Hello church family!

One of the things I have made a deliberate practice of doing during this time of quarantine is to make sure I get a periodic infusion of good news. I find that it is essential to my own mental and spiritual health, and helps me to keep God in the forefront of my thoughts. It gives life to my prayers, inspiration to my time in worship, awareness of God's presence, strength to keep balance and peace of mind when bad news comes. I find it's especially helpful now, when so much is difficult and confusing and frustrating and uncertain. Things like Sean of the South, Some Good News with John Krazinski, the Upper Room daily devotional, and the Good News Network (all found online) bring much-needed laughter and happy tears. Here are some great things that are happening around the country and the world this week:

- Sand Hill Dairy, right here in Fallon, gave away hundreds of gallons of free milk last week, rather than dumping it for lack of any way to ship it where it ordinarily would go. In the midwest, Kroger Grocery Stores has bought over 50,000 gallons of milk from dairies in the same boat, and is donating it to food banks.
- Guy Fieri has raised over \$22 million to help restaurant workers, and is planning a nacho contest with Bill Murray to raise more.
- Marco's Pizza in Texas was robbed in April, and responded by putting up a sign in their store and on Facebook that they would be glad to provide food, for free, for anyone who is struggling.
- Landlords in California and Nevada (and elsewhere, too, I'm sure) are forgiving rent payments and donating anonymously to their tenants to help them pay their other bills.
- Members of our own community are going above and beyond to support our local businesses, especially when they are overwhelmed with increased demand (woo hoo!) and confusing new processes to put in place to protect themselves and others
- Scientists in Kenya have discovered a new microbe that completely stops malaria in mosquitos. Malaria remains one of the leading causes of death in Kenya and elsewhere, so this could be world-changing.
- Quarantined musicians like Bobby Jo Valentine (who lives in California and played at Dennis' and my wedding!), casts of Broadway shows, and professional opera singers all over the country are giving free concerts online and in their neighborhoods, just for fun.

In times of trial and persecution and fear, Paul encouraged the churches he pastored to do the same: in Philippians 4, written while Paul himself was in prison, he reminds us to focus on what is good. "Do not worry about anything," he says, "but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." We don't focus on what is good in order to blind ourselves to what is NOT good. The idea is not to live behind rose-colored glasses, but rather to see clearly. We don't just pray and forget, we pray AND we give thanks for answered prayers. We don't just work to combat evil in ourselves and in the world, we look for ways God is already defeating evil and rejoice in that. We don't just focus on what we lack, or what is wrong in the world, we also give thanks for what we DO have and look for what is right. Doing so keeps our minds and hearts in the knowledge and the love of God, adding real joy to our lives while also enabling us to handle difficulty with wisdom and peace.

I pray that you have your own sources of joy, beloved. They are not just found online, but also in smiles and conversations with friends and neighbors, in music, in light exercise, in gardening, in cooking, in note-writing and gift-giving. I pray that you take note of something (or several somethings!) that brings you some happiness this week, and I would love to hear from you about it! Not only does telling it keep us wonderfully in relationship with each other, it also confirms our hope and increases our joy in the telling.

Kitchen Table Worship

This week, we continue with our series about Simon Peter and his relationship with Jesus. Things are coming to a head now, for Jesus and for the disciples. There have been miracles of healing and feeding and walking on water, shocking teachings that have confounded the disciples and enraged Jesus' enemies, and a great deal of love and care and growth. Now, they have come into Jerusalem and shared the Passover meal together, and in our passage for this week Peter makes his fateful promise: even though all others may desert you, Lord, I will not deny you. As you prepare your heart for worship this week, you might like to read the scripture passage in Matthew 26:31-35 and consider what God might have to say to you through this part of Peter's story. Might God be calling you to be more bold or unafraid, in some area of your life? More committed? Or, conversely, might God be calling you to be more patient, more humble, more teachable, less judgmental of others? Or both?

What About Drive-In Worship?
