"It is expected the added mission of the base will require further land-takings for runway extensions, communication sites and further ammunition and safety zones," Col. Hewitt wrote. He added that another directive calling for taking of about 140 acres in Cooley Brook watershed can be expected by the city soon.

The city will lose direct ownership of 80 acres and by easement, 60 acres, when the second phase of land-taking proceedings is completed.
