THE PARISH POST



A Word from Father Peter

A community of faith, sharing the love of the Holy Spirit, seeking and serving Christ in his creation.

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Lent is quickly progressing and we are fast approaching Holy Week and Easter. Holy Week marks the most significant week in the Church Year since we celebrate our Lord's Passover through death to new life. The highlight of the week comes with the One Liturgy celebrated over Three Days which begins on Maundy Thursday and concludes with the Easter Vigil. Most of us imagine these as three distinct acts of worship. Unique among all the liturgies of the Church Year, the worship we begin on Maundy Thursday continues on Good Friday and concludes at the Easter Vigil. We isolate these three actions of our Lord, the Last Supper, Arrest and Trial of Jesus, his torture and execution on the cross and his resurrection as three sets of actions without connection with each other. But they consist of one action, Jesus' Paschal Mystery, which brings together into one the actions which happened over these three days. You will notice that on Maundy Thursday, there is no dismissal and no blessing and that same pattern happens on Good Friday. Only at the Easter Vigil are the people blessed and dismissed. By our continued worship across these three days will you experience not three distinct liturgies but one liturgy in three acts.

But there is a deeper mystery which is happening during these three days. Each of us is invited to enter into this mystery of our Lord's dying and rising as a continuous action for us. Every year we experience the deaths of loved ones and friends and the diminishment of our lives through these losses. We also discover that our health needs extra medication to keep our bodies working, extra physical therapy to keep our joints limber, and extra treatments to combat cancer or other illnesses. In our moral lives, we continue that double task of letting go of bad habits and growing in virtue. In our very bodies and souls, we experience this dance of death and life. Spiritually the Great Three Days before Easter invite us to unite ourselves with our Lord in the mystery of his death and rising. We are invited to see once again that the mystery of crucifixion and resurrection not only remembers a past event, but that they are continuing events. The Holy Spirit brings us into a deeper union with Jesus and brings beyond the diminishment of death into the hope of resurrection.

If you have not participated in the three act liturgy of Holy Week, I invite you to enter into this mystery in two ways: exteriorly by your attending these acts of worship and interiorly by uniting your heart to the mystery we celebrate. As we share in our Lord's Body and Blood, as we venerate the Cross, as we see the darkness of the night illuminated by the light of the Paschal Candle, may hope dawn in our hearts as we find God knitting our hearts into the mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection. May you and your loved ones be blessed in your celebration of the Easter Mystery. ~ Peace. Fr. Peter

"COULD YOU NOT STAY AWAKE WITH ME ONE HOUR?"



The tradition of a **Vigil** on Maundy Thursday comes from Jesus' question "Could you not keep awake one hour?" to his disciples, who fell asleep as he prayed in the Garden at Gethsemane before his arrest, trial, and crucifixion.

During the Thursday evening service, **6pm on April 17th** the "reserve sacrament" will be taken into the chapel and placed on the Altar of Repose. You are invited to sign up for an hour to "keep watch" over the Host from 7:30 pm until 11:00pm. We will bring the sacrament back

into the church on Good Friday for the noon service. The sign-up sheet for our overnight vigil will be available in the Narthex on Sunday, April 6th and Sunday April 13th.



Words From Your Wardens



We have gotten through the toughest of our winter weather here on our island. Lenten season is filled with opportunities to listen to God and follow Jesus' word. We are so blessed to have Fr. Peter guiding us with his thoughtful words and practical guidance. Vestry and Buildings & Grounds are looking at a number of capital improvements that need to be addressed. Our Facilities are 50 years old and there is work that needs to be done. Luckily, we are in a good position financially and can complete these updates. The Search Committee has completed the final profile materials and awaits the Diocese's approval to post our opening. Lots happening at Holy Innocents' this month and that doesn't even speak to Holy Week and Easter!

The heating system in church had some winter issues and we had to replace 2 older parts of our boiler system. There is still an issue with the heat in the loft that will be repaired before next winter's cold sets in. Our church air conditioning system has also had issues, as most of you know. An engineer was hired to design the best system for our building and it is currently out to bid. We hope to have a new system before summer.

Next up, will be a refresh of the Rector's office with a new paint job and desk that will be more functional for Fr. Peter and our next priest to use. The laundry room and adjacent room in the Rectory have not been refurbished since prior to Fr. Frank. There is some rot in an exterior wall and carpet that needs to be removed, as well as front steps that need attention. Again, bids are just about complete for this work. The repair of the Memorial Garden wall is another project that is on our docket. As always, please reach out to either of us if you have any questions or concerns.

April Parishioner Spotlight ~ Richard Neff

Meg and I have been Episcopalians all our lives. We were both born in Mount Holly Hospital (as were both of our children), lived in Burlington, NJ, went to St. Mary's Episcopal Church, and came to Long Beach Island in the summer.

In the sixth grade, I got to encounter authentic bay life at the Jersey Shore. My parents bought a new house,



but it wasn't finished, so we moved into our summer home on Mallard Island. What an experience! I got to clam, crab, go boating, and went to the Manahawkin Grade School. I also got to experience the autumnal flooding as I walked through the water to the bus stop on Bay Avenue, which at that time was the entrance to LBI. Eventually the house was completed and, as the bay froze, we finally moved in. We attended St Stephen's Episcopal Church in Beverly, where I was confirmed and belonged to the youth group. Meg continued at St. Mary's where she was confirmed, sang in the choir, and belonged to the youth group. Interestingly we were both leaders of our local youth groups, attending the same convocations but never noticed one another. We both went to Burlington High School, where we met each other and started dating in our senior year.

After high school, I went to Drexel to study engineering and Meg went to Rider to become a teacher. We decided to get married, buy a Cape Cod in Burlington about

two blocks from St. Mary's, where we continued our church life. She was teaching and I worked for DeLaval in Trenton, NJ, a manufacturer of turbomachinery. I also joined the National Guard, which made our life a bit busy, as we were about to have Richard, our first child. The following year, we had Melinda, and it was time to find a bigger house!

We moved to East Windsor, just a few miles from Princeton, into a big five-bedroom colonial home with plenty of ground. Just the right size. We found St. David's Episcopal Mission, which became our new home. At that time services were held in The Peddie School Chapel. About two years later the heating system failed and we spent the winter in a science lecture hall. Meg was hosting the ladies' group in our living room. It was time to build the church!

St. David's had bought a piece of property in Cranbury, so a building committee was formed to design and build our new church. Eventually I became the leader of this venture and still to this day I remember going to the diocese in Trenton to meet with Bishop Van Duzer and his staff to convince them to finance our building. When the building was completed and the church established, I became the first Warden.

In the summer we came down to LBI for weekends and vacations, enjoying both the bay and the ocean. As our children got older, we spent more time on the island. During the summer, Meg and I went to Holy Innocents', which we attended as kids (that was the old church). Our family has now attended Holy Innocents' for five

Holy Innocents' Trip to the Holy Land 2012 Day 8-10

Day 8 Jerusalem

I know dear reader, that it has been some time since our last article in the "Parish Post" but this entry should wrap up Holy Innocents' Episcopal trip to the Holy Land in 2012. A lot has transpired at H.I. since the last entry in 2024, but if anything the parish remains resilient under the leadership of our wardens and vestry and guidance of Father Peter.

Well back to our trip after leaving our hotel we are treated to a beautiful overview of the old city from the Mount of Olives. We can easily see the walls of the old city and a maze of burial monuments that dot the landscape in front of us. We leave the bus and begin a walking tour of the old city of Jerusalem. For many of us actually seeing those places which we long read and heard about now come to life. Our first stop on the walk is the Garden of Gethsemane although the actual garden is no longer there, we sense its presence. Our tour groups begins the stations of the cross along the Via Dolorosa ending at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. Although the stations are numbered several are difficult to navigate. The church is built over the site of the Crucifixion but this building is not the original. That one was built in 326 CE by the Emperor Constantine the first Christian emperor. The site of the church is very busy with numerous pilgrims from many Christian groups: Armenians, Greeks, Copts, Roman Catholics, Ethiopian, and Syrians. Each group jealously guards their prerogatives as we watch Greek Orthodox priests arrive with great fanfare for their time at the Church. After this display is over we are able to enter the site. It is crowded inside but we are able to observe the place where the crucifixion occurred. Leaving the Church we see in the distance the Dome of the Rock, a Muslim mosque whose golden dome dominates the skyline of Jerusalem. Although the site is significant for all three major religions we are unable to visit. Approaching the Wailing Wall we are reminded that this is the last remaining portion of the Second Jewish Temple destroyed by the Romans in 70 CE. The wall is huge over 75 feet high and several hundred feet long. At this point the men and women in our group must separate and visit their own sections of the wall. Orthodox Jews monitor us. Men are required to wear skull caps. We are all required to be modestly dressed (we manage to provide cover for one of our party who wore shorts) Another difference is that men can leave with their backs to the wall, women when they leave must do so facing the wall! Many of us leave prayer messages in the wall. These small scrolls of paper are wedged between the cracks in the wall. Once a year all of these scrolls are removed and burned in a special place.

We continue our walk to the site of the Tomb of David and the Upper Room. It is not the actual Upper Room where Jesus celebrated the Last Supper since the site dates only to the eleventh century. We finally reach our bus and ride back to our hotel another exhausting day almost six miles. Tired we eat at the hotel.

Day 9

Adjacent to our hotel is a large park where we will celebrate Sunday Mass officiated by Father Frank, Mother Karen and Deacon Judy. With some assistance from the hotel everything is in place (they provided the bread) We are situated near a large tree it is sunny and about seventy degrees. A picture perfect day to celebrate communion.

Jackie has brought a chalice from Holy Innocents, it is truly a magical time. We thank God for our amazing time here in Israel and for our safe return home. This is truly the highlight of our trip. We now have free time for the rest of the day, some of our group visit Vad Vashem (the Israeli Memorial to those lost in the

Holocaust), Karen and David attend services at St. George Anglican Church, Gail and Tom to an Italian synagogue while others repair to the hotel to rest. It has been a special day.

Day 10

After breakfast we pack up and leave Jerusalem and head back to our original hotel in Tel Aviv but we will make several stops along the way. First up is the Valley of Elah where David felled Goliath. We also stop at a Trappist Monastery near where the Israelis captured a major road leading to Jerusalem in 1948. Even though we have seen much of ancient Israel the more recent past is always present around us. There are times that we feel that we are in land that is always simmering under the surface ready to flare up at any minute.

We get to Jaffa a beautiful city overlooking the blue waters of the Mediterranean Sea. We walk the narrow streets of this port city and then to Tel Aviv.

We bid farewell to our amazing guide Orna and our faithful bus driver Jehoram, both excellent guides of their native country. Last but not least our rector Father Frank who prepared written materials and guides encouraged us when we faltered and shared with all of us his knowledge of this holy place. I now quote from Father Frank's letters to the parish as our trip unfolded...."the pilgrimage will be a long time setting in our hearts...we are changed irretrievably...changed in ways that have yet to emerge..."

What a special and transforming trip this has been...those who are still with us here at Holy Innocents: Jackie and King Sparks, Karen and David Mitchell, Judy Hamilton, Leila Sullivan, Judy Krom, Kay and Mike DeCicco, Gail and Tom Jacobsen. And those who have passed: Marilyn and Phil Flagler. Also the major work done by Rob Meyer in setting up the trip. I hope you have enjoyed this short version of this trip. There are travel books and pamphlets in our church library (Vestry Room) and feel free to ask questions of those who went. The group truly felt we were representing all here at Holy Innocents'. ~ *Tom Jacobsen*

Classic Ambrosia Salad



Ingredients

1/2 cup sour cream

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

8 ounces whipped topping (Can use Cool Whip) thawed until it's easily spreadable

1 (11 ounce) can mandarin oranges drained

1 (8 ounce) can pineapple tidbits drained

1 cup mini marshmallows

1 cup sweetened shredded coconut

1 cup maraschino cherries drained

Instructions

- 1. Add the sour cream and vanilla extract to a large bowl and combine until smooth. Gently stir in the Cool Whip.
- 2. Fold in the remaining ingredients with a spatula. You can eat it right away, but recommend covering the bowl and chilling it for a few hours first to help the flavors meld.


