A Word from Father Peter

A community of faith, sharing the love of the Holy Spirit, seeking and serving Christ in his creation.

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

As we come into May we shall celebrate many wonderful events and days. Perhaps chief among the May celebrations will be Mother's Day. We celebrate the Mothers among us and the Mothers who have died. We celebrate outstanding Mothers and Mothers who could not come up to the challenges of this difficult task. Because of our different experiences of our Mothers, this day can bring either great joy or great sorrow.

One of the ways to celebrate Mother's Day is to recall that God is our Mother. We regularly pray to God as our Father during the Holy Eucharist. How many of us imagine that God is also our Mother. Most of us seldom pray to God as our Mother. Indeed the Scripture and Christian tradition invite us to see God as our Mother. Jesus compared himself in his agony to a birthing Mother: When a woman is giving birth, she has sorrow because her hour has come, but when she has delivered the baby, she no longer remembers the anguish, for joy that a human being has been born into the world. (John 16: 21) Julian of Norwich, a 15th century English anchoress, took this image from John's Gospel and expanded it into a prayer: "Our mothers bear us for pain and for death; our true mother, Jesus, bears us for joy and endless life. Christ carried us within him in love and travail, until the full time of his passion. And when all was completed and he had carried us so for joy, still all this could not satisfy the power of his wonderful love." In 1998, the Episcopal Church authorized prayers for use in the church which present images of God as our Mother. The prayer of Julian of Norwich which I quoted above, is one of those prayers. Three new Eucharistic Prayers were also approved for our use. Eucharistic Prayer 2 prays to God as our Mother: "You made us in your image, and taught us to walk in your ways. But we rebelled against you, and wandered far away; and yet, as a mother cares for her children, you would not forget us. Time and again you called us to live in the fullness of your love."

For those of us whose mothers have died, some of us have discovered that God comes into the emotional void which their deaths create in our hearts by discovering God as our Mother. For some of us, this approach to God may seem unusual and challenging. I invite you to consider God not only as your Father but also as your Mother. Such an expansive vision of God will bring you to discover new depths in the mystery of God. We believe that humans are created in the image of God and so we can discover the feminine divine image by praying to God as our Mother. On Mother's Day, I plan to preach on God as our Mother to open up this way of imaging God for us. It would also be an opportune time for us to use Eucharistic Prayer 2

which prays to God as our Mother. I realize how challenging this approach to God may be for some of you. I invite you to try to imagine God as your Mother and discover the depths of the mystery of God which may open up for you. Peace. Fr. Peter

"We Believe In One God" - Ecumenical prayer service to mark 1700th anniversary of Council of Nicaea

Christians from different churches will gather at St. Robert Bellarine Co-Cathedral, 61 Georgia Rd. in Freehold Township New Jersey on **Saturday, May 3, 2025 at 11 A.M.** to celebrate the 1700th Anniversary of the Council of Nicaea which produced the first version of the Nicene Creed which we profess on most Sundays during our worship. The Nicene Creed is used by many of the Christian Churches as the standard of the Christian Faith and is recited at many Sunday worship events. The event will feature Morning Prayer which is mostly taken from the Book of Common Prayer. Two homilies will be preached, one from the Western Church perspective and another from the Eastern Church perspective. The creed will be prayed in both its original Greek and in English.

This year also brings another ecumenical event when Christians from both the Eastern and Western Churches celebrated Easter on the same day. Since the Eastern Churches follow the Julian calendar and the Western Churches follow the Gregorian calendar, the date of Easter is usually on different days. The late Pope Francis had asked that Christians come to a common date for the celebration of Easter. The Eastern Churches are asking that the day be set by their Julian calendar. Some Christians are proposing a date in April which would not change. Presently the date of Easter is set as the First Sunday following the first full moon after the Spring Equinox.

While the form of the Nicene Creed used in most Western churches today was amended at the Council of Constantinople in 381, and again by the Council of Chalcedon in 451, it was in 325 in Nicaea at the First Ecumenical Council where it initially took form and was adopted. The creed in use in the Eastern Orthodox churches never included the filioque, "...and of the son," regarding the procession of the Holy Spirit. As the filioque is considered neither heretical or necessary, it will be omitted in the creed used at the service as a sign of unity. The Episcopal Church will be removing the filioque in the next edition of the prayer book, and many parishes have been using that version, available in Enriching Our Worship 1, for years.

French Toast Casserole Recipe, by Lil'Luna

This best loved French toast casserole is perfect for making ahead of time for Mother's Day celebrations!

Ingredients

1 Loaf of sourdough bread (or brioche, challah or French bread)

8 Large Eggs

2 Cups Milk

1/2 Cup Heavy Cream

1 Tablespoon Vanilla Extract

3/4 Cup Sugar

Topping

1/2 Cup All-purpose Flour

1/2 Cup packed light brown sugar

1 Teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/4 Teaspoon salt

1/2 Cup cold unsalted butter, cut into pieces

Instructions

Cut bread into 1-inch cubes and scatter evenly in greased 9 x 13 inch baking dish.

In a medium bowl, mix eggs, milk, heavy cream, vanilla, and sugar together, then pour evenly overly bread. Cover the dish with plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least 4 hours, or overnight.

To make the topping, mix flour, brown sugar, cinnamon, and salt in a medium bowl. Cut butter into this mixture until crumbly. Place the topping in a small resealable plastic bag and refrigerate overnight as well. When ready to bake, preheat the oven to 350 degrees F.

Unwrap the baking dish and sprinkle the topping evenly over the bread.

Bake, uncovered, for 45-60 minutes, depending on how soft you like it. YUM!

May Parishioner Spotlight ~ Carl De Franco

Carl is the husband of our Supply Priest, Father Peter De Franco.

I grew up in Morris County, NJ, and my family lived in Denville, the hub of Morris County. Although LBI and Holy Innocents' are in the same state as Denville, being in a beach community feels very different. What a gift it has been coming to Holy Innocents'! The church is beautiful and a lovely place to worship. It has a unique structure in it which I haven't seen in any Episcopal church--a baldachino, the canopy above the altar. At the heart of the church is its true treasure--the parishioners of Holy Innocents'. When I heard Bishop Sally French say in her sermon that many clergy of our diocese say that they hold our church in high esteem, it confirmed my feelings. There is so much to like about Holy Innocents'.

My career was in RF microwave electronics manufacturing. I was a planner for production and prototype orders. I started in Merrimac Industries in West Caldwell, NJ. Then I went to Anghel Labs in Rockaway, NJ, which was purchased by General Dynamics. I retired from Pulsar Microwave Corporation in Clifton, NJ. These companies created components for satellite communications, and also did some military and government work. One major highlight of my career involved the former owner and president, Sever Anghel. He designed the tracking device that went into the fuse of the Patriot Missile. Our customers for those components were Raytheon and Bendix, who assembled the missiles. The first real world use for the Patriots was in Gulf War One. In news footage, we could see the U.S. missiles knocking out the Scud Missiles. Sever also created flat antennas that were initially installed along runways to help air planes land easier. The antennas were used in the early 1980s. Technology has changed radically since then.

In 1994, on Christmas Eve, I met the love of my life. Peter had come to my church, the Church of the Redeemer, in Morristown, NJ, for the Christmas Eve service. It is a big church and was very crowded. At the time of the Peace, everyone moved out into the main isle to shake hands, hug, and wish Merry Christmas. It was very loud and as I moved along the isle hugging people, Peter and I hugged...but as we pulled away, we just looked at each other. For a moment, time stood still...and quiet. The service finished and a friend of mine who knew Peter introduced us in the parish hall. We talked for the rest of the evening. It was a unique start to a unique life.

Peter, a former Roman Catholic, quickly assimilated into Episcopal church life. Although I am of 100% British descent, my family was Presbyterian. However, when I joined the Episcopal Church, being part of the Anglican Communion was a perfect fit for me. Within three years of our meeting, Peter began the ordination process, which is an amazing thing to observe behind the scenes.

Over the 20 years that Peter was a rector, I was involved with many programs. Our first church was St. Peter's Church in Clifton, NJ. I worked as a volunteer in the food pantry. I later joined the board of directors for St. Peter's Homeless Shelter and Food Pantry. I participated in something special for our Blessing of the Animals

service. The vestry asked me to dress as St. Francis in a friar's habit for the service so people could have their pet's pictures taken with St. Francis. I reluctantly agreed but it turned out to be fun and a big hit. We continued doing it for many years.

After a few years, I started and ran St. Peter's Market Fair, a vendor flea market. It ran twice a month for 9 years. We brought in over \$130,000 for the church.

Our next church was St. John the Baptist in Linden, NJ. I started the Market Fair there and it ran for a few years, although we stopped it because of Covid. Once the church got back up and running, I put a team together to create a permanent gift shop in the church basement. It was very successful and has been running for about three years.

I would like to include a personal note to bring attention to an autoimmune disease. I have Sjogren's Syndrome. This is a disease that affects glands that make liquid. In my case, an outward symptom is my swollen glands. My mother had this disease along with another autoimmune disease called Sclera Derma. Sjogren's Syndrome is not generally known. Now in retirement, I have gotten back into writing again. I had previously written the lyrics to a song for which a composer wrote the music. He also sings the song. Once the song was recorded, I created the video for it which you can find on YouTube under My True Only by Shawn Gallaway (musician) and Carl Gincley (my original name). I wrote the song after a beautiful vacation in England. The song is dedicated to England and to love, human and divine. There is more information about the song on the website mytrueonly.org. The writing project I am now working on is to finish a trilogy of children's books for which I had previously written full outlines. I have partnered with two other people who will be finishing the trilogy with me, as well as working on several other stories.

HORSESHOE CRABS 101

Horseshoe crab peak mating season is from mid-May to mid-June.

Here is a short introduction to these remarkable creatures and what to look for on some of our bay beaches in the upcoming weeks during the evening hours.

They look almost like dark brown hubcaps and move like army tanks. Their name comes from their shape, which is similar to a horse's hoof. Females are, in general, about 20% larger than males. Although they are called crabs, they are actually more closely related to arachnids like spiders and scorpions, than to true crabs. Horseshoe crabs are prehistoric: they have not undergone significant evolutionary change in over 400 million years, almost 200 million years before the first dinosaurs.

There are three divisions to the body. The prosoma is found at the front of the body and contains the heart, brain, and digestive system. The opisthosoma is found in the middle of the body and consists mostly of the muscles that control the animal's gills and tail. Last is the tail (known as the telson), which horseshoe crabs use to right themselves if they are upturned by waves during spawning.

Horseshoe crabs have six pairs of legs. The first is known as the chelicerae and is used for placing food in its mouth. The next pair is known as the pedipalps; they are used for walking, but in males they are modified into boxing-glove-like claspers and additionally used for grasping the female during spawning. The remaining four pairs of legs are the pushers and are used for moving. Further towards its tail are the gills, which are used for both breathing and for assisting to push itself through the water.

Though possessing a somewhat fierce appearance due to their sharp-looking tails, angular exoskeletons, and many claws, horseshoe crabs are completely harmless to humans. Their claws have a weak grip, and they do not bite or use their tails as a weapon.

Horseshoe crab blood contains a substance called Limulus amebocyte lysate (also known as LAL), which clots in the presence of bacteria. For this reason, it is valuable in the pharmaceutical industry, which uses it to test for contamination of drugs and medical equipment. Though crabs used for this purpose are returned to the ocean, it is estimated that between 10% and 30% die as a result of the process.

Because of this high demand for horseshoe crabs, populations along the East Coast, and particularly in Delaware Bay, are in serious decline. The Atlantic horseshoe crab is currently considered "Near Threatened" by the IUCN.

While not currently listed as a <u>threatened</u> species by the State of New Jersey, there is currently a moratorium on the harvest of horseshoe crabs within the state. With this law, it is illegal to remove a horseshoe crab, dead or alive, from its habitat in the wild.

Complicating the issue is the fact that at least 11 different species of shorebird rely on horseshoe crab eggs as their primary food source for about 2-3 weeks during their migration. These birds are migrating to their breeding grounds in the Arctic, some from as far away as the southern tip of South America, and the availability of nutrient-rich crab eggs during this time is critical. Recent declines in the horseshoe crab population have triggered similar and more drastic declines in shorebird populations. Even though immediate action may not be needed to save the Atlantic horseshoe crab from extinction, immediate protection of horseshoe crabs is necessary to protect the species that rely on them.


