## **Reflection on Change During Transition**

From "Uncommon Gratitude," by Joan Chittister and Rowan Williams

Future is many things at once. It is the vessel into which we pour all our hopes and all our fears. "When all else is lost," Christian Bovee says, "the future still remains." The problem is that future is a panacea for some and a threat to others. It is at the edge of the future that we walk off the side of a cliff into the arms of God.

The spiritual challenge of the future resides in being able to accept it before we know it. But accepting the future before we know what it is becomes one of the central problems of life. Rather than embrace the unknown, we stumble along from one fear to another. From day to day, intent on going tenderly into the future we want for ourselves, we are inclined to do one of two things: escape the present or cast it in stone.

So we cling and claw our way from day to day, trying to preserve this, to avoid that, intent on our need to control tomorrow and awash in our uncertainties along the way. Then we begin to see what the future really demands of us. We come to realize that is it not the particulars, the details of time and place and position to which the future finally takes us that really matter much. No, it isn't so much what happens to us in the future that counts. It is the attitudes we take to it that make all the difference between a future that's full and a future that's frustrating.

We have two sons. Ted is a volunteer firefighter and also works at Southern Ocean Medical Center as a security guard. In addition, he works as a forest fighter for Ocean County. Johnny lives in Northern California and was an acolyte at Holy Innocents'. They were both baptized at Holy Innocents'. Several pictures, one of son Johnny as an acolyte; one (for the church directory) of our family from approximately 2000; and one of my husband and me with Bishop Stokes) are from Holy Innocents'; while one is from the Church Without Walls in Rincon, Puerto Rico.

I joined the Holy Innocents' flower committee and was taught to make

flower arrangements by the very talented women of that group. I always felt welcome and loved by everyone at Holy Innocents'. Three of the pictures are from my flower arranging, while one is from my own garden.





My husband and I spend two months in Puerto Rico in the winter. We attend Church Without Walls in Rincon, a nondenominational church. Last winter, we renewed

our baptismal covenant in the Caribbean Ocean.









I'm also a pottery maker and have a studio residency at The Foundation of Arts and Sciences in Love ladies. The picture shows some examples of my pottery.

# **Environmental Education & Advocacy Committee**



Ecological changes are finding their way into cruise ship operations. This past month Gail and I had the opportunity to take an expeditionary cruise of the western Great Lakes. Viking, a leader in the cruise industry and operating 80 vessels throughout the world, has taken a number of steps to minimize the use of paper and plastic. On our prior cruises with Viking there were always plastic water bottles available as you left the ship. This trip there were none to be found. In speaking

with Viking personnel aboard ship, they emphasized that Viking was doing their part in reducing the use of plastics. On our ship alone (350 passengers) over 400 plastic bottles were used each day. This means that for a seven day voyage 2800 bottles were used! Considering that several of Viking's ships carry almost 925 passengers the number of plastic not used throughout the year number in the millions. We carried our own reusable hard bottles and our stateroom always had a glass carafe of water on hand. On board Gail and I attended a galley tour lead by the head chef of the ship. He emphasized that they use of much of their prepared food each day and reformat food that goes uneaten the very next day For example, prepared steak can be grounded for steak burgers. Any prepared food that is not consumed is drained and compacted for use as fertilizer for farming use.

Now we did not spend all of, our seven days in the galley of the ship, we did go to a number of excursions off ship and staff presentations aboard ship. One particular presentation stands out it was called "Magic Migration" lead by a professional ornithologist and though traversing the Great Lakes there were bird sightings and landings aboard ship. One particular bird that landed aboard ship was identified as a Cape May Warbler named for New Jersey's Cape May where it was first identified in 1811. The male warbler about 4.75 inches since not a paying passenger was asked to leave. The specialist stated that although this warbler is not a migratory bird over 70% of all birds are and of that number almost 80% migrate at night.

Each evening a four page glossy is issued to each cabin describing events and landings for the next day. By using each cabin's screen it is available for viewing instead. If industry is leading the way, we too, in our own way can begin to consciously minimize our dependence on plastic and paper. We have been for sometime receiving our Parish Post online!


