Kitchen Table Worship

This week, we come to what has always been for me the most powerful part of Peter's story. He has been ever-present in each of the four Gospels, even in John's telling that focuses so much on the "unnamed disciple" tradition names John. Peter is the one who tried walking on water, who identified Jesus as the Messiah, and who Jesus called "the Rock on whom I will build my church." This past Sunday, we saw Peter fail catastrophically when – after all that he had seen, and all that Jesus had seen in him – he denies even knowing Jesus, at the moment when Jesus needed him the most. This week, we meet Jesus and Peter on the beach, after all of that, and see what Jesus does.

As you prepare your heart for worship this week, at your kitchen table or in your comfy living room chair or out on the porch or wherever, you might like to read the scripture for this week in John 21. If you're able, you might like to include water in your preparations for worship: bring a glass or a bowl of water to your table, or spend a moment in prayer outside near a bird bath or a pond, or take a drive to somewhere you can see and hear the river or a lake. Bring to mind Peter and his friends and family, whose livelihood depended on water...whose New Life depended on being born by water and the Spirit...and how ours does too.

Saturday Mornings with the Young at Heart



A Note about Music

For many of us, music is a big part of our worship and a major way we sing praises and express our faith in God. In this time of uncertainty, with all of the associated feelings of helpless frustration, a song like "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" has particular meaning. It was written by Elisha Hoffman, a Presbyterian minister in Pennsylvania, and his musician friend Anthony Showalter, and was first published in 1887. It was inspired by two of Hoffman's students who wrote telling him that their wives had died, and was initially meant to be sung at funerals to remind mourners of God's loving comfort and help in their sorrow. Since then, it is sung sometimes like a soft lullaby, or often with triumphant joy and great fun. If you're able to search the internet, you can find a wonderful version by American modern folk singer Iris DeMent, which was used as the basis of the award-winning musical score of the 2010 remake of True Grit.

Reflections, from United Methodist Men by Bishop James E. Swanson Sr.

"I ran across an online resource called 'The Good Men Project.' I'm assuming (as usual) that I'm way behind on accessing this resource. Please do not read this as an endorsement of this project, but, I do endorse the strong belief that men need to engage in conversations about a variety of issues that influence how they live and interact with this world directly and indirectly. There is no place where that is more needed than in the church.

"Men should be involved in a wide range of topics that have the church's attention today. When I say "men," I'm including a wide audience of men who have been left out of these conversations.



"The Good Men Project claims to have begun by simply asking men to tell their stories without prejudging the merits of their lives or their stories. That's where we should begin. We should listen to a person's stories without attaching our biases and without adding our personal stances or opinions. Before we attempt to engage in conversations with others, we need to listen to the wise counsel of Dr. Anthony Fauci, the lead doctor in our struggle with the COVID-19 coronavirus. He said, "You don't make the timeline, the virus makes the timeline."

"We can help set the climate for meaningful and informative conversations with men by following some principles:

- Listen.
- Don't prejudge their statements, comments or even their body language.
- Ask open-ended questions.
- Invite men from outside normal circles to be a part of these conversations.
- Find ways to share what you heard even if you didn't agree or you downright disliked what they said.
- Ask yourself this question, "Do I really want to listen and learn?"

"This pandemic has reinforced for me the fact that we're inextricably tied together and we can't escape the commonality of our faith. Men need to be encouraged to talk about that. If not now, when?"
