June 26th

**The Lynton and Barnstaple Railway** was a narrow-gauge passenger railway which ran from Barnstaple to Lynton. The line opened in 1898 and closed in 1935. The Lynton & Barnstaple Railway Trust are now running steam trains on a one-mile section of the line from Woody Bay Station to a temporary halt at Killington Lane. It is a major tourist attraction on Exmoor. The Trust have ambitious plans to extend the line.

The first half of **Mike Pearce's** illustrated talk looks at the period up to 1935. The second half focuses on the revived line and the Trust's plans for the future.

In the early days of steam, it was rare for locomotives of an individual Railway Company to stray from their lines. Some interchange trials did take place in the early years of the 20th Century on a somewhat local basis. On formation of the Big Four some more well-known exchanges took place and some engines went abroad usually for publicity purposes. On formation of BR there were the well-known Interchange Trials of 1948. Also, Cross London freights and Enthusiast Specials.'

**John Fissler** presents **Return of Steam to the Looe Branch**

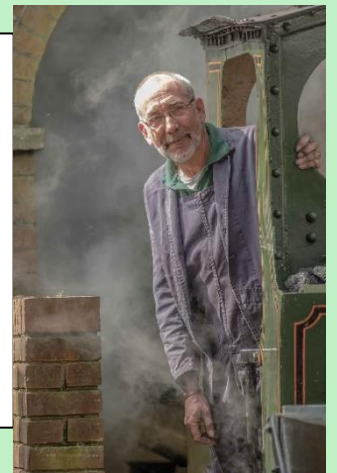
49 years after steam operation ceased on the Cornish branch to Looe steam hauled specials were arranged, featuring Dennis Howells' 0-6-0PT No. 9466, in September 2010 as part of the GWR 175th celebrations. Then in 2012 the newly restored GWS' steam railmotor no. 93 also ran on the branch. We take a look at some of these and associated workings plus regular movements. Signalling on the line is also featured.

He started as a Traction and Rolling Stock Engineering Apprentice at Eastleigh Works in September 1967. His career has taken him to Perth, Glasgow and thence to York as the Eastern Region Training Engineer. An assignment to manage the closure of Stratford Major Depot was followed by joining the Eurostar engineering team finishing as the British engineering manager in Paris. Consultancies followed on LUL, Angel Trains leasing company, Star LRT Malaysia, and Northeast line Singapore. Once 'retired' he joined the NYMR heritage line where he now is a volunteer Traction Inspector.
