The project, in its final approval stages before construction, calls for construction of a power station downstream of the unused Chicopee Falls dam.

The Swift River Co. earlier signed a 30-

year contract with the city, giving the company access to the property where the station, capable of producing 8.8 million kilowatt hours of electricity per year, is to

be constructed.

The conditions are expected to include prior knowledge of what materials will be excavated from the river bed and where these materials will be deposited, as well

as a request for submission of a state lab report.

The report being compiled is designed to describe what these materials are and to state whether they may pose danger to the environment or public when unearthed. Commission members are to hold a brief

before presenting them to officials of the Swift company. Company plans call for selling the electricity produced to the Wareham-based Commonwealth Electric Co.
