Hello church family and friends!

So here I am, with my morning coffee and my goofy dogs, on my way to spend the morning in the chemo chairs for an immunotherapy session, and I'm thinking about communication. The ways we connect with each other, and with God. The things that make connecting harder, even as we yearn for it.

I know some of us are feeling a bit disconnected from each other and from your church, even as Covid restrictions are easing. For myself, pre-Covid I was doing in-person ministry every day but Wednesday (that's the day I try to reserve for personal sabbath time), either in the office or attending community meetings or visiting folks or going to choir practice or leading Pub Theology. Covid really upended all of that. No more spontaneous hellos during office hours, no more coffee dates or home visits, no more in-person community meetings. Instead, hours and hours and hours spent learning and teaching and using new technology to enable us to worship and serve God separately but together somehow.

Thank God it's getting back to normal, but it is slow and hesitant really, at church and in our community. Fully half of our church members don't feel ready just yet to come back to church in person. Every other pastor in town I have spoken with in the last couple of months has said the same, and we have worried and prayed together about it. Even Adam Hamilton, who pastors the largest Methodist church in the country, writes that only 20-30% of their 20,000 members are coming to worship in person.

At Epworth, it isn't just Covid. Laura and I were talking the other day about the many beloved church members who have passed away in the last few years. So many wonderful, beloved people. Every time we walk into the sanctuary we can feel their presence, but also their absence. We are grieving together, all of us. And that can make us withdraw from each other, too, maybe more than we realize.

On top of all of that, your pastor has been less available during cancer treatment. I pooh-poohed it while it was happening, but it really limited what I was able to do, physically and mentally. It's serious stuff, that chemotherapy. You have all been incredibly kind and supportive, but I know it has been frustrating for you, too.

So here's what I suggest, especially if you are feeling a bit lost or frustrated or disconnected. It's what works for me, and I think it will help you, too.

First, pray for your church leaders. You'll find their names in every church bulletin, on our website, and on the last page of this newsletter. Pray God's goodness and grace on them. Pray for everyone else in church, too, by name. We will be providing you a list of current members this Sunday in worship, and by email. You might even like to take one person or family at a time and focus your prayers on them all week.

Then, extend each other and yourself a great big measure of grace. Offer understanding, forgiveness, and encouragement. Directly if you can, but even just in your own heart.

And then, participate in worship, either in person or online. Comment online by saying hello to your fellow church members, even if you came to worship in person. It is essential to our spiritual health, not just to worship but to worship TOGETHER. It will do wonders for your own spirit, and for your church family.

We look forward to the day when we all can be together again!

# THE EXCITING WORLD OF CHURCH GOVERNANCE! Or, How Stuff Gets Done at Epworth UMC

At this past Sunday's meeting of our Church Council, some questions and concerns came up regarding our different committees, our Church Council, where to bring questions and concerns, and how best folks can know what is happening at our church. So! Here is a little explainer that we hope will be helpful.

Some years ago, in response to low attendance at Council meetings and folks' feeling that our traditional administrative structure wasn't working, Pastor Dawn introduced the idea of something called Single (or Simple) Board Governance. This is a new-ish way of ordering the life of the church, whose goals are: 1) better communication and cooperation between ministry teams, by meeting as one group rather than several separate entities; 2) improved efficiency in decision-making, because all members are in the same room at the same time; and 3) fewer meetings overall, to free people's time for discipleship and mission. It is approved in the 2016 Book of Discipline, under paragraphs 243 and 247.2 (you can find a BOD in the church office).

Here's how it works. Your Council meets every other month, and is open to everyone. We still have trustees (whose main job is to care for the building and grounds), a Staff-Parish Relations Committee (who care for the pastor and staff, and help facilitate communication between leadership and the rest of the church), and a finance team, but instead of meeting separately and reporting to the Council, we all meet together as one cohesive team. We all discuss building concerns and solutions together, we address the church's concerns and needs together, we discuss and vote on financial matters together, we plan and vision for the future together. Every fall, we review the pastor's performance together, approve salaries together, and review our yearly reports.

Separate from the Council meetings are the teams that do the work of the church, and implement the decisions of the Council. The Finance team pays the bills and manages the budget, the Trustees with the Levites take care of the building and grounds, ministry teams do their ministries...you get the idea. Some meet separately, too, when needed.

At our Church Conference on Oct 5 2018, with our DS Blake Busick presiding, your church discussed, voted on, and approved this new way of doing business. We have made some adjustments since then, and will continue to adjust and improve the way we do business as we see the need. Your suggestions help us do that!

I feel as though I don't know what is happening in the life of the church. What do I do? After a year and a half of Covid craziness, and because this wide-open way of doing business is so new to us, it is natural to feel this way. We sympathize! You can find out all kinds of stuff by reading these newsletters, coming to Council meetings, and coming to worship. You can call any one of our church leaders, they are excellent people to ask! And of course, you can always call the church office and speak to Laura, or call Pastor Dawn there or on her cell phone, 775-671-5553. She would love to hear from you!

I have a concern and I'm not sure who to talk to. What do I do? Your concerns and even complaints show that you love your church! Your church leaders welcome them as opportunities to serve you and God better. Direct communication is always best, and most faithful, so the first thing to do is reach out to the pastor or one of your church leaders. That enables us to work together to find a solution. Talking it over with a friend can be helpful, too, just don't let it end there (or let it become gossip!). Your concerns matter, and deserve constructive attention. ©
