As I sit down to write this morning, looking forward to light summer chores and life that needs doing, I find myself so thankful to be a part of such a vital, praying church. My own time in prayer, with our shared joys and concerns that Kathy Reynolds so faithfully collects and Laura sends out for us, is filled with gratitude just to be in a place full of people who care for each other and trust in God like this. And that we are teaching our little ones to pray, too! Their young handwriting so earnest on the prayer request cards just warms my heart so much. Friends, there is absolutely NOTHING more important than this.

I am on my way to the chemo chairs this morning, and though I am such an introvert that I rarely talk to anyone but the nurse while I'm there, I pray that I can carry all of the love of our church and our shared faith into that space. I am incredibly blessed that my own cancer is trivial compared with so many, and was caught so early that my treatment is short and bearable. Chemo itself is complete for me after only one 5 month round, and now I just have 6 weeks of radiation and immunotherapy for another 6 months or so (that's the treatment today, in the chemo chairs). Your prayers for me have been powerful, friends, and your constant thoughtfulness and help has been deeply humbling and life-affirming. I can't tell you how grateful I am to God, and to all of you. Send your prayers to all of those in cancer treatment, in all its terrible forms, and to all those who care for us in our illness, and I will carry them with me wherever I go!



Steve Russell, the program has also secured money from the Paycheck Protection Program, which helped it stay afloat during the Covid shutdowns. All of that money is funneled through Epworth's accounts (this at the advice of our insurance company), and all of the Club's expenses – including their portion of insurance costs and utilities -- are paid in full by those funds. This program is a great gift to our neighbors who need a great place for their kids to go while they work, and to our community as a whole as we work to build healthy, happy kids with a great future. ## An Update from Your Finance Team

Your church is in great shape financially, thanks to your faithful giving and the management of your finance team. #### What the UMC is Doing: The Abundant Health Initiative

A portion of every UMC church's giving goes toward UMC ministries around the country and around the world. We call that part of our giving "apportionments" or our "Conference tithe." That money does a bunch of good things: it finances all kinds of educational and leadership opportunities for pastors and laity, and our local and worldwide conferences; provides disaster assistance and financial help to struggling churches all over the world; plants new churches worldwide; pays the administrative costs of UMCOR (our renowned disaster relief agency), our global missionary system, our bishops and district superintendents, and more; and helps fund and provide advertising for countless ministries of mercy and justice all over the country and the world. It is incredibly important, and part of our responsibility as members of the United Methodist Church. **Ideally, each church contributes 10% of their income to this fund.** Epworth historically has struggled to meet that ideal without going into the red, but we are working toward that goal!

The Abundant Health Initiative is one of the ministries funded in large part by our Conference Tithe. You can find out more at <u>https://www.umc.org/en/how-we-serve/promoting-health-and-wholeness</u>. From that page:

Because we care about the wellbeing of all people, health is a major focus of the work of The United Methodist Church. Together, we combat diseases of poverty such as malaria, HIV/AIDS and tuberculosis; we provide health education, advocacy and infrastructure; and we continue our more than 160-year history of being a key provider of healthcare through the hospitals, clinics and mission centers we have operated across Africa. Through its Abundant Health initiative, now the church has achieved its goal to reach 1 million children with lifesaving and health-promoting measures.

"Our priority is to ensure that no child dies from a preventable cause," says Dr Olusimbo Ige, Director of Global Health. "Globally, those are birth complications, infectious diseases like malaria, diarrhea, and pneumonia [so those are] the priority areas that we target." Worldwide, 6 million children under 5 die from preventable illnesses like these. The scope of work is broad. We work to prevent malaria with initiatives like Imagine No Malaria that gathers and distributes mosquito netting, and treat it by funding and distributing the best modern treatments. We work to control HIV/AIDS with education and modern medicine. We work to ensure maternal health with education, healthy food during pregnancy, clean and safe places to give birth, and medical and birthing professionals to ensure babies are born without complications. We help educate people in healthy practices, educate and equip medical professionals, and fund clinics to prevent and treat many illnesses.

In the US, our scope of work also includes preventing drug abuse and childhood obesity, which has more than quadrupled in the past 30 years. "Obesity predisposes children to heart disease, diabetes, cancers, and things like that so we are encouraging healthy nutrition, increasing physical activity, helping to support mental health, supporting substance abuse prevention," says Dr Ige. The Abundant Health Initiative provides grants and resources to local churches who want to be an active part of improving health in their local communities. "These are activities we encourage the church to participate in at the local level, the family level, the community level."
