The Pastor's Corner

Happy August, members and friends of Epworth UMC!

As I sit in my backyard, enjoying a garden some wonderful person before me planted, watching tiny little hummingbirds and giving thanks for a garden that is FINALLY producing, and intermittently hollering at my dogs to stop barking at every person who walks by, I can't help but feel incredibly thankful. For all of God's creation, for big dumb dogs who steal my tomatoes whenever I'm not looking, for neighbors and friends, for this awesome community I get to live and work in. I feel so, so blessed to be in ministry with all of you!

I came across this quote this morning, by a Carmelite monk who lived in Spain in the 1500s:

"And I saw the river over which every soul must pass to read the kingdom of Heaven, and the name of that river was Suffering;

And I saw a boat which carries souls across the river, and the name of that boat was Love."

St John of the Cross

St John of the Cross is considered one of the world's most important Christian theologians. His father Gonzalo's family, wealthy silk merchants, disowned Gonzalo when he fell in love with and married John's mother, Catalina, who was a poor lower-class orphan. John was thus raised in poverty, extreme at times, but surrounded by love and faith. He pledged his life to God as a young man in the Carmelite religious order, and became part of a reform movement with Teresa of Avila who sought a return to purity, simplicity, and greater devotion to God within their order. I don't know what the specific circumstances were at the time that led folks like Teresa and John to see the need for reform, but we all know that the best human efforts can become corrupted and need to be recalibrated. Refocused. Reclaimed. We also know that when people come along who seek to turn us away from our selfish, greedy, prideful, hateful, harmful desires and activities, those people tend to meet severe opposition: like so many other courageous and faithful Christians over the centuries – like Jesus himself – John was imprisoned for months, starved and beaten for his efforts, until he managed to escape.

Much of John's writings concern the love of God for us in Jesus Christ, our soul's longing for God, and the joy we experience in finding God. It is almost all poetry, including *Spiritual Canticle*, which is a poetic retelling of the Song of Songs as the love of God for God's bride, the church and each individual in it. His most famous writing is *The Dark Night of the Soul*, about finding oneself in despair and spiritual darkness and being led back to light and joy in God.

I find it noteworthy that so many of those who truly dedicated their lives to fasting and prayer over the centuries have come to the conclusion that love is the centerpiece of our faith. We say it all the time, we know the hundreds of scriptures that say it, and we even believe it on some level, but too often we let the idea of love become abstract and flat. Even worse, in our polarized culture the idea of love is met with eye-rolling impatience for it's Hallmark sickly sweetness. But this is what church is for. This is what faith is for. This is what Jesus was born, and lived, and died, and was resurrected for. Love. In i's deep, real, complex, self-sacrificing, courageous truth.

The church is a training camp in how to love. Or at least, it should be. How to love God, how to love each other, how to love strangers and even enemies. The first step is to know, really know that we are **BE**loved...rejoiced over, forgiven, wanted, known, deeply loved. The next steps are to become healed and stronger, by dedicating ourselves to prayer, worship, generosity, and service. And then, as we continue to grow in wisdom, humility, and love, to be the light for others to see by...the voice that prepares the way of the Lord...the heart for God to love by.

At what stage of discipleship do you find yourself today? Because that's what this is called, this lifetime of seeking and growing closer to God...this lifetime of receiving the abundant life that Jesus promises. Are you in need of a reminder of how deeply you are loved by God? Are you feeling stuck, or stagnant, and so needing to re-dedicate yourself to God in prayer, worship, study, or service? Are you sharing God's love with friend and stranger, by word or – even better – by action? Wherever you are on this journey, I pray that you know the love of God that carries you through it. I pray that you continue to learn the ways of love, and live them out, so that others will know the love of God that carries them, too. This is what paradise is made of, beloved.

Katherine T. Parker is a missionary with the General Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church serving as a Health and Community Transformation Advisor with the United Mission to Nepal (UMN).



Katherine is passionate about engag-

ing community groups in participatory research about their environment and in a process of identifying and linking values to action. She believes that through telling the stories of our lives, and exploring the stories of our faith, we are better able to articulate our shared values that form a foundation for us to engage in collective action across cultural and other divisive barriers towards a world where every person can live to his or her fullest potential. She is currently engaged in a project with school- and church-based youth and mother's groups in three remote villages in western Nepal.

In Nepal since 2013, Katherine was previously in Cambodia with the Community Health and Agricultural Development Program of the Methodist Mission there. She has been a missionary since 2007 and was a mission intern for three years beginning in 2000 with the Asian Rural Institute in Japan and Practical Farmers of Iowa in the USA.

Native to California, Katherine comes from a family with deep roots in United Methodism on the West Coast of the United States. Active in the church since childhood, from a young age Katherine saw the church as a community of faith where we are spiritually fed so that we can serve in the world. She is the part of the fifth generation in her family to serve through the Methodist Connection and is honored that the church has sent her to be part of this global ministry.
