Maybe it is because, as I am writing this, we are still dealing with cold and icy weather here in Beach Haven. But, as I have been reading about the history of Holy Innocents', I have been struck by how courageously the community has weathered challenges from its very beginnings. You may know the story of how the first Episcopal priest to lead the Beach Haven Community in worship, the Rev. Dr. James Hart Lamb, was awakened by a fire that burned down the hotel where he was staying when he arrived to serve on the Island. (I am grateful that all I had to deal with since I arrived was my moving truck being delayed, and having to shovel snow to get my car out of the rectory driveway!)

And you may remember how the Holy Innocents' community worked to secure its future not very long ago by repairing the roof, and installing its beautiful new steeple, in 2010. And that steeple successfully weathered Superstorm Sandy less than two years later.

These stories remind me of the chorus of my very favorite hymn: *"No storm can shake my inmost calm while to that rock I'm clinging / Since Love is Lord of Heaven and Earth, how can I keep from singing?"* In our liturgical year this month, we are turning toward the season of Lent, when we remember the brutal suffering and death of Jesus.

Sometimes, it's difficult to find the strength to face the challenges that confront us and the world in life - and even harder to find the hope to keep singing in the midst of them. How lucky, then, we are to have a God who knows what it's like to face the challenges of this life. How lucky we are to have a God who has not just faced the hardest parts of what it means to be human, but has already destroyed suffering and death forever, and invites us to share in that beauty with Him for all time.

I am very fortunate to have attended the same seminary as one of my heroes, The Rev. Fred McFeely ("Mister") Rogers. Mister Rogers is often quoted saying something he learned from his mother about dealing with challenging times: "Look for the helpers. There are always people who are helping." How lucky we are to have a God who, in the words of another hymn, was our help in ages past, and is our hope for the future, our shelter from the stormy blast and our eternal home. How lucky we are to have a God who helps us, so that we may be the helpers for one another.

This Lenten season, I invite you to open your heart to hope, no matter where you might find yourself. I invite you to be a helper in this world, by doing things like participating in Holy Innocents' monthly sandwich making ministry, or by praying

for the names on the parish prayer list. I encourage you to try a new practice of hope. Because even though we know the pain of the Cross is real, we also know that it is not the end of the story. We are an Easter people, and our song is always one of hope. Since Love is Lord of Heaven and Earth, how can we keep from singing?

There is nothing like a quiet bright sunny winter morning on LBI with a cup of coffee and a moment of contemplation. Dave and I can sum up our thoughts easily; we are so excited for this next chapter at HI to unfold with Mother Erin as our new Rector! Let's all remember to wear our name tags and make the first few weeks a bit easier for Mother Erin to meet us and remember our names. On Sunday, Feb. 1st after Mother Erin's first Sunday with us, we will have a Welcome Coffee Hour with time to meet and greet. Hope to see you there!

You may have noticed that there has been continued maintenance and updates happening at church. The Rector's powder room has been updated after **50 years** and a new desk has (finally) arrived in the Rector's office! Light fixtures that haven't been working are slowly getting replaced or fixed if they can be.

The bigger news is that our heating system is fragile. We were aware that it was coming to the end of its life but with last year's repairs, we were told it was good for a few more years. Our plan was to install the new air conditioning in the sanctuary in 2025 (done!) and then look to replace the heat in 2-3 years. We will need to replace it for next winter as one boiler is out of service. In order to keep us warm, we have been advised to keep the heat on a medium temperature and don't strain the system by turning it up more than 5 degrees at a time. What this means to parishioners is, please, please don't touch that dial! Please check with *Vince Contreras first*, then Dave White or Larry Peacock if you need more heat for an event. They can turn it up at a pace that won't stress the heaters. We are beginning to look at options for a new heating system. Pray for it to get us through the winter!

Go Blue in the New Year:

Resolutions for Being a More Responsible Steward of New Jersey's Marine Resources

As offered by our friends at Rutgers Cooperative Extension of Salem County

To **Go Blue** we are not talking about being cold in the February weather. Rather, we are referring to the importance of being conscious about the impacts that our actions have on our coastal ocean, and how you can be a more responsible steward of our marine resources.

To **Go Blue** is particularly important in New Jersey, given that nearly all of our state's border is surrounded by water, and we all impact our coastal oceans. Sometimes this is more obvious when we are living, fishing, or recreating at the Jersey Shore, while other times it is less obvious that we are impacting the coastal ocean when we are maintaining our lawns and gardens, washing our clothes, or driving our cars. Our streams and rivers flow to our coastal bays and then to the ocean. So, everything is connected and what you do on land also impacts our ocean, including its habitats and the life in our coastal waters.

We all impact our coastal waters whether we are at the Jersey Shore or inland due to the downstream effects of our actions. Therefore, there are changes that we can all make to our activities to help improve the health and sustainability of our marine resources and ecosystems.

We can all be more responsible stewards and **Go Blue** by:

Avoiding the production of waste and litter, which can end up as marine debris that pollutes our coastal waters and impacts ocean life..

Adopting responsible fishing practices if you go out recreational fishing

Choosing seafood that is grown or landed locally here in New Jersey, given the responsible practices and management involved with producing this seafood locally at the Jersey Shore. Adopting environmentally responsible practices when maintaining your lawn and garden, because runoff of excess nutrients or pollutants can have a serious impact on coastal water quality. Check out the following web page for more information [Jersey Friendly Yards](#),



In the Spotlight

Parishioner Spotlight is a regular feature in The Post. The purpose is to provide insights into the background and personalities of our fabulous parishioners!

February Parishioner Spotlight ~ Joyce Hillyer

I am a Jersey girl through and through. My birthplace was Middlesex Hospital which is now named Robert Wood Johnson Hospital in New Brunswick, New Jersey. I'm an only child who was raised in the small town of South River, New Jersey, which is located in central New Jersey. My father was born in New York City and always had hopes of me someday becoming one of the Radio City Music Hall's Rockettes. As a result, I started tap and toe dancing lessons at the young age of 4 and continued throughout high school. Several times a year we would go into the city to see the Rockettes perform. Much to my dad's disappointment, I never did reach the minimum height requirement to become a Rockette. However I did get to perform in high school musicals and at the Atlantic City Convention Center several times. I am sharing a collage of me preparing for several dances, both tap and toe.



Freshman year in high school brought together five different elementary schools. It was a time to start new friendships. I met Bruce Hillyer in my freshman homeroom. We had many classes together throughout high school, and by junior year we were sweethearts. I attended Trenton State College which is now called the

College of New Jersey and earned an Elementary Education Degree with a specialty in grades Kindergarten through grade 3. After graduation I taught first grade in the school in which I had done my student teaching.



In 1970, Bruce and I got married and moved to West Deptford in southwestern New Jersey since it was close to the Mobil Research Center where Bruce was working. The following year our son John was born. He is now married and lives in Glen Rock, New Jersey. He and Carrie have a son, Craig who attends Perdue University. Their older son, Tim, died last year. Our second son, Michael, was born 4 years later. He now lives in Ardmore, Pennsylvania. In 1979 Mobil asked Bruce if he would accept a research position at their laboratory outside Hamburg, Germany. This Jersey girl was leaving her home state for an exciting year. Fortunately, both of us had German in high school and soon learned that our teacher was excellent.

The company found us an apartment to rent in Germany and we bought a car. Since John was 8 years old, he attended the International School in a town some distance away. For a few weeks Michael and I would take a public bus with John to school and do the same at the end of the school day. We soon learned that most of the children at the International School took a train and then only had a short walk to school. We tried the train and John was happy to see some of his classmates. In two weeks, this eight-year-old was riding the train by himself. Now I had more free time so I joined the school's parent organization and later

was elected secretary. The president of the Board was also an American and the two of us suggested that we start a hot lunch program twice a week. What did we serve? Hot dogs, of course! It was a huge success and I met wonderful women from around the world who agreed to help out in the kitchen. We even put four-year-old Michael in charge of selling pickles, which the Asian students especially enjoyed. When the school administration learned that I was a certified teacher, I was occasionally called to be a substitute teacher. See several pictures of our family, the first from 1981 of me with our sons in our back yard in West Deptford after an Easter service. The entire family enjoyed Hansaland in 1980 which still is Germany's only coastal theme park. In 1989 picture our family went to Hawaii at Christmas.



For years, Bruce and I had been searching for a church to attend as a family. We have different backgrounds. Bruce went to a Presbyterian church and I was a Russian Orthodox Greek Catholic. In Hamburg, Germany, there was only one English speaking church - an Anglican Church. We attended and loved it. As a result, when we returned to the states, we joined an Episcopal church. I even became a Sunday school teacher. The year in Germany went by quickly. We made many trips to different countries and created many lasting friendships. When we returned to our home in New Jersey, Bruce suggested that I continue my teaching career. Since Michael was starting kindergarten, I didn't want a full-time position, so I became an aide in a fifth grade class in a school that was within walking distance of our home. The following year I applied for a regular teaching position and was assigned an afternoon kindergarten class. Three years later, a full time second grade position became available. Again, I was fortunate to get that and thoroughly enjoyed teaching second grade for 28 years. I retired early in 2008. With Bruce also being retired, we were hopeful that we could make our dream of living at the shore come true. In 2010 our home in Harvey Cedars was completed. One of my requirements was that the house lot had space for a flower garden to keep me busy since I did not know anyone on the island. I had no idea that the island had a garden club. I joined the Garden Club of LBI and learned some floral arranging skills from the lessons they provided. Bruce and I went to the Episcopal Church in Barnegat Light for a few times but



something was missing. Finally we decided to try Holy Innocents'. This was what we were looking for. Eventually we spoke with Father Frank and became members. Now this Jersey girl is recognized in church as one of the Flower Guild ladies. It is my pleasure to make floral arrangements to the glory of God and for our wonderful church community. The photo collage



shows several of the flower arrangements that I have made—or helped to make—for services at Holy Innocents'. One of my favorite activities is watching the changing colors, patterns, and clouds in the sky - whether it is morning or evening. The 23rd Psalm is my favorite bible passage and blue is my favorite color. The final picture is very special. It was taken in Norway when we celebrated our 55th wedding anniversary. We took our entire small family on a wonderful cruise. Tim, who was attending Georgia Tech, died a few months later. So this is the last photo we have of him. 7


