# To Our Dearest Supporters,

As we reflect on 2025, we are incredibly grateful for the donors, volunteers, and community partners who stood beside SFR Wildlife Rehabilitation Center. Because of you, we were able to keep going—and keep saying yes—during a year when wildlife needed help more than ever. Your support, both financial and hands-on, made it possible for us to provide compassionate, high-quality care to animals with nowhere else to turn.

Over the past year, we have seen a significant increase in the number of animals requiring help!

Wildlife seasons are lasting longer, human-wildlife conflicts are rising, and several rehabilitation facilities have closed or reduced their capacity. As a result, centers like ours are carrying more of the load. Even so, we stepped up—taking in more animals than ever before and often serving as one of the few remaining options for help across Colorado.

We did this with a very small but deeply committed team: just three part-time animal care employees, supported by an incredible group of volunteers, myself included. Since founding SFR in 2016, I have never taken a salary so that as much funding as possible can go directly toward animal care, facility needs, and keeping this organization running.

As we move into 2026, the need is not slowing down. We are focused on meeting the immediate demands of wildlife rescue while also preparing for longer, busier seasons ahead. To do that, we need help. We need volunteers, financial support, and community partners who believe in protecting Colorado's wildlife and are willing to stand with us as the need continues to grow.






## Animals Taken Into Care by Species




