This summer we passed the five-year mark of serving through LCMS International Mission. We constantly thank God for sending us to East Africa to be a part of His mission work.

To be honest, one of the frustrations I have felt is a byproduct of the COVID lockdown, which shortened our Swahili language training in 2020. This summer I have the first real opportunity to do something about it. I am in Shinyanga, Tanzania to refresh and improve my language skills. I have a great teacher, who happens to teach English in the local Secondary School. During the day I engage people in conversation in the markets, and in the afternoon I receive formal language instruction for the six weeks I am here.
