For whatever it means for you, I hope you will keep it close to your heart.

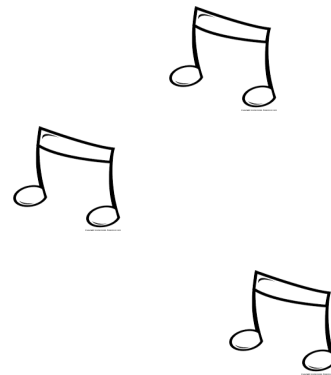
### ***We Gather Together***

1 We gather together to ask the Lord's blessing;  
he chastens and hastens his will to make known;  
the wicked oppressing now cease from distressing;  
sing praises to his name; he forgets not his own.

2 Beside us to guide us, our God with us joining,  
ordaining, maintaining his kingdom divine;  
so from the beginning the fight we were winning;  
thou, Lord, wast at our side: all glory be thine!

3 We all do extol thee, thou leader triumphant,  
and pray that thou still our defender wilt be.  
Let thy congregation endure through tribulation:  
thy name be ever praised! O Lord, make us free!

This hymn was originally a Dutch patriotic song, written around 1600 to celebrate the freedom of the Netherlands from Spanish rule. However, God's kingdom transcends national and ethnic boundaries. When the Church sings this hymn, she is reminded of the words of the apostle Paul: "For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places" (Ephesians 6:12, ESV). The day will come when God will overthrow the devil and all evil. Even now, we can say, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (Psalm 46:1). In singing this hymn, the people of God seek His help and thank Him for His presence in the pursuit of victory over evil, for we know that God "forgets not His own."

## Until All Are Free

Godwin was a bright young boy who loved to learn in school. When he was 16 years old, a woman claiming to be his relative offered to take him on a trip to meet his extended family. Godwin, still committed to his studies, brought his schoolbooks so he could study on the trip.

Instead of taking him to his extended family, the woman sold Godwin to a man on a remote fishing island on Lake Volta. Suddenly alone, Godwin was forced to fish for the traffickers the very next day. They even threw Godwin's books away, saying "there will be no free time for learning."

For nearly three years, Godwin was trapped with several other trafficked children who were beaten when they didn't meet their trafficker's demands. When the fishing nets got caught on submerged trees, they would have to dive and untangle them from the bottom of the lake. They feared that they might get caught in the nets and never make it back to the surface.

**Thousands of children like Godwin are still suffering.**

Mom means something special to each of us: kindness, bravery, compassion, care, hard-work, strength and certainly inspiration. Chandamma exemplifies all the things a mom can be. Except for one thing—she wasn't free.

She spent day after day in an Indian silkworm factory twisting the silk thread used to make saris. Ironically, saris she could never afford herself. This silk thread was like her: strong, valuable, resilient. Yet it stripped her of her freedom each day she spent in forced labor.

How did she wind up trapped here? Like any mom, she just wanted to give her son a better life. **Every mom should have the freedom to be the mom she wants to be for her child.**

## Butternut Squash Soup

This vegan butternut squash soup is the ultimate fall comfort food!

Store it in the fridge for up to 4 days, or freeze it for up to a few months.

Prep Time: 10 mins. Cook time: 35 mins. Total time: 45 mins. Serves 6

### Ingredients

2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil  
1 large yellow onion, chopped  
½ teaspoon sea salt  
1 (3-pound) butternut squash, peeled, seeded, and cubed  
3 garlic cloves, chopped  
1 tablespoon chopped fresh sage  
½ tablespoon minced fresh rosemary  
1 teaspoon grated fresh ginger  
3 to 4 cups vegetable broth  
Freshly ground black pepper



### For serving

Chopped parsley  
Toasted pepitas  
Crusty bread

### Instructions

1. Heat the oil in a large pot over medium heat. Add the onion, salt, and several grinds of fresh pepper and sauté until soft, 5 to 8 minutes. Add the squash and cook until it begins to soften, stirring occasionally, for 8 to 10 minutes.
2. Add the garlic, sage, rosemary, and ginger. Stir and cook 30 seconds to 1 minute, until fragrant, then add 3 cups of the broth. Bring to a boil, cover, and reduce heat to a simmer. Cook until the squash is tender, 20 to 30 minutes.
3. Let cool slightly and pour the soup into a blender, working in batches if necessary, and blend until smooth. If your soup is too thick, add up to 1 cup more broth and blend. Season to taste and serve with parsley, pepitas, and crusty bread.

## Easy Cranberry Sauce

PREP TIME: 5 minutes COOK TIME: 10 minutes TOTAL TIME: 15 minutes Servings: 8

Nothing says “holidays” more than the tangy flavor of full-bodied homemade cranberry sauce!

### Ingredients

12 ounces cranberries (about 3 cups)  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup water or orange juice  
1 cinnamon stick



**Instructions:** Combine all ingredients in a saucepan over medium heat. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer 10-12 minutes uncovered. Cool and serve. Sauce will thicken upon cooling.

Fav Colors: Blue (God is PSU fan) and Green (grass, trees...)

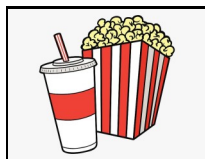
Music: 90's alternative, Rock & Roll, Country and Classical

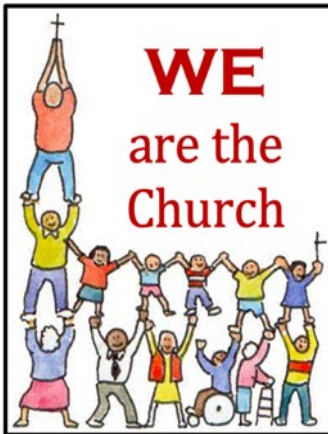
