

(See info. on page 8). Lastly, please join me for an Evening Prayer for Candlemas THIS THURSDAY EVENING AT 6:00 PM in-person. Bring your candles! **Candlemas** (also spelled **Candlemass**), also known as the **Feast of the Presentation of Jesus Christ**, the **Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary**, or the **Feast of the Holy Encounter**, is a Christian holiday commemorating the presentation of Jesus at the Temple. It is based upon the account of the presentation of Jesus in Luke 2:22–40. In accordance with Leviticus 12, a woman was to be purified by presenting a lamb as a burnt offering, and either a young pigeon or dove as sin offering, 33 days after a boy's circumcision. It falls on 2 February, which is traditionally the 40th day (postpartum period) of and

the conclusion of the Christmas–Epiphany season.<sup>[1]</sup> While it is customary for Christians in some countries to remove their Christmas decorations on Twelfth Night (Epiphany Eve),<sup>[2]</sup> those in other Christian countries historically remove them after Candlemas.<sup>[3][4]</sup> On Candlemas, many Christians (especially Eastern Orthodox, Roman Catholics, Lutherans, Anglicans and Methodists) also bring their candles to their local church, where they are blessed and then used for the rest of the year;<sup>[5][6]</sup> for Christians, these blessed candles serve as a symbol of Jesus Christ, who is the Light of the World.<sup>‡</sup>

The Episcopal Diocese of New Jersey has elected the Rev. Canon Dr. Sally French to serve as the thirteenth bishop of the diocese. She will be consecrated and installed as the bishop of New Jersey on June 24, succeeding Bishop William H. “Chip” Stokes, who is retiring.

French currently serves as Canon for Regional Ministry and Collaborative Innovation in the Diocese of North Carolina. Prior to joining diocesan staff, she spent twenty years in parish ministry, serving congregations of many sizes and types. Raised in Toronto, Canada, French earned a bachelors degree from Trinity College, University of Toronto (Economics, History), a Master of Divinity through the Toronto School of Theology, and a Doctor of Ministry

degree from Virginia Theological Seminary. She and her husband Clarke have two children living at home. In brief remarks delivered via Zoom after the election results were announced, French thanked the voters, the Search and Transition Committees, and her fellow candidates. Concerning her forthcoming position as bishop of New Jersey she said, "I look forward to serving with love."

The bishop-elect was chosen from a slate of five nominees by clergy and lay leaders representing each congregation of the diocese during a special hybrid convention held on Jan. 28 at Trinity Cathedral in Trenton and online via Zoom. She was elected on the third round of balloting with 68 percent of the clergy votes and 56 percent of lay votes. A majority of both clergy and lay votes in the same round was needed for election.

"I believe the Holy Spirit has led us to a remarkable leader who is deeply grounded in the faith and love of Jesus Christ," Stokes said. "Canon French brings gifts and skills in ministry that are well aligned to address the needs and challenges facing the Church and the Diocese of New Jersey at this moment in its life and history. I look forward to welcoming her and her family to the Diocese of New Jersey and serving with her in this exciting time of transition."

The other nominees were The Rev. Canon Dr. Dena Cleaver-Bartholomew, Canon to the Ordinary, Diocese of Rhode Island; The Very Rev. Troy Mendez, Dean, Trinity Episcopal Cathedral, Phoenix, Arizona; The Rev. Janine Schenone, Rector, Good Samaritan Episcopal Church, San Diego, California; and The Rev. Dr. Mauricio Jose Wilson, Rector, St. Paul's Episcopal Church Oakland, California.

## 7 benefits of restoring wetlands

A well restored wetland can provide many of the services performed by the original natural wetland. Here are seven ways restored wetlands can benefit us directly:

- 1 Revive biodiversity**  
40% of the world's species live or breed in wetlands. Restoring wetlands powers the local food chain and attracts wildlife.
- 2 Replenish and filter water supply**  
Wetlands naturally filter water, remove pollutants and boost the local water supply.
- 3 Store carbon**  
Specific types of wetlands, especially peatlands, mangroves, intertidal marshes and seagrass beds are exceptionally efficient carbon sinks.
- 4 Blunt the impact of floods and storms**  
Restored wetlands can act as sponges against excess rainfall and flooding, buffer coastal storm surges, and can shield communities in extreme weather.
- 5 Improve livelihoods**  
Wetlands create livelihoods in fishing and aquaculture, and also provide goods like reeds and grasses. These opportunities often benefit indigenous populations.
- 6 Boost eco-tourism**  
A restored wetland can be a sustainable magnet for visitors; a natural attraction that draws tourists along with opportunities to serve them.
- 7 Enhance well-being**  
Revitalized wetlands provide a place to relax, experience nature – and enjoy sense of satisfaction at their resurgence.

You don't have to read music or have a wonderful voice.



## **Let Us Break Bread Together...submitted by Ellen Dondero**

This Sunday, *February 5th*, in honor of Black History Month, we will be singing **Let Us Break Bread Together**: Some of the stanzas of this African American spiritual may date back to the eighteenth century. Other stanzas have been added by oral tradition. A look through modern hymnals will reveal an array of variations on the text. The most notable alteration in the *Psalter Hymnal* is the phrase "to the Lord of life" in place of the original "to the rising sun," in which "sun" was an ambiguous metaphor referring to God. The song's use at communion services probably dates from after the American Civil War. Miles Mark Fisher notes in *Negro Slave Songs in the United States* (1953), [Originally the hymn] relates hardly at all to holy communion, which does not necessarily require early morning administration or a devotee who faces east. [This] it seems was a signal song of Virginia slaves during the eighteenth century who used it and similar ones to convene their secret meetings.

The text discerns participation in the Lord's Supper as a humble act in which we not only eat the bread (st. 1) and drink the wine (st. 2) but also praise our God (st. 3) "on our knees." The refrain ends with a prayer for mercy, an African American *kyrie* that reminds us of the tax collector's prayer in Luke 18:13.

## **February Parishioner Spotlight ~ Ellen Dondero**

I became fast friends with one of the trombone players, and I remember telling my dad, "I'm going to marry a brass player; they have the best personality in the orchestra." And I did marry a brass player (as most of you know)! I met John (trumpet player and band teacher extraordinaire) when we were both teaching music at Notre Dame High School in Lawrenceville, NJ (I started there as a student teacher and then stayed on after graduation). I will always remember the time she decided to toss her pacifier over the loft rail, hearing a click when it hit the ground, but having no idea where it landed, until Jackie Spark's dad, Jack, who could be a bit of a curmudgeon, came up to me after the service, reached in his jacket pocket and very matter of factly said, "I think this belongs to you," handed me the pacifier, and walked away. If you knew Jack, you can easily picture that scene.

My seven siblings and I were raised in the church, and my parents were always very active, pledging members, so it was never a question that I would be the same. In addition to singing in the choir here, I served as Sunday School teacher, Sunday School Superintendent with Pat Peacock, Vacation Bible School Director (also with Pat), Christmas Pageant Director (Pat and me again), Vestry member, and Warden, among other things. I have served on Rector search committee, secretary search committee, and cleaning person search committee... You get the picture--I have done A LOT. After about 10 years of doing all of those things here at Holy Innocents', I was called as Minister of Music, and I then took on the unusual dual role of parishioner and employee. But it seems to be working out okay, as I have served in this ministry for 23 years. My Dad also did the same at our church, so I had a good example to follow. # Kitchen Renovation!!

## Kitchen Renovation ~ Kickoff Time and I don't mean Super Bowl!

The next few months (Feb-May) may be pretty hectic with work on the kitchen and the floors of Martin Hall. Some fast demo, some waiting, some hurry up and wait. Patience required!

I'll give you a brief overview of what will be happening...

First, the kitchen will be demo'd with new electric, plumbing, sheet rock put in around the beginning of March. We expect it to take about 3 weeks.

Next the tile floors will be removed and remediated in the kitchen, Martin Hall and the small entryway at the rear ramp entrance. Remediation involves the contracted company sealing off all these flooring areas, removing the flooring, and then testing the air quality when complete. The state mandates these steps and testing.

We are looking to begin remediation of the floors at the end March. This will take about 6-7 days and then the new floors will be installed. This may be the most inconveniencing part as floors will take about 2 weeks to install and seal with wax. Once this is done, we can begin to fill Martin Hall again and use it! We hope to have this done by mid-April.

We plan to find a way to have Coffee Hour and will accommodate other ministries that use the kitchen and Hall as best we can.

Our biggest job will be packing and moving **EVERYTHING** out of the kitchen (empty cupboards & refrigerator), Martin Hall, and every room off the Hall. We will be utilizing every available space for storage except the sanctuary, rest rooms, offices, and narthex. Mother Caroline has graciously offered up her garage for storage of the larger items! Items will be boxed and moved into attics and the storage area behind the kitchen will be packed tight. The ambulatory will be packed and even the restroom in Martin Hall, since it has ceramic tile floors.

We are able to start packing and moving things now with a completion deadline of mid-March. The kitchen will need to be packed and emptied by the beginning of March. Please begin thinking about what will be needed for your ministry in March-April so we can work together to insure easy access. Pat Peacock and I will be talking to committees to further discuss timing and where we will be storing each committee's items.

I'll keep you posted via the E-Pistle and Sunday announcements as necessary.

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
