# THE PARISH POST



## A Word from Father Peter

A community of faith, sharing the love of the Holy Spirit, seeking and serving Christ in his creation.

The month of June brings a major shift to all of us living on LBI or coming to worship at Holy Innocents'. The traffic lights have been turned on. Traffic on Saturdays will become almost impossible to navigate. The Island which knows such tranquility during the Winter months will become abuzz with people drawn to the natural beauty of the ocean and the bay.

On top of this activity around us, we shall witness a less dramatic event happening in our liturgy. June 1 marks the last Sunday in the Easter Season which comes to a close on June 8 with the celebration of Pentecost. After Trinity Sunday on June 15, we return to green vestments and our reading of the Gospel according to Luke, along with the cycle of readings from the prophets as the first reading from the Hebrew Scriptures. The Gospel of Luke places an emphasis on Jesus as a prophet so we will hear the coming together of both the prophetic texts from the Hebrew and Christian scriptures.

For many of us, prophets are people who foretell the future. From this perspective, we hear the message of the Hebrew prophets as predicting the future coming of Jesus as the Messiah. Rabbi Abraham Heschel wrote a groundbreaking study of the Prophets. For Rabbi Heschel, prophets were persons with a profound experience of God's pathos, of God's feeling of rejection by God's people and God's yearning for his people to return to God. While Rabbi Heschel did not study Jesus as a prophet, his understanding of the classic Hebrew prophets gives us an insight into understanding Jesus as one deeply attuned to the heartbeat of God and speaking and acting as a mirror of that divine energy.

If we see the prophets as persons who are deeply connected to God's broken heart, what would it mean for us who inherit this prophetic tradition? Perhaps we can look at the persons whom the Episcopal Church calls contemporary prophets and see how they live their lives. The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. is listed as a prophet in Lesser Feasts and Fasts, the list of liturgical celebrations in the Episcopal Church. In Dr. King, we see a person who understands and feels the pain and anguish of a people deprived of liberty and freedom and who worked, even unto death, to secure those inherent human rights. In some ways, we continue to sense that heartbeat of humanity when we gather once a month to prepare sandwiches for the hungry. We are attuned to the pain of the hungry among us and provide for their need.

As we enjoy the beauty of nature during these summer months, perhaps we can also train our hearts to see and respond to the needs of the least among us. Perhaps we can notice the persons who wait on and clear tables, who prepare food, who come to LBI on Saturdays to clean homes, who cut our lawns and attend to our gardens. Perhaps we can cultivate a prophetic awareness of their presence among us and even feel the heartbeat of God in their chests. Perhaps we can find in ourselves the presence of a broken-hearted God who yearns for freedom for the least among us.

So let us enjoy the beauty of the summer months even as we hear the prophets of old and ask how that prophetic spirit stirs itself among us today.

## Rector Search Update

### What's happening with our Rector Search?

Since forming our Search Committee in November, lots has happened behind the scenes with parishioner input, Parish Profile and advertising prep, interview question prep and then the wait for applicants. Many parishioners want to know more about what is currently happening. Here is an update!

The Search Committee has been very diligent in following the Diocesan directives in carrying out our search. We have been advertising in Episcopal News Service for several weeks and have now begun to receive applications. We have interviewed one candidate and have another potentially in queue. The Committee meets every Tuesday, with occasional missed meetings when there is nothing new to discuss.

Calling a new priest is a process of discernment on both sides, for the parish and the candidate. Discernment is defined as “the ability to recognize small details, accurately tell the difference between similar things, and make intelligent judgements by using such observations.” So, for us, it means asking God to help us look for the small details that will point to the right person to lead us into the future.

We ask for your ongoing prayers and patience as we move forward. Feel free to ask myself or co-chair Mike Fahner how things are going. We must maintain confidentiality but will be happy to answer your queries in general terms. And please pray for the Search Committee members: Maggie Aftanis, Howie Dumhart, Mike Fahner, Judith Hamilton, Bill Kehr, Rich Vaughan and Kim Sparks.

We have already completed a church and rectory safety check and a questionnaire about our expectations for the Search Process. On June 30<sup>th</sup>, the Search Committee and Vestry will be taking a 2 hour Antiracism Course.

***June Parishioner Spotlight ~ Ann White***

I came to Beach Haven in 1978, with my mother and my two sons, Peter (goes by Keil pronounced *Kyle*) and David. I was nearly 40 at the time. We had been living in Syracuse, but it was very cold there. We knew Beach Haven because we used to rent here for a month in the summers. Peter, the oldest, was a freshman in college, and Dave was a student at Southern.

I started working at the Bank in Beach Haven, then in 1980 was asked to come to the Borough of Beach Haven. I later became the tax collector for Beach Haven. I had been told that the hardest thing about moving would be finding a job, but this proved to be the easiest.

We lived on South Bay Avenue in the 900 block, the same as now – although I am currently living in a residential facility in Manahawkin. The picture at the top of this Parishioner Spotlight is of me before the door to my room. My sister made the wreath that is hanging there.

I enjoyed living in Beach Haven. I love the beaches. I would go to the beach to read, my “quiet time.” I like the people who live in Beach Haven full time and also the store owners. I played Mah Jongg at different people’s homes. As the tax collector for the Borough, though, my position was a bit difficult since I knew a lot about people’s finances. The picture collage is of me with friends from Beach Haven and with a special baby.



I have always been Episcopalian. I went to Holy Innocents’ with my mother and liked it. My mother told me to “Just open your mouth and don’t sing.” I guess that was good advice... My mother died in about 1991. The choir from Holy Innocents’ visited my facility before Christmas and sang some songs. We really enjoyed the music and their visit. I am in the picture with choir members, as well as Ginny Gottshall, another member of Holy Innocents’ who lives in the same facility.

I didn’t get too involved with Holy Innocents’. I was very involved and busy with the church in Syracuse, but didn’t want that to happen here. I enjoyed watching the kids when they would come in during the service. Some of the hymns would make me cry.

My older son, Keil, lives in Syracuse. He is married and has two children. He recently retired.

Dave, my younger son, and his wife, Lisa, moved here from Syracuse. They were reunited at a high school reunion and got married in 2013. They live in Beach Haven. Dave has taken on an active role at Holy Innocents’. He was previously Senior Warden and is now (again) Junior Warden.

My son Dave plans to come to pick me up in the summertime and bring me to church. It will be nice to be there and see people.





## Living Responsibly

*Here are some everyday actions you can take to benefit the ocean and marine life.*

### 1. Consider the land-sea connection.

What we do on land directly affects the ocean. You can control the polluted runoff from your neighborhood by taking the following actions:

- If you live right on the water, plant a buffer zone of trees, tall grasses and shrubs to filter runoff and to provide shelter and habitat for turtles, shorebirds and other animals.
- Use less fertilizer. Instead, mulch grass clippings to enrich your lawn and create a compost pile that will provide natural nutrients for your garden.
- Wash your car on the grass, not the driveway. That way, harmful chemicals will be filtered by grass and soil before they reach local waterways, where they can harm delicate aquatic life.
- Make sure that construction sites in your neighborhood use silt fences, storm wattles and other means of keeping sediment and other harmful runoff out of storm drains.
- Plant trees. Trees contribute to clean water; they are the ocean's best filters.

### 2. Remember that everything flows downstream.

The ocean is downstream of everything. By being careful about oil, water and other substances that you use on land, you can help keep ocean waters clean. Here are some things to consider:

- If you decrease your water use at home, you'll decrease the amount of water that must be treated with chemicals before entering rivers, streams and the ocean.
- Don't use the toilet as a trash can or garbage disposal. Doing so contributes to overloaded sewer and septic systems, which release their effluent into local waterways and the ocean.
- Sweep walks and driveways rather than hosing them down. Water picks up chemicals and transports them to the nearest storm drain, creek or waterway. Often, these hard surfaces contain oil, antifreeze, lawn chemicals and other harmful substances.
- Empty your swimming pool or hot tub on the grass, not into the street. Chlorinated water is harmful to aquatic life.
- Don't fill your gas tank to the top; by not topping off, you'll avoid spills.

### 3. Recreate – but not recklessly.

Ocean lovers spend a lot of time on – and under – the water, swimming, boating, fishing, diving and enjoying the beach. These activities are often the most direct contact we have with ocean life, so how you engage in them determines whether your impact is negative or positive.

- Retrieve all fishing line, lures or gear – even if tangled or broken. Fishing gear can entangle or injure seabirds, turtles, dolphins and manatees – and even divers and swimmers. And because it is durable, it can continue catching and killing fish indefinitely.
- Drive your boat as though life depended on it. Damaging wake can tear up plants and erode shoreline; boats' slashing propellers injure countless sea turtles, dolphins, manatees and whales every year.
- When you haul your boat out of any waterway, rinse your boat on the spot to remove hitchhiking plants and other organisms.
- On trips to the beach, carry out whatever you carry in. Wildlife can ingest or become entangled in trash left behind.

## **Did you know that New Jersey remains under a drought warning issued by the NJDEP?**

Despite recent precipitation, NJ is still recovering from a significant rain deficit from last summer & into winter. Smart irrigation & landscaping practices conserve water!

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### **UPGRADE YOUR IRRIGATION SYSTEM**

- Use smart controllers; Install rain sensors
- Consider drip irrigation
- Inspect and maintain regularly



### **LANDSCAPE MINDFULLY**

- Plant drought-resistant and native species
- Mulch matters: Apply 2–3 inches around plants
- Mow wisely: Keep grass height between 2.5-3.5 inches
- Group plants with similar water needs



### **WATER SMARTER**

- Water early or late; 2X/week max
  - Check soil moisture: Don't water if moist soil 4–6" deep
-
