CASE SUMMARY

For more than one hundred years, scattered reports have described an unusual mark appearing on the inside of a person's wrist.

Witnesses insist the mark is not a tattoo, birthmark, or scar. Instead, it appears suddenly, remains for an unknown period-of-time, and in some cases disappears without explanation.

The symbol has become one of the oldest and most persistent mysteries contained within The Mesilla Files.

WHAT WE KNOW

Historical records collected by the TRC Research Center suggest several common observations:

- The mark usually appears on only one wrist.
- Most people report no pain when it first appears.
- The design is remarkably consistent across accounts separated by decades.
- Several witnesses claimed the mark appeared shortly before an unusual encounter or unexplained event.
- Others reported vivid dreams, heightened awareness, or an unexplained feeling that someone—or something—was watching them.
- No verified scientific explanation has been established.

HISTORICAL REFERENCES

1898

Father Miguel Serrano mentions a traveler who arrived in Mesilla bearing a strange wrist symbol. The traveler refused to discuss its origin and departed the following morning.

1936

Sheriff Tomas Ortega documented two independent witnesses carrying nearly identical markings during his investigation into unexplained disappearances outside Mesilla.

1955

Researcher Howard H. Hunter referenced "the mark carried by those who claimed to have crossed beyond ordinary boundaries."

1967

Theodore Ray Mercer recorded stories from longtime Mesilla residents who believed the mark identified individuals "chosen by the desert."

THEORIES

Researchers have proposed numerous explanations:

- A forgotten cultural symbol.
- An ancient warning.
- A naturally occurring skin condition mistaken for something mysterious.
- A sign connected to the Mesilla Veil.
- Evidence of contact with the Old Desert.
- A coincidence reinforced through local folklore.

At present, none of these theories can be confirmed.
