History of Salem

The town of Salem traces its history to the migration of Moravian settlers, who brought their deep religious faith, Germanic heritage and industrious work ethic from central Europe to America in the 18th century. The Moravians, properly known as the Unity of the Brethren, are a protestant denomination whose members sought religious and economic opportunities in the American colonies, settling several permanent communities in North Carolina and Pennsylvania during the 1740s.

In 1753 Moravian settlers traveled south to North Carolina to found Wachovia, a 100,000-acre tract of land that would eventually contain six Moravian communities. These included Bethabara, Bethania, Salem and three smaller outlying


American Folk Art Antiques
