Easy Fall Recipe: Vegan Butternut Squash Soup



Butternut Squash Soup Recipe Ingredients

To make this easy butternut squash soup recipe, you need 10 simple ingredients:

- •Butternut squash This soup packs in 3 pounds of squash, so look for a
- •medium-large one at the store or farmers market. If you don't have a scale at home, I recommend weighing the squash when you buy it!
- •Yellow onion and garlic These veggies add delicious depth of flavor.
- •Fresh sage and rosemary I don't reach for rosemary as often as some other fresh herbs, but I absolutely love it here. Along with the sage, it makes this soup cozy and complex.
- •Ginger Its warm flavor highlights the autumnal taste of the herbs and squash.
- •Extra-virgin olive oil 2 tablespoons add the perfect amount of richness.
- •Vegetable broth Because the blended squash becomes creamy on its own, there's no need for dairy, coconut milk, or nuts here! With veggie broth as its base, this is a vegan butternut squash soup recipe.
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper Add them with the onion at the start of the cooking process, but make sure to taste and adjust at the end as well. That way, you'll make a soup you really love!

First, chop the veggies! Sauté the onion until it becomes translucent, add the squash, and cook until it begins to soften. Then, stir in the herbs, garlic, and ginger. Pour in the broth and simmer until the squash becomes tender, about 20 minutes.

When the squash is soft, transfer the soup to a blender. Blend until the soup is vibrant orange and creamy. Finally, pour it into bowls, garnish with chopped parsley and pepitas, and enjoy!

We hope you enjoy getting to know the people of Holy Innocents'! September Parishioner Spotlight ~ Gail Anderson Steiner

I was born and raised in Wilmington, Delaware, baptized and confirmed at Grace Church Wilmington. As a little girl I was very active in Church Youth Choir, youth group, and teen altar guild. My summers were spent in Rehoboth Beach where I was

very active in CSSM, the Children's' Sand and Surf Mission. Both parents had been married before, and I had an elder brother and sister from each parent. I was the "Ours." My four siblings were significantly older than I, so I was essentially raised as an only child. My grandparents on my father's side were both Swedish immigrants.

In my younger years, I was training to be a professional ballerina and had plans and acceptances to go into the American Ballet Company upon graduation from high school. God had other plans for me, and my height of 5'7" at 17 excluded me from a professional ballet career at that time, so I had to switch gears and go to college. I attended the University of Virginia and ended up with a nursing degree because all my roommates were in nursing school and I was still adjusting to my changed path in life. Despite the degree, I knew it really was not my chosen career and pursued theatre seriously in college while finishing my nursing degree. Graduating with three degrees—English, Theatre, and a BSN in Nursing—I somehow ended up working for an international law firm, Skadden Arps et al, based in NYC with an office in Delaware. It was an exciting time during the Mergers and Acquisitions era of the 1980s. I was blessed to travel the world with the firm and experience intimately NYC in the 1980s, which was something. I also was working in theatre as a professional stage manager and also as a dancer in musical theatre. It was a very busy time.

I met my husband, Steve, as he was a friend of a theatre director whom I was dating. When that relationship quietly fizzled out, I started dating my soon-to-be husband. We married exactly 1 year after our first date and lived in New York City for a number of years. He was a Broadway actor and musical director, and I worked in stage management and production (as well as law!), so we spent a lot of time in the theatre.

When we decided that we were ready to move our theatre careers in a different direction and move out of NYC, we were hired at the Surflight Theatre in Beach Haven and started making plans to move to Long Beach Island. Unbeknownst to me at that time, my mother had been raised on the Island from 1927-1939, living in the Surf City Hotel, which her mother and stepfather owned and ran. She attended and was confirmed at Holy Innocents' when it was in the building across from Surflight. She remembered that during summers, when her family was very busy with the hotel, the Catholic nuns who were summering at Maris Stella in Harvey Cedars would pick her up and bring her down to Beach Haven to church on Sundays and then bring her home when church was over. Upon leaving Beach Haven at 13 to move to Wilmington to attend high school and live with an aunt (her own mother was in the

midst of an unfortunate divorce scandal), she returned every summer to work at the Baldwin Hotel, living on their top dorm floor for the working girls, and attended Holy Innocents' in the summer. She married in 1943 in Wilmington and never returned to the Island. It came as a great shock that we were going to re-locate here and that her granddaughter Christa would be born in Beach Haven, baptized in the same church of Holy Innocents', and attend Beach Haven School, where she had gone. We heard some great stories of her time on Long Beach Island "back in the day."

Fast forward to now: Our Christa is 26 and a performer and wig designer for theatre; Surflight Theatre is in its 75th Season; and we love being a part of such a wonderful, supportive, and vibrant "small town" community. I have been blessed to have served on the Vestry for Holy Innocents', including serving as Vestry secretary. I was on the committee for the new steeple, which was dedicated in July 2010. I now love having my garden plot in the Community Garden. Steve and I spend a lot of time traveling around the country for theatre work, and have also been making a point of enjoying some "bucket list" European designations whenever possible. This year our travel will include the Netherlands and Belgium, Portugal, Spain, and, of course, Florida and New England to visit family.
