The Parson's Place

Self-Emptying and Awareness

I believe in the sanctity of all things. This means that I find holiness is possible in all creation. During this winter period, we often experience the shutting down of things, especially in nature. I've been enjoying the beauty of Beach Haven's winter and am often aware of the thinness of many things: the trees, the grasses, and the activities of wildlife during this season. To understand the fullness of things, it is always necessary to be with the scarcity of things. We have a baptism coming up and some of my wintry walks have brought forth ponderings of the richness of a full life in Christ and our responsibilities to provide times of security in a community of faith to allow for continuous strength and perseverance in times of scarcity and doubt.

Baptism is a call to holiness in our lives. In it, we accept the faith of the church. This includes understanding that it is a faith of continuous conversion and trust. This sacrament of initiation offers forgiveness and freedom from death as the ultimate horizon of life. The idea of removing this horizon and being washed with the refreshing and renewing element of water gives humanity the freedom of continuous and unlimited potential without the burden of original sin. Baptism also allows humanity the joy of knowing Christ. Through prayer, we have the privilege of connecting with the divine and thus renewing our relationship with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Through Baptism, we undergo a symbolic shift from chaos to order and move from being unclaimed to being claimed. This sacrament gives us a purpose and a dignity to our suffering and looks toward an eschatological horizon. Humanity experiences deaths in many ways, including addiction, loss of faith, and having expectations dashed. Letting go of things may also be considered a death. As Kenneth Leech in his book True Prayer suggests, self-emptying is necessary for spiritual progress. I find that in nature, I am closest to self-emptying. It has always been this way for me and even as a small child, I had an awareness of my smallness and uniqueness amidst the vastness of nature. Jesus, at his own Baptism by John the Baptist, did not separate himself from humanity but he aligned himself with us. This act, in tandem with the first Theophany, connects us with all creation. Therefore, all creation, all nature, is connected in a cyclic Godly renewal and recreation. It follows that all creation is in the sacrament of Baptism as it is built upon natural processes. This "grace" of Baptism, according to St. Thomas Aquinas, perfects nature.





Stewardship Update



STEWARDSHIP '21

To date, we have 59 pledging families for 2021. Of these, 51% of pledging families increased their pledge and another 5 are NEW pledgers. Our total pledge is \$153,003. While this is a decrease of 9.4% from last year (total pledge of \$168,872) due to circumstances beyond our control, our Finance Committee anticipated a decrease and has worked hard to adjust our annual budget. For perspective, 2019 had a pledge total of \$147,453 so we have surpassed this! With regard to current circumstances, this is great news for our 2021 pledge drive.

Lenten Prayer

Strawberry Nutella French Toast Roll-Ups

PREP TIME: 10 Mins

COOK TIME: 5 Mins

Ingredients

6 slices of fresh white sandwich bread (crusts removed)

1/2 punnet strawberries, diced small

4 1/2 tbsp. Nutella

1/4 cup caster sugar (superfine sugar) (Note 1)1 tbsp. butter

Egg Mixture

1 egg (large) 2 tbsp milk (full cream or low fat) Pinch of salt

Instructions

- 1. Combine egg mixture in a bowl with a flat base large enough to lie the roll up in. Whisk to combine.
- 2. Spread sugar out in a small dish.
- 3. Use a rolling pin to roll the bread flat. This makes them easier to roll up (and stay rolled up).
- 4. Spread each piece of bread with around 3/4 tbsp. of Nutella
- 5. Sprinkle strawberries along the bottom of each piece of bread.
- 6. Roll up bread. The Nutella will keep it sealed.
- 7. Melt butter in pan over medium heat.
- 8. Roll each roll up in the egg mixture, shake off excess then place in the pan. Repeat with remaining roll ups.
- 9. Cook for around 4 minutes until each side is golden, rotating every 1 minute or so.
- 10. Remove from pan and immediately place in the sugar. Roll to coat in sugar, then remove. Repeat with the remaining roll ups.
- 11. Serve immediately, while warm.

Notes:

- 1. You won't use all the sugar. But you need around 1/4 cup to ensure each roll up is evenly coated. You might be able to get away with less. If you sprinkle it on instead of rolling it, it won't stick as well.
- 2. Icing sugar (confectionary sugar) doesn't work, it just disappears instantly when it touches the roll up.
- 3. These are best eaten fresh. They tend to go soggy and because of the sugar, the bread "sweats" if left out.

Valentine's Punch (non-alcoholic)

Ingredients

- 2 cans frozen raspberry lemonade (use only 2/3 the amount of water)
- 2 liters lemon lime soda
- 1/2 gallon raspberry sherbet/sorbet

Raspberries for garnish

Instructions

- 1. In a large pitcher mix together raspberry lemonade, only using 2/3 the amount of water called for in the instructions.
- 2. Let raspberry lemonade and lemon lime soda chill before serving.
- 3. When ready to serve, add raspberry lemonade and lemon lime soda (equal parts) into a punch bowl.
- 4. Add scoops of sherbet/sorbet to punch bowl.
- 5. Garnish with raspberries. Serve.

Over the past 2 years, coyotes have immigrated to Barnegat Light, reproduced, and are dispersing across Long Beach Island. In this Science Saturday seminar, Rutgers University Ph.D. student, Chris Crosby, and Rutgers Wildlife Conservation and Management Program Coordinator, Kathleen Kerwin, will provide some history of eastern coyotes, a background in coyote ecology and behavior, and important guidance for avoiding negative human-coyote interactions.


