Hello beloved members and friends of Epworth UMC!

Sitting here once again in the chemo chair, and feeling so blessed to be in ministry with all of you. I've been thinking back over the summer and how much we got to do together, providing desperately needed food to folks in our community, working together with the Fallon Food Hub and so many great people, finding ways to reach out to each other and to our neighbors in new ways. We are once again in kind of a state of unknowing, getting ready to get back to some version of "normal" but not quite knowing what that should look like, or what the next weeks and months will bring. It makes me excited to think what surprises God has in store for us, and how God will use us all to bring hope and Good News to our community and beyond.

I was talking with a friend of the church just this morning, and she shared with me a powerful sermon she heard recently called "Jesus Happens" by the Rev Dr Curran Reichert. She sent me the link, and WOW Curran is so much fun! Before she was in ministry she sang in "musicals, TV, and movies" according to the church website, and she has a stunningly beautiful voice. In her sermon, she says that Jesus happens, and there is nothing we can do to stop it, or prevent it, or ruin it. No matter how imperfectly we do life, Jesus happens. No matter where we are or what we are doing, Jesus happens. No matter how flawed our understanding, Jesus happens. And keeps happening

I find that an incredibly comforting thought. Maybe instead of trying to change things or fix things or invent things, we should "stock up our spiritual shelves, and be ready for when Jesus happens."

Yeah. Maybe. Probably.

Stocking up our spiritual shelves, so to speak, is always the first thing. Jesus made sure to do that, taking time away to pray before and between and after doing anything else. Putting some focus on our spiritual health every day taps into the Source of our hope, and joy, and peace, and spiritual energy. It enables us to be more fully present and wise in our relationships, in our church, in our community, in our own lives. And inevitably, without fail, Jesus shows up. Like he did with the disciples, showing up out of nowhere and "scaring the daylights out of everyone" (that's from Curran, too ③), Jesus happens. He surprises us with comfort, love, challenge, and miraculous grace.

In our lectio divina prayer services on Friday nights (before I had to suspend them for awhile...hoping to get back to them soon), we considered in our prayers what God might be calling us to do, or be, or change. When Jesus happens, sometimes we respond in one of those ways. Other times, we are just grateful. Praying that Jesus happens for you today, beloved.

HERO Club Update

Thank you to everyone who ate spaghetti at Ana's Café and bid on auction items and donated to the HERO Club fundraiser. We raised over \$2300! Thank you!

At a recent March 28 Church Council meeting, some church members expressed some concern and had some questions about the relationship between HERO Club and the church, and how that all works. We thought maybe everyone would appreciate some clarity about that, so here it is the story:

HERO Club is one of 3 excellent afterschool programs in Fallon. The idea was conceived in partnership with the Grange – a faith-based program of family, community, and agriculture – to create a program that would focus on drug abuse prevention, recreation, and tutoring to improve school performance. The program has been funded by a grant through Churchill Community Coalition and SAPTA (Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Agency). Thanks to the hard work of Steve Russell and the Grange, in 2019 we won a grant of @\$40,000 to fund the program for a year. It is a reimbursable grant, meaning

that we have to spend the money first and then submit receipts and get reimbursed. In May of 2019, our Church Council discussed all of this and voted to approve the program. We secured extra insurance for the program through our church insurance company, Berger and Jones, (that extra cost paid for by HERO Club) and we were off and running.

Per Berger and Jones, we also structured the program such that HERO Club staff are considered Epworth employees, and all HERO Club money and payroll expenses are shown as distinct part of our own budget. HERO Club also pays a substantial portion of our utilities, internet, and phone service. It takes a month or two to get reimbursed, which is no fun, but thankfully --

because of your faithful giving – we have had enough of a cushion in our checking account to be able to manage HERO Club expenses for that first month or two of the year before reimbursements begin without dipping into our savings. Woo hoo!

Thanks to the success of the program, and the increased need for after school programming due to the complex Covid scheduling, our grant was renewed for the 2020-2021 school year. In cooperation with the school district, we increased our hours to 7:30am-6:00pm, with kids coming and going all day with their different schedules. Transportation has been

tricky, so some of the pickups and drop-offs have fallen to HERO staff members. Unfortunately Berger and Jones does not provide liability insurance for individual drivers, and so HERO Club has secured permissions from parents for staff to drive, using the drivers' own personal liability insurance. We are still exploring better transportation options.

Because of these increased hours of operation, our grant funds were used up much faster than planned! So we researched the Payroll Protection Plan funds provided by the US Government's CARE Act, applied, and secured \$10,995. On March 28, we held a special church council meeting to explain and vote on the use of those funds, and voted to approve it. We are now in the process of applying for a second loan (PPP funds are technically loans, forgiven when we show that we have spent them strictly for payroll and overhead expenses) of another \$10,995. These funds, plus the remainder from our grant and some fundraising, will take us successfully through the end of the school year. Yay!

And now, parents are asking us to stay open all summer long! We will see what we can do.

We hope this answers your questions. HERO is a great program, run well thanks to the hard work of Steve Russell and Lorri Freeman (our director.) It provides a badly needed service to our community at a very low or no cost, AND it is a wonderful opportunity for us to connect with kids and parents.
