HAPPY EASTER!!

Now that Lent is over and Spring is springing out all about, I want to invite and encourage you to REJOICE and to do it out loud, as the spring does! If you're a plant person, maybe plant something that you can watch grow during these 50 days of Easter. If not, maybe try a meditation for each day before you head out and about for your day. Whatever it is, try something new for the 50 days of Easter. Some ideas:

- Use a special candle at family meals to recall the light of Christ.
- Every day, read together from the Easter story: Matthew 28; Mark 16; Luke 24; John 20-21.
- Plan fun family activities—one for every week of Easter.
- Learn to cook something new each week
- Write a prayer for someone a couple of times per week
- Send a card of thanks to someone who positively influenced your life
- Invite someone to coffee/tea or lunch who you just met at church
- Visit a lonely neighbor or do some other family act of kindness to express thanks for the resurrection.
- Pay it forward at the counter with treating someone to a coffee or a meal (or portion)
- Take a walk in a park
- Learn how other cultures celebrate Easter. Try out some of their customs and foods.
- Discuss what it means to be Christ's "witnesses" (Luke 24:48)? Help each family member to see that their witness matters.
- Wear more white, or even gold! They're the season's special colors.

- Pray Noonday prayer
- On Ascension Thursday, choose a family intention. Make the nine days from then until Pentecost a novena to the Holy Spirit.
- Decorate a cake with Pentecost flames and other symbols to celebrate the birthday of the church.

Environmental Education and Advocacy Committee

A dishwasher saves water... Wondering what the water consumption of dishwashing is? Let's look at how much water you would use if you hand-washed a full load of dishes instead of using a Bosch dishwasher*. Surprisingly, with hand washing you actually use around 10.5 gallons of water, but with a dishwasher you only use 2.5 gallons of water. This means you would save up to 8 gallons of water per rinse cycle compared to washing your dishes under running water.

If you run your dishwasher 280 cycles per year, that is a savings of up to 2245 gallons of water yearly! We don't run our church dishwashers that much, but it is good to keep this in mind whenever you are working in the kitchen here...or at home. Fill that dishwasher with whatever fits! You will save energy as well, while also being a good steward of the environment. *Bosch dishwasher data used as we have these in our new kitchen and the rectory. ~ *Rob Meyer*

April Parishioner Spotlight ~ The Rev. Canon Karin R. Mitchell

My name is Karin Mitchell and I have been attending Holy Innocents' for about 30 years. I *did* attend services once in the original building as a pre-teen, but that was long ago. My connection with this church deepened when I served here in 2001 as a Summer Seminarian. It was a great experience for me, with a great mentor and very patient congregation! I learned how to preach and visit the sick, as well as teach Vacation Bible School! I made so many new friends that summer; many of whom I still love and cherish. I was ordained to the Priesthood in 2002 at Holy Innocents' and soon after left to begin my journey as a Vicar and then Rector. Since then, I have had

I enjoyed my time as a parish priest immensely, and am happy I can continue to serve our diocese and its people in retirement. I have found that there is a great need for Supply Priests and try to help when I can. I am President of the Rocky Brook Garden Club and on the Board of Directors of Rise, a Community Action Service Center in Hightstown. I am also on the leadership committee of the League of Women Voters of the Greater Princeton Area. I enjoy reading, gardening, exercise, going to NYC and the theater, and, of course, the beach.

Dave and I love to spend time with family, taking care of the boys and doing fun things with them. It takes two of us to manage them, but it is always fun. We also enjoy traveling and have been as far as Israel (with friends from Holy Innocents'), South Africa, The Galapagos Islands and Machu Pichu, but Europe is our favorite place to visit. We have trips planned to Egypt and Antarctica in the next few years and hope to get back to Aruba, our second favorite island.

Holy Innocents' Trip to the Holy Land 2012 Day 7

The itinerary for the day will be switched so we can be at the Dead Sea area prior to the Sabbath. We board out bus for a two hour trip to the area. Halfway to our destination we take a short break and while there we are enticed by local vendors to ride camels! Jackie Sparks, Judy Hamilton. Judy Krom, Father Frank, Gail & Tom Jacobsen take the bait. Fortunately, we do not gallop alone into the desert, but are led by able guides who proceed to take us around a corral. The most difficult task is getting on and off the beasts. Our fearless leader looks particularly majestic on his camel. Back aboard our bus, we stop briefly at Qumran the cave site where the lost Dead Sea Scrolls were found by herders in 1947. These herders were searching for lost sheep when in a cave they found several earthen jars inside which were several carefully wrapped parchments. We now know that these parchments contain the earliest examples of books from the old testament (Isaiah among them). A group called the Essenes fearing the invading Romans, took steps to hide these writings.

Our next stop is a shop called Ahave where all manner of skin and beauty products are made and sold. It is overheard at the shop "Now this is more like it!" We quickly look at all the items on sale and purchase some. The products are all made from materials from the Dead Sea area. (hint you can find them at Ulta).

After leaving the air conditioned emporium, we approach Masada a large mesa with towering cliffs where the Zealots (who opposed Roman invaders) held out for more than three years against one of the foremost legions of the Roman Empire 67 to 70 CE. Masada is now an Israeli National Park and can be ascended in one of two ways: by foot along a path called the snake road or by an 80 passenger cable car. It being over 90 degrees, most elect to take the easier route. If memory serves me right, David Mitchell and a few others took the path down no mean feat. Built as a fortress retreat by Herod the Great, it featured two palaces equipped with hot baths and luxurious rooms. Herod was always concerned that the populace would rise up against him so this citadel would protect him and his minions. A group of rebels or patriots captured Masada in 66 CE and proceeded to hold out over the Romans. The Romans took three years to build a ramp up one side of the Masada and eventually scaled the walls of the retreat. To their astonishment, there were no survivors as the Jews all committed suicide rather than be enslaved by their conquers. Masada is well preserved including storage buildings, animal pens, several huge cisterns, hot baths among others. An added plus to this visit was the cool breezes we experienced while we were there.

Our last point of interest was the Dead Sea itself. Located some 1,400 fee below sea level, it is the lowest point on our planet. Today, it is a major tourist attraction for those wishing to float in its high salt content waters. Many of us take advantage of this lake but are warned to avoid water on our faces and to float only on our backs as the waters are also quite toxic. We all float easily in the blue waters but Father Frank. "How come everyone else can float, but I cannot? On that note our long but astounding day is over and we head back to our hotel in Jerusalem.
