

A Word from Father Peter

A community of faith, sharing the love of the Holy Spirit, seeking and serving Christ in his creation.

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Ash Wednesday, March 5, begins the Holy Season of Lent. On that day, the liturgy from the Book of Common Prayer invites us to undertake the practices of self-examination and repentance, prayer, fasting and self-denial and reading and meditating on God's holy Word. All of these practices seem to cast a dour sense on this time of preparation for the celebration of our Lord's Resurrection. What if we looked at this time as a period to draw closer to Jesus, to more deeply understand the meaning of his passion, death and resurrection and to become better persons by replacing some self-defeating pattern of behavior with a more positive one?

In the first centuries of the church, Lent marked a time of joyful anticipation for the reception of Baptism and the Eucharist. Early Christian converts would undertake a two year period of intense preparation when they would disentangle their lives from secular patterns of behavior which were contrary to the Christian way of life. They would begin to practice the Christian virtues and learn the basics of the Christian Faith. While they would join the community on Sundays to hear the Word of God, they would be told to leave the church when the Offertory began. Only Christians were allowed to witness and participate in the ritual of Holy Communion. At the Easter Vigil, they would be Baptized by immersion, walking into the Baptismal pool and being dunked under the water. The Bishop would generously anoint them with fragrant chrism and they would put on a white garment. The Bishop would lead them into the church were they would witness and receive Holy Communion for the first time. You can imagine the happiness they would feel when they became full Christians.

What if we could enter into the time of Lent with that same joyful anticipation as those first Christians? What benefit might we draw from this sacred season which might differentiate this Lent from other Lents? Perhaps you might want to pray Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer? You can access these resources on the Forward Movement webpage at https://prayer.forwardmovement.org/home Forward Movement offers a variety of resources for prayer and reading. Just check out their webpage for all their resources.

We shall engage in Lenten Book Study on Thursdays at 2PM beginning on March 6. We shall read Witness at the Cross by Amy Jill-Levine a practicing Jew who is also

a New Testament scholar. She offers insight into the Jewish dimensions of Jesus and his teaching. She will help us to understand the experiences of people who beheld the crucifixion of Jesus: Simon of Cyrene, the Bystanders and Scoffers, the Other Victims, the Soldiers, the Beloved Disciple, the Woman and Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus.


On Fridays, we shall pray the Stations of the Cross. You can join in these prayers remembering Jesus journey to the Cross and his death either in Church or on line.

Regular participation in our Sunday liturgies will help us enter into the mystery of this holy Season, draw closer to Jesus through receiving his Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist, and sharing fellowship with our sisters and brothers during coffee hour.

As we enter into this sacred mystery, may we anticipate that Christ will open new doors for us, that God will invite us ever deeper into the mystery of Jesus' dying and rising, and that the Holy Spirit will stir in our hearts a deeper love for God and one another.

Beginning on March 6 and continuing throughout the Thursdays in Lent, we shall read and discuss the book Witnesses At The Cross by Amy-Jill Levine. Dr. Levine is among the growing number of practicing Jews who study the New Testament to provide a Jewish take on the life and mystery of Jesus. We shall study the accounts of the Crucifixion and Death of Jesus from the four Gospels and the different people who saw and participated in that mystery: Simon of Cyrene, the Bystanders and Scoffers, the Other Victims, the Soldiers, the Beloved Disciple, the Woman and Joseph of Arimathea and

Nicodemus. Each of the Gospels has its own take on the story of Jesus and the same variety happens with the four accounts of the final hours of Jesus' life. As Dr. Levine writes: "The witnesses at the Crucifixion watch Jesus die, and we watch with them, and we watch them. And we come away transformed." The book is available from Amazon or your local bookstore.

On the **Fourth Sunday of the Month**, Fr. Peter will offer prayers and anointing for healing in the chapel immediately after the Holy Eucharist for anyone who would like this ministry. Persons can come into the chapel and request healing prayer for themselves or for others.




When I was in elementary school, every April 4th my parents would send me to school with fortune cookies to celebrate the day my parents

Within the first few months of living together, we adopted a cat. She was already 1 year old when we got her and Josh fell in love with her immediately. Josh had never had any pets growing up and I never had a cat before. When we lived in our apartment, Daisy would enjoy going out on our little balcony and sun bathe. When we bought our house, Daisy got more comfortable and recognized we were not going anywhere and the house was all hers to roam around and jump on the counters and watch at the neighbors on her little window ledge.

Josh and I had started to look at adopting a puppy. Josh thought of keeping the flower theme name going and Chloe, who is a florist, had plenty of names we could choose from. We got approved so the day after Thanksgiving we went to the shelter in Atlantic City and walked out with a puppy. The people at the shelter said "you're approved you can take her now." We were on our way to celebrate Thanksgiving with Josh's family and were not prepared to take a puppy. After we left, we went to the store to get pee pee pads and doggy shampoo. She was 11 weeks old. When we brought her home, Daisy was not excited at all. Daisy soon

learned that being in higher spaces was the best way to avoid Poppy. Poppy recently turned one and they sleep closer together now, one night they were cuddling when they were sleeping and Josh and I got very excited. Since Daisy would go outside on our balcony she now sneaks out when Poppy goes outside. Sometimes during the day, I will let Daisy out when Poppy goes out and I watch them both. Nothing makes Poppy happier than having her sister outside. Daisy and Poppy are together in the picture here.

Recently my dad was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and has completed his treatments and surgery to get it completely removed. When he had

started his chemo treatments, he was losing weight rapidly but was positive the entire time. They were going to New Brunswick to meet with the surgeon. However, the surgeon wanted to do more chemotherapy and start radiation treatments but he was very weak. He ended up getting a second opinion and they were able to do the surgery and it went very well. The morning of his surgery he had to be there at 5 am, so I was very tired and fell asleep in the waiting room and my mom had to wake me up a few times because I was snoring very loudly. My dad is a celebrity in our neighborhood, he walks the dogs daily around the block and sees so many people. When I go with him on his walks, we are usually gone for about half an hour or longer because we see so many people. The dogs are just as popular as well they love greeting everyone and get so excited to see everyone in person or in their cars driving by. My dad is doing so great with eating more trying to gain more weight. He was so excited to go to church after so long and see everyone. People from the church choir came to sing Christmas carols and he lit up being able to hug everyone and sing a few carols as well.

We have a lot of return vendors! They loved being with us last year!



In memory of Suzette Whiting we are re-printing her Parishioner Spotlight...

Note from Barbara Wheeler, interviewer: The Parishioner Highlight this month is a bit different from previous versions. Rather than having her answer written questions, Suzette and I spoke about the areas of interest. This allowed us to range widely through Suzette's life and interests. I am presenting a summary here, starting with the general question.

I have a personal note about Suzette and Kneeland's life in Montclair in the 1970s. I began teaching at Montclair State College in 1975, and for the academic year 1976-1977, I lived in the third floor of the home of a faculty member near to the college. After I moved to LBI and was singing in the Choir with Suzette and Kneeland, I learned that they had lived in the house next door to my residence. I did

not meet my nice neighbors at that time—but was glad to meet them several decades later on LBI.

Suzette, please tell us about yourself:

I was born in Montclair and lived there or nearby for most of my life, both growing up and after we were married. I went to Stephen's College in Columbia, MO. I majored in theatre and foods and graduated in 1955. Then I returned to Montclair. I wanted to work in New York City, hoping to work in the theatre in NYC. I worked as a hostess at Schraft's. Although I did have an audition once, I never worked in the New York theatre. I later worked for some dentists in Montclair.

Because of my interest in the theatre, I volunteered at the Montclair Operetta Club. Near the end of 1957, I was working on "cues" (I was one of several people who gave cues to the actors when they forgot a line or needed a cue) and was asked to do a bit part in "Kiss Me Kate." Kneeland had been asked to do a part in this show, also, so we played opposite each other.

Around the same time, I had wanted to sing in the choir of the St. James Episcopal Church, which I attended with my family. That church only allowed male singers in the choir at that time. I was allowed to join the choir at Union Congregational Church. Through that connection, I became involved with some people who put together religious shows. They were called the Pilgrim Players and came from a group called the Bishop's

Company. They needed someone for a part and both Kneeland and I filled roles with them. Because of these theatre connections, Kneeland and I were together in rehearsals almost every night. We announced our engagement on January 1, 1958, and were married on April 12 of the same year. Our daughter Suzie was born in 1959, and Amy was born in 1962. (Most members of Holy Innocents' will know that Kneeland passed away in May of 2021, after 63 years of marriage with Suzette.)

I have a fun story to share about an early date with Kneeland, who asked me if I would like to come up and see his grandfather's etchings. His grandfather had done etchings of steamships – tugboats, tows, etc. Someone had put the etchings in a book, categorized by type. Many of these are now framed and hang on the walls of my home. Sadly, the grandfather/artist was on the Titanic and was killed when that ship sank. The picture here is of Suzette next to one of theetchings that hangs on their wall.)



How did you come to LBI and Beach Haven?

I have been coming to LBI since I was born. My mother's sister had a house on 23rd Street. In 1940, my father bought a house on the corner of 21st Street, the street where I now live. He paid \$4000 for that house. He eventually bought four lots, including the lot that this house, which was built in 1963, is on. The house was expanded in 1993.



My parents bought the Holiday Snack Bar in 1958 and opened it in 1959. It was in the family for 36 years. Kneeland and I took it over in 1969 or so.

I moved to LBI full-time in 1993. Kneeland retired from teaching at Middlesex County College in 1994 and moved here also.

How did you get involved with Holy Innocents'?

I sang in Island Singers. Mary Biddle accompanied Island Singers and was the organist at Holy Innocents'. She asked me if I would like to sing in the Choir, and I was interested. The people at Holy Innocents' made me feel welcome and comfortable. I knew some of the Choir members from Island Singers. St. James Episcopal Church in Montclair, where I had been a member for most of my life, was considered "basement Episcopal," meaning that there was little ceremony and some of the rituals were lacking or rather simple. Holy Innocents' was quite different and included more rituals and ceremony, which was an adjustment. Of course, I did adjust and am quite comfortable with what occurs here now.

What is your favorite food and drink?

I cannot drink hard liquor but enjoy wine. I enjoy food, especially making new things and experimenting. I enjoy putting things together and seeing what comes out.

What is your favorite season?

I enjoy every season as it comes around, but probably not summer so much.

What is your favorite music?

Anything that doesn't blast my ears. I like some country, show tunes, some opera, classical. My favorite musicals are "Les Miserables," "The Wiz," and "Me and My Girl," especially since the Broadway production starred Jimmy Brennan, who started out at the Surflight Theatre.

What is your favorite line of scripture?

I don't know that I have a favorite line of scripture, but the 23rd Psalm is my favorite psalm.

Is there anything else that we might like to know about you?

I was asked once in an interview what annoys me most. I am annoyed when I call someone on the phone and they act as though it is an imposition to get the call.




