Minister's Message:

In preparation for All Saints' Sunday, we pulled the **historic roll book** out of the safe to leaf through it. The historic roll contains the names of **every member of Southminster United Church** throughout its history. To my surprise, as I looked through the pages, I noticed that many of our regular attending folks are absent from the official roll of members.

Membership only confers two privileges, the right to vote in a congregational meeting and the eligibility to serve on the Church Council. The membership has been gracious in permitting adherents to vote in the congregational meetings. However, if you have any fond attachment for Southminster and would like to ensure you have a say in its important affairs, such as calling a new minister, or decisions about major renovations, or sales, of the property (saints preserve us), then perhaps you might consider full membership.

The United Church also requires full membership for those who serve on **Church Council**. Perhaps you might consider that as an excuse to avoid such commitments, but I will gently push back on that type of outlook. I hope that you might consider answering Jesus' call of discipleship by taking on a role with Church Council or one of its committees in the new year? We are looking for two positions specifically, one person to chair the Property Committee and attend Council of their behalf, and one person to attend the monthly board meetings of the Ecumenical Campus Ministry representing Southminster. If you want more information about discipleship opportunities serving Church Council or its committees, you may speak with Gabrielle Dumont, who chairs the Nominations Committee in her capacity as Past-Chair.

Becoming a full member of the congregation is not a difficult process. All that is required is profession of faith on a Sunday morning stating you believe in God as expressed through the Holy Trinity, and that you are committed to following the way of Jesus as his disciple.

The Manual of the United Church of Canada also states that members should have a "good understanding of the beliefs and practices of the United Church". For that reason, we are currently hosting "What We Believe" sessions once a month. We have had fun and interesting conversations over a potluck supper. You would be most welcome to join us, we're still early on. Our next session will be Thursday, November 28 at 5:30pm.

On Reformation Sunday, we remembered the many Protestant martyrs who were killed for their desire to worship God in the way they felt was right. On All Saints' Sunday, we will remember the discipleship of great saints of the past, including our own members who died over this past year. In November, we also join in civic **Remembrance Day** events, honouring those in the Armed Forces who have died in conflict. May we be grateful for our precious freedom to worship in a way that is not dictated by a government and our freedom to live out our calling to be a disciple of Jesus Christ in the way most suitable to our talents and aptitudes. We are thankful to all who gave their lives to defend our freedoms.

MEN'S FALL DINNER The Fall Dinner was a great success.



Canyon Church Camp update:

What a night! Our **George Canyon fundraising concert** on October 3 was a big success. Around 400 tickets were sold, so we made over \$10,000 towards the rebuild of camp. Watch for the official numbers in the next couple of weeks, after the last of the bills get paid. A big thank you to everyone who bought tickets, to those that volunteered, and to the Lethbridge Kinsmen who donated an additional \$60,000!! That amount will fund the complete rebuild of one camper cabin. Amazing!

Construction continued until the end of October, but the buildings are now boarded up and everything is prepared for winter. The septic tank was delayed in arriving, but it is supposed to arrive by November 1. If the snow holds off, they will install it before November 15. However, if the weather doesn't cooperate it will be installed in the spring.

All of the utility lines are now in (they are now all underground, including the electrical), and the wiring in the lodge has all been replaced with mouse-proof wiring. Additionally, they have installed 2 ceiling fans in the lodge and a couple of small heaters in the dish pit area. The boys' washroom has been gutted and they will start the installations in the spring. The old custodian quarters are also being renovated, and I can't wait to see the result! Stay tuned to hear about all the other changes that will be happening.

Construction will begin again when Red Rock Canyon Road reopens in the spring – likely in late April or early May. In the meantime, our fundraising committee will continue to raise the rest of the funds needed for the rebuild. We don't just need buildings, we also need craft supplies, games equipment, programming supplies, song books, mattresses, kitchen supplies (the mice got into the toasters and many other things). It is a long list! If you know a business or individual that would be willing to donate some of these things, give the camp a discount, or give money to purchase them, please let us know.

A big thank you to Simon Hann who has made countless trips to Waterton and wore out chainsaw blades cutting up fallen trees. He and Cathy have been a great benefit to our rebuild crew!

Some Remembrances of Remembrance Day Services

There are three components to the Remembrance Day Services – the church service, the parade and the Cenotaph service. We begin with the parade.

In the 1960s, the Lethbridge Kiwanis Band, of which I was a member, were called upon to participate in Remembrance Day Services. The band marched in the youth section with the cadets, Girl Guides and Boy Scouts and young soldiers along with the City Police, R.C.M.P. veterans, and legion members. The parade route was west on 4th Avenue South to 5th Street South, then north to the Galt Gardens coming to a standstill at the soldier monument.

At the Cenotaph, we were honoured to play the National Anthems O Canada and the Star-Spangled Banner for American participants. We shared musical duties with the Salvation Army and the Legion Pipe Band. One drawback to the day was the weather. We had to contend with light snow falling one year, gusty winds another year or freezing temperatures the next year. Band members, in our red and black winter uniforms, learned how to keep our instruments in playing condition by blowing on our mouthpieces to keep them viable for playing. We also wore fingerless gloves.

The Remembrance Day Church Services had a variety of venues over the years – the Civic Centre, St. Patrick's and Southminster Churches and more recently the Lethbridge Exhibition Pavilion. At Southminster in the 1980s, the service was led by the padres of veteran organizations. The organist was Betty Purkis who played for the congregational hymns including 'O God Our Help In Ages Past, The Lord Is My Shepherd' and Abide with Me. She also accompanied George Brown's solo 'In Flanders Fields'. When the venue changed to the Exhibition Pavilion, she continued playing for a few years before turning the organ duties over to Evelyn Beattie.

Remembrance Day Ceremonies continue today at the Exhibition Pavilion and at the Cenotaph now located on the grounds of Yates Memorial Centre on Veteran's Avenue [4th Avenue South].



The turning of the wheel of Time. We don't know how much time we have left -- until winter sets in. We hope Autumn will remain with us a little while longer. Samhain – AKA *All Hallows Evening* AKA *Halloween* was quite nice weatherwise. Children didn't have to wear snowsuits under or over their costumes. It is always hard to predict so we must have a back up.

Samhain was and is the Celtic celebration of the harvest. It was a time when the veil between this world and the spiritual world was the thinnest. Folks honored their ancestors and invited them to share their wisdom and insights – their Blessings on the next year.

The end of the year was marked by a great bonfire on a high and sacred hill in Ireland (*Uisnech*). Tradition was that people would clean their homes, put out and sweep their hearths. When they could see the light that was relayed around the country, it was a signal to re-light their home fires and so to usher in the New Year in the cycle of the seasons. It was a time for preparing for the next equinox which would signal true winter which would be a time of rest and reflection. *But Now*, - It is time to watch nature and wildlife, to mimic that behavior. So, it is a busy time – a time to gather in stores, to prepare, to build a cozy, safe refuge all in expectation of harder times to come – winter will soon be her - - or to seek food, shelter and companionship wherever we must go.

In Southern Alberta, we also begin a celebration of All Saints Day where we pay homage to our ancestors – not just of blood, but of our history, our culture, our ideas and opinions. But for the works of our forebears, we would not be standing in this place. This is, *indeed*, worth celebrating!.

Here at Southminster, we celebrate 100 years of history in our own United Church. We have been here – all that time – and longer!! *God willing*, we will be here another century. So now, it is a busy time – a time for preparation, for gathering in, for creating a safe and cozy refuge in expectation of harder times to come. For some, that means finding a comfy pillow and blankie – maybe a stuffie – and settling down with snacks to binge on Netflix. While cocooning all winter does sound tempting, Southminster still needs to function as a place of community, a place of worship. The boiler has been turned on; winter will soon be with us.

PICKLEBALL AT SOUTHMINSTER -Steve Dobay

Pickleball continues to grow at Southminster. From the informal launch at the Annual Congregational Meeting in March, to our early lessons and trial run in June, to going "public" in July, the acceptance has been tremendous. The chart below summarizes the steady growth since June. From humble beginnings (i.e. zero members) we now boast a growing membership of 246. Our monthly revenue continues to grow, with total revenue so far of \$2,300. We made a fairly modest investment of about \$1000 in equipment. You may also notice other minor improvements to the gym as we move forward. Pickleball started as a way to utilize the otherwise unused time in the gym on weekday mornings and afternoons, and, of course, to generate much needed revenue for the Southminster General Fund. We are careful not to jeopardize other rentals of the gym. We emphasize fair play and socialization among the members. We are strongly committed to the concept of "Open Play." That is, you are welcome to come out and play, regardless of your ability or skill level.

To play at Southminster, you merely need to sign up with the (free) TeamReach App, and then sign into an open session. The drop-in fee is \$5 per session. The new schedule is published on TeamReach each week.

We also have a **recreational/beginner pickleball for Southminster folks** on a true beginner level **Mondays at 4:15pm**. Just come and play, no registration needed for now – please note that this time slot will not be available via TeamReach. If you have a friend who is willing to learn or play at rec level, you are welcome to bring them. Cost is \$5 per player; all equipment is provided.

In November, we will start "Practice and Play" sessions 3 mornings a week. This will be open to all members, and involves an hour of personalized training, and an hour of game-time. The cost is the same - \$5/session. In the New Year, we are planning more innovations and enhancements to our program.

Our administrators are **Taina Arnell, Christina Whittmire & me**. We are all working hard to make this a success at Southminster. Our Unofficial "Pickleball Ambassador" is **Ted Coatham**, who has worked tirelessly to spread the word about Southminster Pickleball, and who has single-handedly brought in dozens of players to Southminster. Thank you, Ted.
