In May, the membership will be busy building beautiful baskets for the silent auction. Newcomers to the Garden Club are invited and urged to participate in this special event. It is an excellent way to meet other members. This fundraiser is also a family event, with mothers and grandmothers gathering with their little ones for the festivities. Lunch is delicious and the auction bidding is fun!



For almost 50 years now, the Garden Club has been a powerful force for the beautification of our subdivision. Since our founding, the Club has donated, planted, and maintained many trees and flower beds in the esplanades and highly visible areas of Sugar Creek. The Mothers' Garden and the Russell Garden, as well as park benches, are examples of the contributions that our club has enjoyed making. Additionally, the Garden Club awards two scholarships a year to horticultural graduate students, and contributes to the holiday spirit by providing decorations at all entrances.

The Penny Pines Project was started in 1941 by a San Francisco Sports-Women's Association. They sent pines to be planted in Trinity Forest in Northern California. The planting costs were covered by the Forest Service Appropriations. At that time, seedlings could be purchased for 1 cent each. Approximately 680 trees could be planted in one acre. For \$68, ten acres could be purchased and planted. Eventually the funds donated to plant trees exceeded the funds in the Forestry budget.

In 1964, the original agreement was rewritten to provide funds for the reforestation rather than just seedlings. Over the years, more than a million dollars have been given to the Penny Pines Project, buying 27 million seedlings and replanting 88.00 acres, and benefiting 42 states and 80 National Forests.



Various clubs in the National Garden Club have donated over \$75,000. Many clubs in Texas have donated last year including <u>US!</u> Remember when Dr. Heather White spoke at our November Meeting? Well...she donated \$68 in our club's name from her personal proceeds of speaking. We then had a motion from the floor to donate another \$204 (\$68 x 3) to complete the entire North, South, East and West regions. Annette Deitch and I will present the above award to Ginnie Russell after this weather blows out of here.

I know I have been long-winded...again! If I can't see you regularly, I still need to talk and visit with you. Try to make the meeting in March; I'll be telling you the story about Casey and her acute appendectomy. Thank goodness she has a helicopter mother! I will also give you an update from Holland and the the Dulles Spirit Card Sales. And...without a doubt, I will continue to Bloom Where I am Planted."



HOUSTON FEDERATION OF GARDEN CLUBS


The Federation has been holding its monthly meetings both in person and on Zoom. They meet at First Christian Church, 1601 Sunset Blvd, Houston.
