



Mercury Reduction Program

Protecting public health and our environment through mercury education, collection, and reduction programs.

Mercury is a metal found in a liquid state at room temperature. Mercury appears as a silvery liquid that is most well-known for its use in thermometers. Mercury is a **neurotoxin** in humans that affects the **brain, spinal cord, kidneys, and liver**. Young children and women who are or could become pregnant are most at risk. Mercury poisoning can result from exposure to water contaminated with mercury, inhalation of mercury vapors, or from ingesting mercury.


Dispose mercury-containing products in a safe manner

Protect yourself and others!
Wrap up mercury-containing items in a sealed plastic container or double bag materials in sealed sandwich bags.

Product	Description	What to Do
Thermometer	Silver liquid in tube	Bring to a Thermometer Drop Off Location (see below)
Alkaline Batteries	Bought before 1990 (check expiration Date)	Acceptable to dispose of in the trash
Thermostat	A non-electric dial-type model for regulation of temperature	
Fluorescent Lights	A long or curved light bulb in the shape of a tube	
Mercurochrome	An outdated antiseptic for cuts and scrapes	
Certain Maze Toys	Older versions of maze-type toys may contain mercury	Take to the Marathon County Solid Waste Department for safe disposal. You will need to make an appointment at: (715) 446-3101 Extension 100
Light up or Noisemaking Shoes	Produced between 1991 and 1994 these shoes could contain mercury	
Chemistry Sets	Certain chemistry sets could contain mercury	Typically, residents are able to dispose of these materials without fee, but businesses may need to pay a fee for disposal.
Vials/Jars of Mercury	Small containers of mercury that could have been used for ceremonial purposes, as jewelry, or for display
