### The Parson's Place

Have you noticed the Monarch butterflies appearing on the island and in our Memorial Garden? I have and it warms my heart to see them in goodly number. It reminds me that even if I do not like summer, there are things that I do appreciate, like the flitting beauty and symbolism of the butterfly. Why don't I like summer? First, I detest the heat. That may sound weird, because you know I'm from New Orleans. Where I grew up in SC, the summers were as long as the winters are here and there just wasn't the relief that I sought. Here, I find that even though the summer is quite pretty and pleasantly tolerable (mostly), my old habits die hard. I count the minutes of lost daylight since the summer solstice to try and speed on the Fall (my fav. season!) We've lost 45 minutes and one second from June 21<sup>st</sup> to today (Aug.  $1^{st}$ ) and that is cause for rejoicing in my book! What is it about the darkness that is so exciting for me and the sunlight that is terrific for others? How does the Holy Spirit enter into our rhythms of day and night and the seasons? How do we feel time and how do we perceive the timelessness and agelessness of God? As believers, we tend to be comforted that God is with us, in the now. We live in a physical world with its known space-time dimensions of length, width, height (or depth) and time. However, God, though dwelling with us, also dwells in a different realm, a "spirit realm", beyond the perception of our physical senses.

God is not limited by the physical laws and dimensions that govern our physical world we know. Because of our finite minds, we grasp the concept of God's timeless existence in part. And in so doing, we describe God as without a specific beginning or end....eternal, infinite, everlasting, etc. For me personally, the shortening of day length sets off a series of mystical feelings and brings forth an awareness of our brief, temporal physical nature. Just like the return of the monarchs show me their brief lifespan and their beauty and movements are symbols of life and joy, for me the simple reminder that we too will be transformed and that we will one day migrate through this transitory life come as part of God's grand mystery. It both keeps be grounded that I am not immune to life's movements and cycles, but also holds me to the philosophy that I can choose joy as I live.





# **Environmental Education and Advocacy Committee**

Thank you to our friends at the **Ocean Conservancy** for introducing us to one of our local marine creatures:



### Mussel MYTILIDAE



Although you might not have seen mussels in the wild, you have likely seen them on a menu! Mussels are very popular as food and are quite nutritious as well. They're low in sodium and saturated fat and a good source of Vitamins B and C, Omega 3 fatty acids and minerals like iron, manganese, phosphorus and potassium. In the wild, mussels affix themselves to rocks or other mussels on the ocean floor using their hair-like "beards," also called byssal threads. These threads are made of chitin, a fibrous substance, and are incredibly strong, which helps them stay safely in place during strong tides and storms. But since mussels can't move, they need a backup plan to survive tough times. Mussels can shut their shells tightly during low tide so they don't dry out!

Mussels are filter feeders, meaning they filter ocean water through their bodies to grab plankton. Mussels filter massive amounts of water (over 17 gallons a day) and are therefore vulnerable to what ends up in the ocean. Their numbers can drop if there are increased amounts of runoff or coastal erosion (which is when you would want MORE animals filtering the water, right?).

#### **Did You Know?**

Mussels have incredibly strong byssal threads. They can hold onto wood, iron and even steel. Scientists are trying to decode their secrets in order to develop a mussel-based adhesive to use in eye surgeries.

#### **Status and Conservation**

Mussels have had a history with humans for quite a long time. Archaeological evidence suggests people have been cultivating mussels for about 800 years in Europe and eating mussels for more than 20,000 years! Unfortunately, they're particularly vulnerable to ocean acidification, which occurs when carbon emissions are absorbed by the ocean and the water becomes more acidic. This makes it harder for mussels to build their shells, which is bad for the environment and bad for business!


### **New Book Study!**

#### August Parishioner Spotlight ~ Diane Carter

I was born in Fortitude Valley, an inner-city suburb of Brisbane, Queensland, Australia. "The Valley" as it is called, is now the red light district of Brisbane. My earliest memory is of being in the family car which my mother had parked on the street outside our house in the suburb of St. Lucia, near the University of Queensland. St. Lucia is a very hilly place. My mother went into the house, leaving me and my older sister, Robyn, in the car. She apparently had not set the hand brake, and the car rolled down the hill and came to rest on the curb. No one was injured but it gave my mother a fright!

When I was two, we moved to Melbourne in the south east of Australia, where my father had been offered a job. We had lots of aunties, uncles and cousins on my mother's side living there. We stayed with one aunt while our new house was being built. I remember sitting under the kitchen table while my mother ironed clothes. While living in Melbourne, my sister and I spent all our summer holidays at our paternal grandfather's cattle station (ranch) in outback Queensland

We moved back to Brisbane when I was 16 and I entered the University of Queensland as a student of Veterinary Medicine. Here, I was much closer to the station and went there often, becoming immersed in the raising of beef cattle.

After graduating as a veterinarian in 1969, I spent a year in mixed practice, mostly dogs, cats and race horses. Then in 1970 I had an opportunity to come to the USA and work in the pharmaceutical industry as a research veterinarian. I had intended to stay for two years but that morphed into three years and eventually to permanent residency. I worked first at Merck and then at Smith, Kline and French, which is now GlaxoSmithKline. It was here that I met my husband, Stokes Carrigan, and we were married in 1984.

Stokes brought me to Beach Haven where he had spent his summers and I was happy to be by the ocean, although not my beloved Pacific. I had been breeding and showing Arabian horses for some time, but soon found that horse shows and sailing races have the same season (summer) so I eventually gave away my horses and bought a boat for Stokes' birthday. We sailed together for many seasons at Little Egg Harbor Yacht Club and our children learned to sail there. While Stokes' family had a house on Ocean Street, we decided to buy our own house as a place to eventually retire with the hope that our children and grandchildren would come to stay in the summer. That has happened and I feel as though I am reliving an earlier phase of my life as I get little kids ready for regattas and tennis tournaments.

Through all this time, I have continued to go back to Australia in the northern winter, southern summer. Eventually, the cattle station was left to me and I spent about 15 years going there for up to 6 months a year. As Stokes became too infirm to travel long distances, I made the decision to sell all my cattle and a large part of my landholdings in Australia. I still own 15,000 acres of forestry country, which my former manager leases from me. It has no house so when I visit Australia now, I stay at a little beach town on the Pacific.

Being a lifelong Anglican, I quickly gravitated to Holy Innocents'. Stokes and I attended Holy Innocents' in the summer for a number of years. I spent a couple of years in a job in St. Louis and we bought a house not far from St. Timothy's in Creve Cour, Missouri. The rector there was Frank Crumbaugh, whom we got to know quite well.

We knew he and Gretchen would like to return to the East Coast. When we returned, we found Don Muller was leaving Holy Innocents'. We put Frank's name forward and the rest, as they say, is history. I have been singing in church choirs since childhood so of course I joined our choir here and consider it my second family. Not only do we make great music together but it also provides comic relief if I am ever feeling down!

Apart from choir, I found myself engaging in other activities at Holy Innocents'. I put my name up for vestry, and later was asked to be a reader and chalice bearer. I offered to help the altar guild clean silver and soon found myself a member of that group of ladies. Be careful what you volunteer for!

Now for some fun facts. The first picture below is a photo of me taken in our living room. I am wearing a tee shirt that has a picture of a castle on it. A few years ago, for Halloween, Mtr. Caroline+ asked the choir members to come dressed as our favorite hymn. Mine was "A Mighty Fortress is our God". In the same picture is a little green animal on the mantle piece. I helped my oldest grandson make his version of an Angry Bird and he left it for me.

Finally, the painting behind me in the photo is by my older sister, Robyn, of a scene on the cattle station. Robyn was a talented artist who died too young from ALS, or Lou Gehrig's disease. When I look at the painting, I am reminded of a beloved sister and a special place.

The second picture is of Stokes and me at the Little Egg Harbor Yacht Club.

The third picture is of me at Well Station, the cattle property which my grandfather bought in 1946. (It would be called a ranch in the U.S.) It was named for all of the hand dug wells on the property. They were fitted out with windmills and provided sub-artesian water for the cattle. The property is about 6 hours northwest of Brisbane.
