The Parson's Place

Can you believe we are already in MAY?! One month until we resume our 7:30 AM Rite I services and until our high season is in full swing. We are still currently in Eastertide (50-days.) The purpose of the liturgical year is to experience the whole life of Christ, whose life we share as Christians. The mystery of Christ is so vast and deep that we need time to delve into aspects of events with unknown depth that transcend our mortal understanding. The year is divided into Christmas and Easter cycles of feasts and holy days. Christmas itself is the fixed date of December 25 and Easter, a moveable date, is dependent upon when the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox falls. Ascension Day will be May 14 and Pentecost on May 23. Pentecost is the great festival that marks the birth of the Christian church by the power of the Holy Spirit. Pentecost means "fiftieth day" and is celebrated fifty days after Easter. It marks the prophesied outpouring (Joel 2:28-29) of the Holy Spirit on Jesus' disciples, mother and family with the sound of rushing wind and tongues of fire as they were gathered together praying 10 days after Jesus' ascension into heaven. The disciples were suddenly empowered to proclaim the gospel of the risen Christ. They went out into the streets of Jerusalem and began preaching to

the crowds gathered for the festival. Not only did the disciples preach with boldness and vigor, but by a miracle of the Holy Spirit they spoke in the native languages of the people present, many who had come from all corners of the Roman Empire. This created a sensation. The apostle Peter seized the moment and addressed the crowd, preaching to them about Jesus' death and resurrection for the forgiveness of sins. The result was that about three thousand converts were baptized that day. See Acts 2:1-41.

The liturgical color of Pentecost Sunday is red. The liturgical color of the following Ordinary Time is green. Red recalls the tongues of flame in which the Holy Spirit descended on the first Pentecost. The color also reminds us of the blood of the martyrs. Green is the color of life and growth. Through the gift of faith that comes only from the Holy Spirit working through the means of grace, Christians trust in Christ as Savior and proclaim Him in their daily lives by service to their neighbors as they grow in faith. Pentecost marks our entry into "Ordinary Time" and is the longest of the church year. The lectionary provides us lessons that are themed and take us through Christ's life and actions. To supplement this, we have a weekly Bible Study at Holy Innocents', various programs offered via ministries throughout the year to

put our learnings and faith into action, and liturgical services to honor and celebrate our lives in Christ. If you have never experienced/watched/attended any of our online offerings (Morning Prayer, Evening Prayer, Compline, Psalms w/ Dcn. Judy) I am again going to encourage you to do so. All videos may be seen live on Facebook and they stay up long after finished. All these activities can be viewed off of Facebook as well. To do this, please contact Mtr. Caroline or the person whose service you'd like to see and we can send you a LINK to the service. You might have to click through some Facebook requests to log in or you might have to view it on a laptop or desktop, but it can be done! Coming soon: weekly informal devotions, Summer Circles, and more!

Classic Potato Salad

YIELDS: 6 SERVINGS PREP TIME: 10 MINUTES TOTAL TIME: 25 MINUTES

INGREDIENTS

3 lb. yukon gold potatoes, chopped into 1" pieces kosher salt

1 1/2 c. mayonnaise

1 small red onion, finely chopped

1 tbsp. Dijon mustard

1 tbsp. lemon juice

1/4 c. chopped pickles

1/2 tsp. paprika

4 hard boiled eggs, chopped

1/4 c. finely chopped chives

Freshly ground black pepper

Butterhead lettuce, for serving

DIRECTIONS



In a large pot, cover potatoes with water and season generously with salt. Bring water to a boil and cook until potatoes are easily pierced with a knife, 12 to 15 minutes. Drain and let cool slightly.

In a large bowl, combine mayonnaise, red onion, Dijon mustard, lemon juice, pickles and paprika. Stir until well combined. Fold in cooked potatoes, eggs, and chives, then season with salt and pepper.

Refrigerate until ready to serve. Serve over butterhead lettuce.

Environmental Education and Advocacy Committee

Thanks to the Rutgers Cooperative Extension Service, Earth Day, Every Day, program, below is a checklist of changes you can make this year... in no particular order. Feel free to share this checklist with friends and family and we've listed resources for you to learn more.

Reset your thermostat to save energy and money- Lower the heating system temperature in winter and increase the temperature in summer for your central air conditioning systems. During winter, try 60 degrees at night, and 68 while you are home. In the summer, adjust the home's thermostat to 76 to 78 degrees to keep cool and avoid high electric bills. More info here

Focus on the first two "R's" in Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle- Recycling is not the best way to decrease waste. A lot of resources and energy are used to create new products. This year, commit to reducing your product consumption or reusing products by buying or trading used items. It's never been easier to buy used with online websites; Facebook Marketplace, Craigslist, Ebay, and Freecycle are just a few.

Reduce recycling contamination- Don't be a "wishful recycler". Commit to learning how to recycle properly in your town. Did you know pizza boxes can NOT be recycled in curbside containers? The grease on the boxes contaminates the recycling stream. Another contaminator is the plastic bag! Plastic bags jam up recycling equipment and can shut down recycling operations. Download the <u>Recycle Coach app</u> or go to your town's recycling website and print out the "acceptable recyclable materials list". Hang it up for everyone to refer to.

Start composting- Composting food scraps reduces waste in landfills. Mix food scraps from your kitchen with leaves, or another carbon rich material, keep it moist, and mix it once a week. Soon you will have a healthy soil amendment that helps your plants grow. Watch our <u>composting video</u> and read our <u>Home Composting fact sheet</u> to get started.

Go electric and reduce your fossil fuel consumption- The US transportation sector is the <u>largest</u> greenhouse gas contributor in the United States. Need a new car in 2021? Make the switch to an electric or hybrid car. And your "new" car does not need to be new; there are many used hybrid vehicles on the market. Choose electric when you make other consumer purchases- for example, leaf blowers or mowers. Visit https://www.drivegreen.nj.gov/ to learn more about electric vehicles.

Get outside more and explore nature- Commit to getting out and experiencing nature at least once a week. Why once a week? Because <u>more and more research</u> is showing that immersing yourself in nature benefits your mental and physical wellbeing. Some in the medical field are prescribing nature-based time to their patients. This field is called ecotherapy (or nature therapy) which has shown a strong connection between time spent in nature and reduced stress, anxiety, and depression. And let's face it... we could ALL use that right now.
