As I sit today in the chemo chair, I am thinking of all of you and our ministry together. I pray that, wherever you are and whatever life is bringing you, that you know yourself surrounded by the love and power of God. I pray that the Holy Spirit is giving you all kinds of things to see, and hear, and touch, and taste, and do, and know that bring you peace, hope, and joy.

In the course of preparing my sermon for last week, I ran across the story of a woman named Karen Armstrong, a former Catholic nun and academic who speaks and writes about the importance of compassion. She is deeply respected around the world, has spoken in several countries including three times at the White House, and has written several books on compassion and comparative religion. I found her when I stumbled across an initiative she started in 2008, called the Charter of Compassion.

I didn't get to include her story, or the Charter, in my sermon on Sunday. But it is she who reminded me of the story of Rabbi Hillel, who (as the story goes) was once approached by a nonbeliever who said, "I will convert to your religion if you can recite its teachings while standing on one leg." Hillel stood on one leg and said, "That which is hateful to you, do not do to your neighbor. All else is commentary. Go and study it." (Incidentally, the apostle Paul was a student of Gamaliel, Hillel's grandson. Gamaliel is mentioned in Acts 5 at the Council of Jerusalem, and is the one who convinces the Sanhedrin to stop persecuting Peter and Paul and the rest, saying that they might well be opposing God himself!) Hillel and other rabbis in the Mishna affirmed that compassion is the heart of God, and the heart of the law, and that if in our study of scripture we do not find grace and compassion, then our study is incomplete and our interpretation is wrong.

The Charter of Compassion evolved and expanded a lot after Karen Armstrong proposed it in 2008. From it's beginnings in Seattle, people from over 100 countries participated in writing it, and it has now been signed by over 2 million people around the world, including the Dalai Lama, Bishop Desmond Tutu, Queen Noor of Jordan. From the Charter, community action groups have emerged around the world to foster the value of compassion, as part of an initiative called the Campaign for Compassionate Community. It sounds incredible, and includes a 4 step "toolbox" that teaches how to...well, how to change the world starting with your own neighborhood. If you'd like to read more about it, like I plan to do, we can start with their website: charterforcompassion.org. If you look, tell me what you think. Who knows, maybe it will inspire us with new ways to share the Gospel right here in Fallon. ©

friend!



Shared Resources and the Blessings of Connection

As part of the global United Methodist Church, we are extraordinarily blessed by connection with cultures and languages and expressions of faithfulness of over 12 million Christians around the world. As part of that blessing, every local church is asked to give 10% of it's income each month to the global church (called "apportionments" or the Conference tithe), to fund administration, mission and ministries around the world. Every 4 years, at General Conference, we vote on the budget that details how all of our apportionment dollars are spent. That document is REALLY long, and we weren't able to find a link to it to make it easier, but the UMC.org website is full of information about worldwide ministries that we fund together.

"United Methodists know apportionments by many names, such as "a portion meant for others" or various types of covenants — connectional, ministry share, missional giving, shared ministry and tithe.

Through the apportionments, essentially shared mission, each local church contributes a small portion of its tithes and offerings to support vital international, national and regional missions and ministries.

At any given time, this funding helps build churches, support missionaries, advocate for the underserved and marginalized, improve global health, educate leaders, resource ministries with youth, women and men, provide communication and outreach tools for local churches, and so much more. This shared giving also funds conference mission work engaged by leaders and partners within each annual conference."
