Land Acknoledgment

To begin, let us acknowledge that Queen's University is situated on the traditional Anishinaabe and Haudenosaunee territory. It is essential that we recognize this territory's longer history that predates the establishment of the earliest European colonies. The histories and practices of the Indigenous peoples who have lived and continue to live on these lands are deeply tied to this territory. Let us reflect on our responsibility as uninvited guests who are grateful to live, learn, and play on this land. Genuine reconciliation requires us to actively uplift Indigenous voices, support Indigenous artists, and challenge the structures that perpetuate inequality. Although we are very grateful that you are here today, we encourage you to also seek out Indigenous art and theatre in our community.

Sunday In The Park With George tells the story of an individual whose ideas were rejected by the art world only for being different from its pre-established norms. Yet Georges Seurat's art's centuries-old staying power proves that we far too often dismiss ideas simply because they are different from what we are familiar with. We must remember that art is not only a means of immortalizing people and the things that we do, but also new perspectives. It is this ability that makes art the greatest vessel of our shared humanity, and its authenticity is jeopardized when we popularize mainstream colonial perspectives and ignore those of the people who were here first.

We encourage you to read up on the Indigenous Curatorial Collective as a step towards inviting in Indigenous voices and perspectives.

We also encourage you to donate any change that you might have to the Indigenous Curatorial Collective jar at our Front of House, or to make a separate donation on your own time to support Indigenous art creation.

Please continue your own research in an active approach to truth and reconciliation.



INDIGENOUS CURATORIAL COLLECTIVE

When Stephen Sondheim and James Lapine first looked at Seurat's most famous painting, they asked two questions:

- 1. Why isn't a single person looking at another?
- 2. I see all of these people, but where is the painter?

I had encountered the painting many times before discovering Sunday in the Park with George. Haven't we all? Hanging in homes, stamped on postcards, wrapped around mugs, or perhaps you've visited the Art Institute of Chicago where the original seven-byten-foot painting lives. It was this familiarity that gave us confidence to stage the show: people would come because they know the painting.

I remember the first time I saw it—a smaller reproduction in a Toronto museum alongside a sign that read, "Look closer. What do you see?"



RACHEL RUSONIK

A Sunday Afternoon on the Island of La Grande Jatte is composed of 220,000 dots of paint, each painstakingly layered on by an artist of whom we know little about. Georges Seurat invented a new way of seeing. He transformed fleeting everyday moments into something eternal. He fused light, turning six colors into what appears as hundreds—not by mixing on the canvas, but in the human eye. He never sold a painting in his life, yet his work lives on. His painting still asks something of us. All 220,000, 140-year-old flecks cannot coalesce into a park scene without us. For the park and the people to exist, we must look at it. His work was revolutionary, but he would never know; the established art world dismissed him for daring to create something new.

If the past few years have taught us anything, it is this: we often forget the artist. Art, once a highly sought after mirror reflecting us back unto ourselves has instead devolved into a series of repeated questions: Why a portrait when a selfie offers instant eternality? Why visit the theater when movies stream at home? Why support arts programs when other careers promise more profit?

When we separate art from its artist, we strip it of its humanity. When we strip art of its humanity, we forget our own. Art reminds us that other voices exist. It teaches us that perspectives differ—your park looks different from mine.

Before you is the culmination of the hard work and passion of over a hundred young artists who came together to create something against every obstacle. To Joey Pelman, our brilliant and passionate Producer, thank you for sharing this journey with me. To Kavina Sathiyanarayana, Sarena Abramson, and Hunter Wolfe—our Production Manager, Stage Manager, and Technical Director—your unwavering dedication inspires me daily. To our Production Team, from Designers to Heads of Department to every assistant and crew member, you are the artists behind all of this; please check them out at the front of house and do not let their work go unnoticed. To our outstanding band—Jack, Gailey, Hannah, and Sarah—your resilience have turned challenges into complete beauty; I could listen to your tracks for days. To the QMT Board, thank you for your constant guidance and support, and to the creative rehearsal team—Maria, Marlee, and Joey—you are truly spectacular and I do not know how you do it all.

To our remarkable cast: we knew this show would be difficult, but you make it look effortless. Go out there and share all that you've poured your hearts into over these past few months. You all astound me.

Finally, to our audience: we would not be here without you, and for choosing to share this moment with us, we are endlessly grateful. You could be anywhere, and yet, you are here; thank you. If I may, I have one request: let the show ask you questions. Do no rush to answer them; sit with them and see where they lead you. The answers are not mine to give—nor should they be; I hardly think that would serve the point at all.

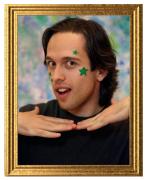
