After the Love Feast on Thursday, consider taking Good Friday to fast and pray. You might consider a fast from TV, or recreational computer or phone use. You might fast from meat, or sugar, or all but the simplest foods. If it is safe for your health, you might skip a meal, or have nothing but water all day. Whatever you choose, let it guide you into deeper prayer. At noon, join Bishop Carcano for a special Good Friday video worship service (you can find that on our Conference website at www.cnumc.org). At 3pm, join Pastor Dawn on Facebook Live for beautiful music, prayer, and scripture readings from the Epworth sanctuary. Watch with us live, or the video will be available afterward for you to watch at whatever time works best for you, on Epworth's new YouTube channel.

Easter Sunday, April 12 at 9:30am.

Surround yourself with the stuff of Easter or whatever brings you joy, put on your Easter bonnet, and celebrate the Risen Christ! We will just do it in the same way we have been, at 9:30am on KVLV AM 980, and on Facebook Live. And then, open your front door, step out onto the porch or run right out into the street and shout "CHRIST IS RISEN!" and see who shouts back "HE IS RISEN INDEED!"


20,000 Pounds of Donated Produce!
