

A Moment With Mtr. Erin

Hello Holy Innocents' Parishioners!

I am looking forward to getting to know all of you very soon, but in the meantime, I'd like to tell you more about myself.

You may have already heard that I grew up in New Jersey. I lived in South River until I graduated from Rutgers in 1999. While I was growing up, my father's family lived in Ocean County (and both my grandfather, Jim Morey, and his brother, Harry, served as mayor of Berkeley Township). My aunt, uncle, and cousins still live in the area and are excited about me coming home!

I relocated to Pittsburgh to attend the University of Pittsburgh School of Law, which is where I met my husband, Jesse. I served as an Assistant Public Defender in Pittsburgh for ten years. My son, Max, was born in 2006, and I began a process of career discernment that led to work at Women's Center & Shelter, a local domestic violence shelter, for another ten years. I was raised in the Roman Catholic tradition, but began attending my local Episcopal Church, St. Paul's, when I moved to Mt. Lebanon in 2007, and was delighted to find a home in the Episcopal tradition.

During the time I was working at Women's Center & Shelter, I served on the Episcopal Church's delegation to the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women. This experience led me to begin discerning a call to ordained ministry. As part of this process, I began to serve as Director of Communications and Community Engagement at St. Paul's. Unfortunately, I was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2017, but once I fully recovered from treatment, I began more actively discerning this call. I enrolled in the Anglican and Episcopal concentration and M.Div. program at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, and I graduated from seminary, and was ordained a deacon, Memorial Day Weekend of 2022. I began serving as Assistant Rector at St. Paul's that summer, and was ordained a priest there in December of 2022.

Jesse is still a full-time attorney, working in-house for a small healthcare company. Jesse is a native Pittsburgher. His father had some serious health issues this year, and Jesse is helping to care for him while he recovers. Max is now in his sophomore year at Loyola University in Chicago, with the goal of serving as a high school history teacher there after graduation.

I am currently participating in a joint doctoral program with Pittsburgh Theological Seminary and the University of Edinburgh in Scotland. I love reading, watching movies, and listening to all kinds of music. I also enjoy spending time hiking, camping and being outdoors, especially with my rescued dogs, Lilly and Zoie. Max is a huge baseball fan, I love basketball, and we all love hockey, and so my family enjoys watching sports together.

A Word from Fr. Peter

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

This January we shall engage in our annual meeting where we shall conduct some of the business work of the parish. Electing officers, receiving annual reports, voting on the 2026 budget might seem very mundane yet as an organization with its business needs these activities serve our community as the Body of Christ in the southern part of LBI. I am grateful to all of you who are so generous with your time and talents in making this parish function so efficiently.

January will mark the end of this community's transition between rectors. Many of us expected the process to conclude by September so we are grateful to the Search Committee and the Vestry in their diligence in identifying a new rector who will begin her time with Holy Innocents in February.

I want to take this opportunity to express my deep gratitude for working with you at Holy Innocents. This past year has proved to be a blessing for both Carl and me. In the 22 years of my priestly ministry, I have never worked in a congregation so focused on its Christian identity that rifts from power struggles or group conflicts never manifested itself. On the contrary, this community shows its deep Christian commitment in the unity and harmony of its members. Tertullian, a Church theologian from the second century, described Christians with this phrase: See how they love one another. Such a phrase rings especially true of Holy Innocents. The beauty of the Jersey Shore, only a block from our church, inspired our celebration of the Season of Creation and, because of this celebration, I have done more study of the depth of God's work as Creator. Carl and I deeply enjoyed our time at the Rectory which Carl considers a personal retreat house.

One of the challenges of leaving a congregation lies in ending the relationships built during the past year. The purpose of this diocesan requirement allows the new priest to enter into a relationship with you without the former priest shadowing in the background. I am confident that Mother Erin will discover the exceptional character of this community and work to build up this community in ways only a long-term commitment would allow. As you enter into this new moment in your history, all of you will find a place in my prayer. God's Spirit will be at work among you creating new possibilities for this church in the community.

A Health Update from Fr. Peter

Dear Sisters and Brothers ~ Many of you know that I have Follicular Lymphoma, a form of non-Hodgkin lymphoma which has impacted my digestive system and associated lymph nodes. I was first diagnosed with follicular lymphoma in 2020 which was treated with chemotherapy followed by immunotherapy. My oncologist has been monitoring me for developments and an issue arose in June. Follow up surgery in October confirmed that the follicular lymphoma has become active. The course of treatment will begin on January 5 and will include immunotherapy, oral chemotherapy along with medication to prevent infections. This process limits the viability of my immune system so I shall have to restrict my exposure in group settings without some form of protection. Winter brings a host of respiratory infections so I shall begin using a mask during parts of the celebration of the Holy Eucharist and during Coffee Hour.

I delayed the treatment since I am not symptomatic and wanted to get through the Christmas Season and its additional work. After I begin treatment I shall have three weeks with you at Holy Innocents. Considering the limited number of available priests to provide supply services, I plan to continue to minister among you until January 25.

I assure you that you cannot contract any disease or infection from me either because of this lymphoma or the treatments to address it. I shall intinct from the chalice when receiving Holy Communion.

I ask for your prayer for healing during this time. God has opened new options for us living with cancer and I trust that God will see me through this round of treatment and provide the strength to continue to minister among you. Peace. Fr. Peter

From the Environmental Education and Advocacy Committee

HAPPY NEW YEAR

As you're setting your goals and intentions for the year ahead, be sure to keep our planet in mind. Here are a few easy resolutions you can set and achieve that will have a positive impact on the environment.

Use a reusable water bottle

The US sends 20 billion water bottles to the landfill each year. On average, people only recycle about 25% of the water bottles they purchase. The cost of bottled water is much more expensive than drinking tap water, even though tap water is generally safe and convenient. Consumer Reports found that the cost to drink bottled water over the course of a year equates to about \$346, while drinking the same amount of water from the tap would only cost you about \$0.48. Keep a reusable water bottle in your bag, car, and at work so you always have one handy.

Cut water and energy use

There are simple things you can do to cut your water or home energy usage by 10% each day:

- Unplug electronics: About 75% of the electricity used to power your home devices is consumed while the products are turned off. The easiest thing you can do to conserve energy is to unplug devices around your home while they're not in use.
- Thermostat setting: You can save energy by keeping your thermostat at 68 degrees F in the winter and 78 degrees F in the summer while you're awake. You should turn your thermostat off while you're away and asleep to conserve more energy.
- Turn off the tap: You can save 8 gallons of water each day by turning off the tap while brushing your teeth. While washing dishes, you can also save 10 gallons of water in just 5 minutes by turning off the tap.

Use a Bike, or Walk

Biking and walking are not only good for the environment; they are also incredibly beneficial for the body and mind, as well. People who choose to bike or walk tend to suffer less from depression, anxiety, and other mental health issues. Getting exercise or running errands by biking or walking can help to increase blood flow, release endorphins, and reduce overall stress and lower your carbon emissions.

Learning more about climate change and the state of our environment is one of the best ways you can be able to advocate for the issues.

Keep informed and get involved.


