Local communities have expressed a strong desire for more accessible parks, trails, and natural areas where families can connect with nature, engage in outdoor recreation, and enjoy the benefits of open space. Wildflowers Music Park

Vision

Creating a venue for the cultural growth of the citizens of North Florida, and beyond, is the goal of the Wildflowers Music Park development. Without suitable infrastructures for Arts, Music, Dance and Learning, these creative outlets are often unable to reach their full potential. In the search for a winter home for a GrassRoots Festival of Music & Dance we have been led to a wonderful piece of property in Alachua County, on the Eastern edge adjacent to Melrose. The property is 270 acres consisting of a mix of fields, live oak hammocks, nature areas and a small lake, all in pristine and mostly unused condition (find many photos in the link below). Our goal is to be able to use the site for a winter time festival and to facilitate setting up the site for continual community use for events, camping, events with camping, nature walks, nature areas and more... Whatever use people can come up with is a possibility.

We are very excited about this project, though we have challenges ahead to make it a reality, mostly because the land costs a significant amount and so capital needs to be raised. The GrassRoots organization has years of experience in creating festival events and building festival sites and owns portable stages, tents, sound and lighting equipment, food service equipment, point of sale gear, radios, trucks, tractors, mowers, etc. However, what is most important for creating a new festival and building a festival site is community involvement and collaboration, volunteers are a big part of a successful event. Volunteerism is the best community builder we know, especially when it culminates in a community celebration of Music, Dance and Arts!

What follows in this presentation is how the project is planned and how the success of it hopes to be executed. Not all here is written in stone and we welcome, very much, input from the people of Alachua County and Gainesville. We have already met some great folks and we hope to meet all of you that are interested in creating this event space, which after all is for you, the community.

A word about the name

We chose Wildflowers Music Park for several reasons, typically we like to use a name that denotes a geographical area, like Finger Lakes or Shakori Hills but not finding that we came upon Wildflowers in much the same way; looking for a name that gives an insight into the area, after seeing the Tom Petty Wildflowers exhibit at the Cade Museum, we were inspired that people remember the native of Gainesville who brought music to so many and wrote such a beautiful song. We love the idea of people thinking of themselves as "wildflowers in a field" while enjoying wonderful music!

A Festival for Every Season

GrassRoots Festivals of Music & Dance

Our History



Founded in 1991 by members of roots-rock band Donna The Buffalo the Finger Lakes GrassRoots Festival has grown from a local benefit music festival for the fight against A.I.D.S. in the Finger Lakes region of New York State to a National organization which produces, or has produced, a festival for every season in three states along the East Coast, USA: New York, North Carolina and Florida—Summer, Spring and Fall, and Winter, respectively. Currently only Spring, Summer and Fall are produced as the organization lost its home in Miami and is now looking for a new home for the winter event, which we believe we have found in Alachua County.

The four festivals in three states annual event has engendered love and support from many thousands of music fans, camping fans, musicians, artist, activists, healers and foodies from all over the world. Here are some of the greatest performers of past GrassRoots Festivals:

In the 1990s GrassRoots was only among few USA outdoor festivals with camping, held for four days with four stages and up to 85 or so bands. A Kids' Area, Healing Arts Area, Art Barn, Sustainability Fair, and a 10,000 square-foot Dance Tent with wooden dance floor that runs until dawn; these are features brought to festival life by the not for profit organized community event and that are not seen altogether in one place anywhere else. What GrassRoots Festivals have brought to the world are life changing experiences where people have often met their life partners, friends and future community. Four days of Music, Dance and Art creates a world of its own for participants, a world where love and peace prevail.

In 2003 the Finger Lakes Grassroots Festival Organization moved to a national presence with the creation of the Shakori Hills GrassRoots Festival of Music & Dance in North Carolina near Chapel Hill and the University of North Carolina. In 2012 the GrassRoots organization founded the Virginia Key GrassRoots Festival of Music & Dance in Miami, Florida.



The Project

Wildflowers Music Park

Concept and mission

- To establish a community-owned and operated music and arts festival that serves as a platform for musicians, artists, craftspeople, foodies, teachers, healers and builders to showcase their talents and skills.
- 2. To unite folks from all walks of life, creating transformative experiences in a beautiful natural setting.
- 3. To preserve and protect a natural environment dedicated to recreation and education that is open to the public year-round.

Community Involvement and Partners

Community Arts & Culture, a Florida based 501c3, with executive director Jose Elias, has presented Afro Roots Festivals in Florida since 1999. The GrassRoots Festival Organization was founded with the mission of helping to support other not for profit organizations and so we are very happy to collaborate in furthering the mission of Community Arts & Culture. As we secure funding, we look forward to bringing on members of the community to support the Wildflower Music Park mission and broaden its reach much as we do in North Carolina with the Shakori Hills Community Arts Center.

We invite you to consider being an integral part of the Wildflowers Music Park by joining us as a community partner. Securing the Site

An LLC is being created for the purpose of purchasing the 270 acre site to create the Wildflowers Music Park. The plan is for the LLC to make the site available to a Florida-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization through a lease and purchase agreement. The name of the LLC is Wildflowers Music Park Finance LLC.

Music Park Development & Operations

With a coalition of event producers, artists, builders, governing officials, and community organizations, in

concert with already established festival production crews, the property will be landscaped, roads will be built, and water and power distribution will be installed. In the first iteration of the Music Park portable stages and tents will be utilized for large events; in the future, a permanent stage will be constructed.

Community Arts & Culture, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, will be the presenter of the annual Wildflowers GrassRoots Festival of Music & Dance. It will work in partnership with the Finger Lakes GrassRoots Festival, also a 501(c)(3) nonprofit based in Trumansburg, NY, to produce the festival as a fundraising event.

Project Financing

The total price of the land is \$2,600,000 for approximately 270 acres. The land owners have agreed to a second position partial owner finance mortgage with a fifteen year term, the owner financing portion of the mortgage is \$1,100,000 with an interest rate of 6%. An LLC is being created with the goal of raising \$2,100,000 in investments to cover the cost of purchasing the property for a five year period before refinancing, *details below*.

The 270 acre site is being offered at \$9630/acre, there are no restrictions to subdividing and resale, many approaches could be taken to monetize the property, a campground probably the most harmonious use for a festival site and since camping locations are premium in Florida.

Revenue Strategy

This will be the largest venue available with camping in the region that could be rented by event producers, non profit organizations, community organizations, etc. Primary revenue will come from event ticket sales, outside organization site rentals, sponsorships, camping, festival merchandise sales, grants and fundraisers. By the utilization of a variety of revenue streams we will ensure the long-term success and positive impact to the community of the Wildflowers Music Park Project.

Investment Details

To support the development of the Wildflowers Music Park, we are looking for investments. This funding will cover the purchase of the land and purchase closing costs.

The investment will involve the following structure:

- **Triple Net Lease:** The LLC will lease the property to Community Arts & Culture Incorporated under a triple net lease and purchase agreement. This means that the nonprofit will cover property taxes, insurance, and maintenance costs.
- **Purchase Agreement:** After five years, Community Arts & Culture will purchase the land from the LLC, allowing investors to enjoy 6.14% yearly income on their initial investment with a return on investment (ROI) of 34.69%.

While there is no guarantee of success for a new festival venture, the property will be enhanced in value by infrastructure improvements and the rising property value in Alachua County, providing investors with strong collateral throughout property ownership. This investment offers a secure return through the collateralization from the increased land value.

Estimated Impact of the Festival

The numbers provided below are our estimates based on our 30+ years of festival and event production experience, rather than specific data sources, the points below attempt to offer a clearer picture of the festival's potential impact:

- 1. **Community Building:** A well-organized festival at Wildflower Music Park can attract up to 30,000 attendees, fostering connections that could result in hundreds of new partnerships, collaborations, and community projects.
- 2. **Cultural Enrichment:** Featuring 100+ artists and performers across various genres can expose attendees to diverse cultural expressions, enriching the cultural landscape and significantly increasing local art engagement.
- 3. **Personal Growth:** Offering workshops on many topics of interest will provide attendees with the opportunity to learn practical skills and knowledge that will help them improve their confidence and enhance self-expression.
- 4. **Health and Wellbeing:** Engaging in arts and music has been shown to reduce stress levels, and participation in mindfulness and movement workshops can improve overall wellbeing of attendees.
- 5. **Economic Impact:** The festival would inject significant money into the local economy through tourism, vendor sales, and increased business for local accommodations and restaurants.
- 6. **Environmental Awareness:** Educating attendees on sustainable practices could result in eco-friendly habits among participants, leading to a significant reduction in their collective carbon footprint.
- 7. **Creative Expression:** Providing a platform for over 100 artists and musicians can lead to the discovery of new talent and gives performers the potential to secure further work as a result.
- 8. **Educational Opportunities:** With workshops covering: sustainable building, music, dance, movement, health and wellbeing, nature and wildlife, and more, participants can gain skills that will lead to an increase in adopting sustainable practices at home, contributing to long-term benefits.
- 9. **Inspiration and Motivation:** Surveys from similar festivals indicate that 60-70% of attendees feel inspired to pursue new projects or hobbies, which could lead to the initiation of hundreds of new creative endeavors and community initiatives.

A true story:

While driving a truck with GrassRoots sound gear from NY to NC our driver was pulled into the weigh station at the Virginia state line, when asked about what he was hauling the driver informed the VA State Trooper it was Finger Lakes GrassRoots Festival equipment, the officer then told him, "I have been married for over ten years with my wife I met attending the GrassRoots festival!" Well no further questions were asked and our driver continued on his way...



About Alachua County & Comparative Market Demographics

Alachua County as well as having a vibrant music and arts scene is home to the University of Florida and the City of Gainesville and has a very similar demographic to both Tompkins County in New York State and Orange County in North Carolina which are the home markets to the successful Finger Lakes GrassRoots Festival and Shakori Hills GrassRoots Festival.

Alachua County has 270,000 residents and so is approx 2.5 times the size of Tompkins County and while the Shakori Hills GrassRoots Festival in North Carolina is very close to two major urban centers, the Triangle and the Triad, Alachua County and the Wildflowers Music Park has no such competing influences to the attention of possible audience members for a GrassRoots Festival, which makes it more similar to the market in Tompkins County, NY and possibly an easy to reach audience. With an expected similar market penetration to that of Tompkins County and with 2.5 times the size, the audience potential, with the same degree of market share, is also 2.5 times the size. Similarities also exist regionally, being that Jacksonville, Tampa and Saint Petersburg are all within an easy drive. A full comparison of market demographics is in the appendix. The festival attendances at GrassRoots festivals are approximately 15,000 at the Finger Lakes in Trumansburg, NY and 7,500 for both the Spring and Fall Shakori Hills in

North Carolina. With the larger site and population for a Wildflowers GrassRoots Festival in Alachua County, we believe an attendance of 20,000 or more is possible within three to five years.

A note of interest on festival potential is the success of the Hullaween festival event at the Suwannee Music Park 72 miles to the North West of Gainesville where the attendance grew from a first year of 4,000 to 8,000 in the next year, to 34,000 in its third year. 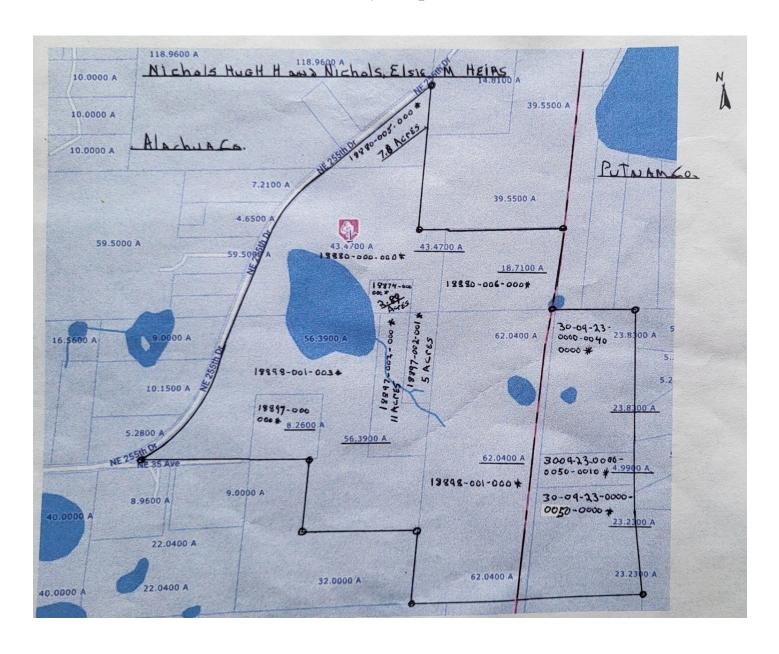

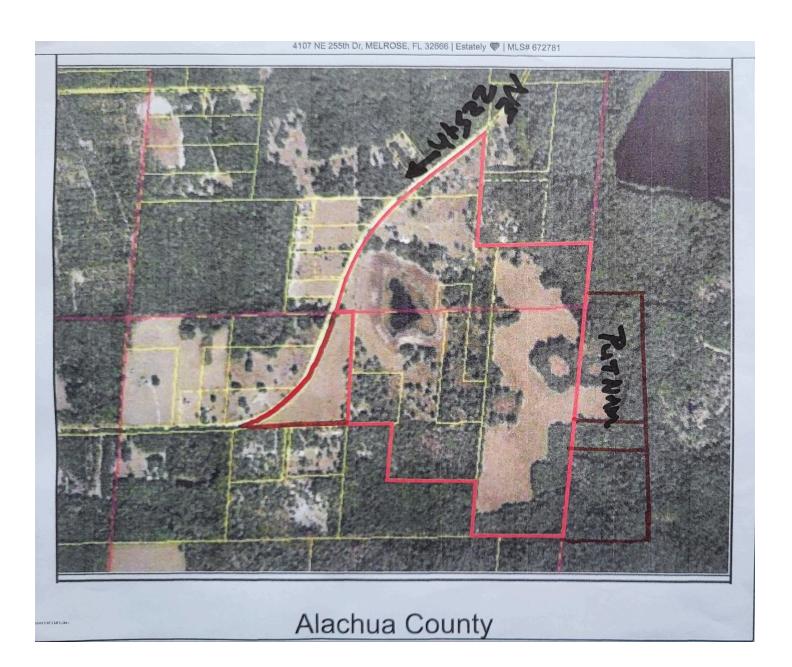

Co-founder of the Shakori Hills GrassRoots Festival. Co-founder the Virginia Key GrassRoots Festival. Co-founder and former member of the GRF host band Donna the Buffalo. Original and active member of the old-time string band Bubba George, which has opened every Finger Lakes GrassRoots Festival since its inception. Leed Designer and build team coordinator of the GRF mobile main stage and Grand Stand Stage, Designer and builder of the all analog PA systems currently in use at the GrassRoots Festivals. Designed and supervised the implementation of the site plans for the GrassRoots Festivals. Inventor, designer and builder of the novel vacuum tube based analog amplifiers used in Grassroots sound reinforcement systems, and Level I certified Tensegrity instructor.

Recording Artist, Presenter, Promoter, Producer, Musician, Songwriter for over thirty years. Co-founded the Ithaca Performing Arts Center, Inc. which saved the Historic State Theatre in Ithaca NY from the wrecking ball. Served as Managing Director/Director of Development presenting; David Byrne, Phillip Glass, The Cowboy Junkies, Jimmy Cliff, Malhatini and the Mahotella Queens, Wu Tang Clan, Del McCoury Band, and over 200 others. Co-founded the Finger Lakes CleanWaters Initiative, Inc. to save the pristine waters of NYS from industrial interests. Executive producer of the anti-fracking concert that spawned the film "Dear Governor Cuomo", with Natalie Merchant, John Medeski, Mellissa Leo, Mark Ruffalo, Joan Osbourne and many others. Managed Keith Secola and secured his interview on "Fresh Air with Terry Gross". Invited presenter to Farm Aid in Saratoga Springs, NY. Presented Brain Actuated Music and Light at SXSW and in Weimar Germany. Expertise in Human Machine interfaces.

Aubrey Griffith-Zill, Living Arts Collective, Founder, Co-Director

A seasoned movement artist, educator, steward of innovation spaces and creative ecosystems with over two decades of experience who brings a dynamic passion for the arts to the Shakori Hills Community Arts Center board. Born and raised in NC she deeply connects with the region's cultural fabric, nurturing an appreciation for the ever-changing human experience while fostering connection and reverence for nature and the land. For many years, Aubrey has been sharing her expertise by teaching and guiding intergenerational dances, musical, and movement practices on these cherished grounds while honoring its significance as ancestral territory of the Sissipahaw, Haw, Shakori, and Haw First Nations.

Richard Gregory-Allen, PhD Applied Mathematics, MIT, 83

Before Richard's senior year at Austin College (BA Physics, BA Mathematics, 78), he traveled to the Ministry of Communications' Central Telecom facility in Moscow and to an ITT Intelsat earth station near Lviv, Ukraine as Electrospace Systems Inc.'s sole representative on a field repair mission for 3 racks of satellite telecommunications gear and computer systems. After graduation from MIT, he joined the Physical Oceanography department at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution where he also took up playing fiddle

with the Woods Hole Folk Orchestra. His research at WHOI involved the study of thermoclinic solitary waves and he fielded a doppler sonar experiment to study them at sea. This led to many oceanographic cruises including a 10-week coast-to-coast transit of the North Pacific at 24° N (San Diego to Nagasaki). During that time, he developed an integrated navigation system originally designed to augment his celestial navigation skills for use in his offshore sailing navigation role.

Richard co-founded Laser Plot Inc. - a marine electronics company manufacturing integrated navigation systems and a CD-ROM library of US & international marine charts. Richard was the inventor and developer of their product ChartNav and their Sea-D database.
