it envisions



Taaras, meaning rapid progress, is a coalition of women in sex work (WSW) and their organisations, that provides a platform for their voices, aspirations and joint actions. Taaras rises above ideologies, geography federations, cultural and language divisions. Taaras aims to empower marginalized communities and enable them to enjoy their rights as citizens, accessing services and support with dignity, and substantially reduce their vulnerability to HIV, other health risks and socio-economic factors.

- Building a community connected vibrant partnership which evolves with time (and issues)
- Inculcate a community centric and community-engaged approach in all interventions, especially those for the community
- · Work towards making community interventions self-sustaining
- Systematically work on addressing and mitigating coercive and exploitative factors
- The agenda for Taaras in entirety is set on the basis of active listening to the members and Taaras is focussed on building articulate negotiators and leaders.
- The Taaras coalition is advised by a range of leading development professionals, who are experts and advocates of Women in Sex Work movement and welfare.

Reach: Empowerment Across Regions



Taaras is currently anchored in 5 states, Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka and Telangana.

A Vision of Empowerment

Every woman in sex work realising all citizenship rights and living with dignity. Seeking to work with all stakeholders and members of the community as equals, Taaras envisages having community members as active participants rather than recipients or beneficiaries.

2016-2020-Launch of Taaras Coalition, Continued National Level Taaras leaders Meetings, Formation of regional level Taaras teams, 22 regional level Taaras teams formed, Leaders from 91 COs (68 Avahan supported COs & 23 Non Avahan COs) meet regularly on monthly basis and discuss issues of community members, Reaching to North India, Formation of Taaras Advisory Group.

2020-2023- Supported over 1 Lakh Families from 62 Community Based Organizations, Our COVID-19 response had a computed commodity value of INR 68.7 Cr, 736 Oxygen concentrators were deployed to health facilities across 5 states and it has given immense visibility for Taaras among stakeholders and government, 80% of the services facilitated through Govt, 20% resources mobilized through local resource, Mobilized support from 305 donors, Each family received around Rs 5800/- worth commodities, Mobilizing an additional 10 million USD for COVID Relief to KPs Relief from Global Fund, SMS as the nodal agency for implementing GFATM SP & KP 11 crore project as the SR.



Progress And Beyond.....



- Taaras is currently anchored in 5 states, Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka and Telangana, 21 regions, with 1000 plus active leaders and 62 community-based organizations Working with over 1,00,000 community members, Taaras envisages on uplifting, mainstreaming and including marginalized communities.
- Contributed towards forming India's HIV/AIDS Key Population Network (Collaboration of 7 Networks)
- Succeeded in mobilizing an additional 10 million USD for COVID Relief to KPs Relief from Global Fund.
- Played an important role in providing evidence to the Supreme Court for passing Historic judgment in India-Distribution of free ration to all our community members without any document proof.



Taaras has played a vital role in advocating with state and local governments to empower community organizations and facilitate services to community members in terms of health, social protection, financial security, safety security & justice and resource mobilization.



Throughout the first wave of the COVID-19 pandemic, the focus was on providing relief materials and in parallel exploring how to institute alternative livelihoods for the community - where rampant poverty, low literacy levels and a lack of marketable skills mean that the job market is inaccessible to them.



- With the second wave hitting in March 2021, the Taaras Coalition focused on strengthening both community and government facilities in their localities and setting up community care centres; partnering with institutions and foundations in the distribution of oxygen concentrators and cylinders, home quarantine kits, and medicines.
- The Coalition partnered with Swasti to run their own TeleCare for those in the community - meeting their health including mental health, social protection, financial inclusion and wellbeing needs.
 The Coalition ensured that community members were tracking and managing Non Communicable Disorders to arrest possible severity of COVID-19.



In a shift from relief to recovery, Taaras Coalition in partnership with Swasti and GIVE India, distributed 1000 oxygen concentrators to 346 primary healthcare centres and 42 district hospitals.

During 1st & 2nd Covid wave, Taaras facilitated Rs 112 crores worth of Covid relief materials into the hands of communities



Mitigating the impact of Covid-19 on marginalised communities, Taaras made its mission to persuade and educate eligible communities about vaccination which resulted in 100% uptake of vaccination services



Taaras advisors and mentors regularly visited the community members in their areas and provided guidance and support to amplify the impact and outreach of Taaras and its leaders



Ensuring effective addressal of issues of marginalised communities,

Taaras is regularly organising meetings and consultations independently and facilitating action and follow ups



Taaras leaders creating visibility for Taaras through representation at various state and national platforms



Swathi Mahila Sangha, on behalf of Taaras, has been chosen as one of the sub-recipients of GFATM C19RM Grant and is implementing the project(April-Dec 2023) along with 14 other community organisations as the sub-sub-recipients. Through this project, SMS will be reaching out to marginalised communities through facilitating services for identity cards, bank accounts and social protection as well as working with the community organisations on their organisational strengthening and building capacities of community leaders.





In Gulbarga, a small community organization of women in sex work - Jeevana Jyothi Mahila Sangha, borrowed INR 2 lakh from their corpus to distribute ration kits to 300 members who were facing financial and food shortages during covid time.

This was covered by the local news media and the staff of Azim Premji Foundation (APF) noticed the same. The Foundation then approached the community organization and offered support for ration kits - distributing ration kits worth INR 1500 to 1500 members. During the second wave, Azim Premji Foundation returned once again distributing ration kits worth INR 1500 to 1500 members. In total, APF supported the community with INR 45 Lakh worth of Ration Kits.

Azim Premji Foundation then picked up on the need of another Community Organization - Swathi Mahila Sangha (SMS) and distributed ration kits worth of INR 2500 for 1000 of it's community members too. This is a direct relationship between community organizations and the foundation.



During the pandemic-

It was the community-based organisations and local leaders among women in sex work who and supported their communities - guiding the response and demonstrating true leadership in crisis, showing up on ground everyday to run relief efforts overcoming fear and deeply entrenched societal stigma to mobilize resources for their community


The community organizations attuned their systems and processes to be able to represent the community in the bid to gather the resources needed. This required a swift and steep learning curve as well as putting the community first - above and beyond projects.

The Taaras leaders gave back to the wider community in their locations, honoring stakeholders in the process. To distribute the oxygen concentrators, they went through District Collectors and District Head Officer, which were deployed to the hospitals. The doctors were surprised to see the mobilizing capacity of a sex workers organization.

"Before Taaras, I represented Sree Lakshmi Pengal Munnetra Sangam (SLPMS) at various forums. During that time, the stakeholders/officials treated me as a sex worker and one among the community. Because of Taaras, now their perspective has changed and I could see that they are approaching me as a leader of Taaras and I am getting respect and living a dignified life."



"As Taaras leader, my confidence has developed, and I have been engaging with government departments and doing effective stakeholder engagement for the community. I have realized my own strength and how far I can go to reach to the unreached population".

"Before Taaras, I have represented as a BoD member of CB. I was working for the community at CO level at that time and used to regularly visit police stations and other government offices. People used to look at me differently because I was a sex worker, sometimes they would support me, but sometimes would refuse. As a Taaras leader today, I interact with district and state level officers, I talk about about community needs and challenges. Now district level officers invite me to participate in their meetings as a Taaras leader. I feel proud that I am getting the respect"

Lessons Learnt



The Power of Community Leadership

- Taaras has witnessed firsthand the immense potential and power of community leaders. Empowering individuals from within the community to take charge and lead initiatives has proven to be instrumental in driving sustainable change.
- Everyone is a leader and a change maker since there is no hierarchy in the approach that Taaras works with. This has ensured accountability and ownership among leaders.



Trust, Collaboration & Respect

- Building trust among stakeholders and fostering collaborative partnerships has been fundamental to Taaras's success. By working together with various organizations and allies, Taaras has been able to leverage expertise and resources effectively.
- Taaras leaders have often expressed that they are getting more recognition and respect from the community members after their association with Taaras.



Amplifying Voices

• Empowering marginalized communities to share their stories, aspirations, and challenges has been transformative. Amplifying their voices and involving them in decision-making processes have resulted in more impactful and sustainable interventions.




Sustainable systems and Leadership

- Since Taaras is not a registered body, community members have been contributing from their own resources to participate in regional and state level meetings.



Challenges




- Lack of funding and support required to carry on the advocacy work for communities
- Since digital mode and social media are the new upcoming modes of soliciting clients, it becomes challenging to identify and deliver social protection services to the young individuals who are engaged in sex work
- It becomes difficult to work and sensitize different government stakeholders due to their transfers and change in the administration

Challenges



- Further strengthening government engagement and liaison, especially with the health department, to address different issues
- Language barrier for the leaders
- Intensifying the advocacy work to alleviate issues and influence policy change i.e reservations for schemes, sustainable employment, etc.
- Covid-19 had an unprecedented impact not just on the communities but also on the day-to-day activities of Taaras coalition like attending in person meetings, organising regional meetings, etc

- Setting up financial institution (NBFC) for marginalized communities
- Improving representation of Taaras leaders and coalition at various national and international forums
- Sustainability of community institutions and strengthening their systems
- Research study on community's need & priority areas




