





History of Salem

The town of Salem traces its history to the migration of Moravian settlers, who brought r deep religious faith, Germanic heritage and instrious work ethic from central Europe to a in the 18th century. The Moravians, properly as the Unity of the Brethren, are a protestant mination whose members sought religious and economic opportunities in the American , settling several permanent communities in Pennsylvania during the 1740s.



In 1753 Moravian settlers traveled south to North Carolina to found Wachovia, a too,oossere tract of land that would eventually contain six Moravian communities. These meluded Bethabara, Bethania, Salem and three smaller outlying
