The Parson's Place

Christmas is HERE so enjoy every moment! These twelve days end on January 6th at The Epiphany, but I challenge you to keep Christmas the entire year. Now, that doesn't mean you shouldn't eventually take down a dry tree bereft of needles...I'm talking about keeping it in your hearts. Since my tree is plastic, I can transform it into a *Mardi gras* tree, one of New Orleans' many unique traditions I enjoy.

We are also at the new year, a time when we want to wipe the slate clean and begin again. First, that is a completely normal feeling. There is nothing like anticipation and there's nothing like a new beginning. And now we are about to be in 2023. To begin again means that we must give ourselves the gift of permission to stop and simply "be" in the present, to rejoice in *the now of Christ*.

A couple of things I hope you'll consider for today: First, a bit of a "new tradition" here at HI. Think about what you'd like to let go of for the new year and what you'd like to take on. Write these on a small slip of paper and burn them in your next fire. At church today, I will burn them after our morning service. Those ashes will be mixed into our Ash Wednesday ashes, just like the palms from last Palm Sunday. This first fire of 2023 will symbolize our continuing transformation and purifying hopes for the new year. Next, I am going to offer house blessings during the six weeks of Epiphany so please let

me know if you are interested in having that done. There will also be a video instruction coming of chalking your doors for Epiphany, an old and beautiful custom in many countries. Watch for that on our Church Facebook page as well as after our Epiphany service (6:00 p.m. January 6^{th} .)

The *New Year Carol* was included by Walter de la Mare in his anthology of poems for children, *Tom Tiddler's Ground* (1931). In 1936, Benjamin Britten composed a tune for it. The "levy dew" in the chorus may be a corruption of either Old English *levedy* ("lady") or French *Levez à Dieu* ("Raise to God"), used for the elevation of the host at communion. The latter also explains the water and the wine in the following words. The "seven bright gold wires" might be the strings of a golden harp.

Waverly Fitzgerald has another explanation in <u>School of the Seasons: New Year's Carols</u>:

Trefor Owen [*Welsh Folk Customs*, St. Fagans, 1974] describes the context for this song in Wales. Very early on New Year's Day about three or four o'clock in the morning, groups of boys came round to the houses in the neighborhood, carrying a vessel of cold spring water, freshly drawn, and twigs of box, holly, myrtle, rosemary or other evergreens. They sprinkled the hands and face of anyone they met for a copper or two. In every house, each room was sprinkled with New Year's water and the residents, who were often still in bed, wished a Happy New Year. For this service and wish they were also gifted with coins. The doors of those houses which were closed to them were sprinkled with the water. The verse was sung during the sprinkling.

In certain parts of Wales this custom is called *dwr newy* (literally, new water). The exact meaning of the phrase, "levy dew" is unknown, although there have been attempts to trace it to *llef I Dduw* (Welsh for "cry to God") and some believe it to mean a partially French exclamation of "Raise to God". This seems to be an imposition of a Christian interpretation on a much older custom. Although the fair maid is now equated with the Virgin, Owen thinks it likely that this custom derives from "an early well-cult made acceptable to medieval Christianity by its association with the Virgin and perpetuated both by the desire to wish one's neighbor well at the beginning of a new year and by the small monetary payment involved."

Our logo, with a circle of people holding hands, represents our connections to each other and our collaboration. It was this circle that jumpstarted the idea of building a labyrinth together. We hope you enjoyed participating and celebrating together!

October 30th: Our campaign concluded with pledges blessed on the altar followed by Fellowship & Firepits. A delicious brunch with coffee and hot cider was served outside around the fires. Parishioners had the opportunity to walk the labyrinth that we created and enjoy fellowship on a sunny afternoon.

To date, we have 59 pledging families for 2023; there are likely still a few pledges that will come in. Of these, we have 4 new pledging families and a few that have returned to pledging this year. That is significant good news! Our total pledge is \$177,454. This is a small decrease of 3.5% from last year (2022 total pledge was \$183,861) which we hope to make up with final pledges that may come in. Our congregation continues to be generous in their support to Holy Innocents'!

I'd like to thank my committee: Chris Burlaga, Ellen Dondero, and Bruce Hillyer for their hard work, creative ideas, proofreading, and baking. I am also grateful for those who happily helped collate our mailings, the support of the Wardens, Vestry and Mother Caroline.

From Our Minister of Music




Please give special thanks to our choir members who have given of their time and talent this fall, offering beautiful music to enhance our worship services. We had a very busy and fulfilling end to the year!

The greeters can help usher and they greet worshipers both before AND after the service, **making every attempt to make them feel welcomed and at ease**. Dishing with the Deacon

We have completed Advent and Christmas, a time of reflection and preparation for the birth of our Savior. Advent is a time when we think about how we could change our lives and become worthy of the Savior born to us again. It is also a time, as in the start of a New Year, when we think about setting goals for ourselves. These are times when God can talk to us.

And then there are those times when what seems unexpected, an idea leads us to reconsider what we are doing. Do you ever think: "I have to stop eating all that sugar, or my smoking is making me sick, or I know I drink too much, maybe I should be..." These are times when God can talk to us.

He talks to us in lots of ways especially about what he wants us to do. I remember how he told me to become a deacon. I was sitting in Saint Andrews Episcopal Church in Syracuse, NY, 30+ years ago. I was waiting for the service to start. I was reading the bulletin and there was an insert describing the revitalization of the ancient order of deacons in the church. The description of the role and the person who would fit this role was a description of me and what I wanted to do with my life. GOD'S VOICE! I took this to my priest, and he said this constituted a call to the deaconate. It took me 15 years to do it and I have never been happier.

God, through the Holy Spirit, can talk to us in many different ways such as a friend, Scripture, your priest or deacon, a sermon, a spiritual book you may be reading. God's voice is quiet, we need to listen carefully.

May your New Year be full of good things, especially God's voice. Happy New Year!

I was born in Phoenixville Hospital in Phoenixville, PA. My mother told me that I was the loudest baby in the nursery. My parents named me Mary Ellen Erskine, but soon after that, the "Mary" was dropped and I became just "Ellen."

I grew up on a farm in Audubon, PA, about a 15-minute drive from Phoenixville. I loved my childhood living in a three-generations household... grandparents, parents, and my sister and me.



Bill and I almost grew up together since we were in the same home room since 8th grade. We have been married for 52 years. We have three wonderful boys, three delightful

daughters in law, and five energetic and talented grandchildren.

We lived and worked in Coudersport, Potter County, PA, for 37 years. The picture taken on the lake was at Lake Arthur in Moraine Park, Butler County, PA.

My career consisted of one job... I taught elementary school for 33 extremely rewarding years.

When we moved permanently to Long Beach Island in 2009, it fulfilled my dream to live here. My great grandmother vacationed here in the early 20^{th} century and that began the next four generations doing the



same. My parents owned a seasonal Cape Cod "Shapiro" house, and we enjoyed many happy summers there.

Being a "cradle" Episcopalian, and with Bill joining the Episcopal Church 30 years ago, we naturally attended a morning service at Holy Innocents' and were introduced to Father Frank... need I say more?!!! We found our



forever church home.

Although we live in Holgate, the hub of my community life is in Beach Haven. I'm active at Surflight, LBI Museum, Beach Haven Community Arts Program, and, of course, Holy Innocents'.

Although I usually usher at Surflight, in 2019, I had a role in *Flashdance* as Ms. Wilde, the administrator of Shipley Academy. I am on the left of the picture here, not one of the dancers.

The final part of this saga concerns something that you might be surprised to know about me. It involves a history lesson.

I am a descendant of a Quaker named Lewis Walker, a Welsh yeoman, who sailed from Wales to Radner, PA, in 1687. He became the first settler in Tredyffrin Township in 1705. This area would become known as Valley Forge. Many of my Quaker descendants lived in Valley Forge during the 1777-1778 Encampment. They were known as The Society of Friends. Due to their religious beliefs, they did not join the forces to fight in the Revolutionary War, however they were sympathetic to the cause and many offered their homes to several generals and other important figures during the Encampment. They included General La Fayette, General Knox, Baron de Kalb, and Count du Portails, who was Washington's mapmaker.

My DAR (Daughters of the American Revolution) connection is a woman named Sarah Walker. "She was a kind, benevolent woman who cared deeply for the plight of the soldiers and persuaded her cousin, General Anthony Wayne, not to have five deserters shot. Because of her pleading voice, he pardoned them."

(This passage is quoted from an ancestral book of the Walkers, my ancestors. The person who wrote the quote is unknown.)

Kitchen Renovation!!

The Kitchen Committee, Larry & Pat Peacock, Ellen Dondero and myself, have been busy these past few weeks. I'm happy to announce that our Vestry has approved our plans and budget for the kitchen renovation! We have finalized the layout and design details for the kitchen & cabinetry. Larry has met with 3 contractors and has estimates from two of them. We've met with remediation companies for tile floor & asbestos removal and have estimates. We also have estimates for new flooring.

We've ordered our cabinetry and are working with Francie Milano Kitchens, Inc. of Ship Bottom. Delivery date for the cabinetry is middle to end of April at this time.

My hero, our illustrious treasurer, Larry Peacock, has come up with a very realistic budget & cost funding that does allow for Martin Hall and ante rooms to be remediated and tile replaced at the same time as the kitchen! Hooray!


