A Word from Father Peter

A community of faith, sharing the love of the Holy Spirit, seeking and serving Christ in his creation.

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

The month of October marks significant celebrations for our Jewish Sisters and Brothers at the Jewish Community Center. On October 1 they celebrate Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, on October 6 Sukkot, the week long Harvest festival is followed by Simchat Torah, the ending of the annual reading of the Torah Scroll and the Dancing with the Torah Scroll begins on October 15. The Jewish custom of reckoning the day begins from sunset to sunset rather than sunrise to sunset so these celebrations begin on the day before what we might consider the day of celebration. We have experienced with our Jewish Sisters and Brothers that they begin the celebration on the Sabbath on Friday after sunset even though they consider Saturday as the Sabbath.

Yom Kippur marks the Day of Atonement when devout Jews will spend most of the day in the synagogue with a fast, confession of sin, amendment not to commit that sin again and wearing white clothing. Yom Kippur comes ten days after Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, and together the two days are considered the High Holy Days of Judaism. When the Temple existed in Jerusalem, only on Yom Kippur would the High Priest enter into the Holy of Holies so while it remained a day of penitence it also celebrated the closeness of God with the people.

Sukkot celebrates a week long celebration of the harvest and the protection of God for the Jewish people after they left Egypt. The most distinctive part of Sukkot involves the sukkah, an outdoor structure with at least three walls and a roof of vegetative material such as bamboo, pine boughs or palm branches. During this week, devout Jews will eat all their meals in the Sukkah. During Sukkot, the Four Kinds are used in prayer. The Four Kinds include citron, a palm frond, three myrtle twigs and two willow twigs. The Four Kinds represent the various personalities that comprise the community of Israel, whose intrinsic unity we emphasize on Sukkot.

Simchat Torah marks the end of Sukkot along with the conclusion of the reading of the Torah with Deuteronomy and the beginning of the reading of Genesis, the start of the Torah. Perhaps the most demonstrative of the Jewish Feasts, the members of the community dance with all the Torah scrolls, removing them from the Ark and dancing with them either in the synagogue or even taking them outside the synagogue with dancing in the streets surrounding the gathering place.

For our Jewish Sisters and Brothers, the period from the High Holy Days until Simchat Torah mark the holiest time in the Jewish calendar. If you have Jewish friends or neighbors, ask them about their celebrations during this time. Blessed are You, Eternal One, Creator of the Universe, who has kept us alive and sustained us and enabled us to reach this time. *Peace, Fr. Peter*

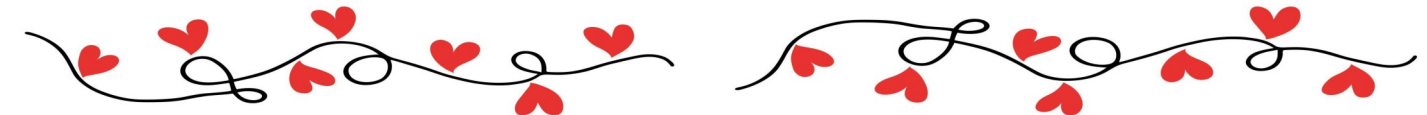
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DEACON JUDY KROM DAY!!

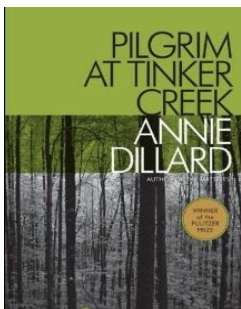

October Parishioner Spotlight ~ Hank Henninger

I was born in Teaneck, New Jersey, and raised in Montvale, in the same house my mother was born in. Growing up there, I even had three of the same teachers my mother had—one each in second, fourth, and eighth grade. I graduated from Pascack Hills High School in Montvale. I have an older sister, Janice, who now lives in Pennsylvania near her two daughters. Both of my parents have passed away.

When I was 14, I started working with my neighbor on his drag racing cars, which sparked my interest in mechanics. That led to working at his gas station, repairing cars. Over time, I worked at several different gas stations as a mechanic before I was drafted into the Army in 1972.

I served for two years as a fire control operator for the Hawk missile system, stationed at Fort Bliss in El Paso, Texas.

After the Army, I worked for a landscape contractor, where I repaired trucks and construction equipment, operated machinery, and ran job sites. In the late 1970s, I worked as a mechanic for several trucking companies. In 1981, I began working at Ruscon Truck Service as an emergency vehicle technician, rebuilding and repairing fire trucks. I spent over 41 years there as the head technician, servicing fire apparatus across New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Connecticut. In 2011, I was honored as the National Emergency Vehicle Technician of the Year. I'm still working part-time for two fire departments, repairing their vehicles. I still have customers call me for advice. The picture with a fire truck is of the first fire truck that I worked on in 1981. A collector now owns it.



I got married in 1979 and had two children with my first wife. We lived in Pearl River, New York. After 13 years, we divorced. I remarried in 1994 to a nurse who had one daughter. We made our home in Tappan, New York. Together, we had a son, and I helped raise her daughter, whom I later adopted. Sadly, my second wife passed away in January 2015, after an 18-year battle with breast cancer. We had been married for over 20 years.



In February 2021, I met another amazing woman, Patty August. We truly enjoy each other's company and have embraced each other's families. I'm a very lucky man to have found a wonderful woman to share my life with. Several pictures with Patty at the beach show our love for the ocean – and each other. *Continued on next page*



I have four children—Kira, Craig, Jamie, and Peter—and four grandchildren. My daughter Kira, 42, is a school psychologist in Massachusetts and was named School Psychologist of the Year for the state. She has 11-year-old twin boys. My son Craig, 39, works in Manhattan. Jamie, also 39, is a special education teacher at Rockland County BOCES in New York and is the mother of two boys, aged four and three. Peter, 30, is a physical education teacher at One School World in Rockland County and also coaches the varsity lacrosse team at Tappan Zee High School. The collage of my family shows not only who is in my family but also that we have fun together.

Over the years, I've coached my sons in soccer and baseball, served as a Cub Scout and Girl Scout leader, and have been a volunteer with the South Orangetown Ambulance Corps since 2003. I also volunteered with Computer Outreach, helping refurbish computers for children and families in need.

Auto racing has been a passion of mine since I was a teenager. I follow Formula 1, local dirt tracks, and NASCAR. In the 1970s, I helped friends at the track with their race cars, and by the late 1980s, I began racing myself in modified micro stock cars. I raced at Pinebrook Speedway in Pinebrook, NJ on Friday nights, plus several locations in PA. You earned points each week based on where you finished in each race. I consistently finished near the top every race. In 1989 I won the Modified Micro Stock Car Championship. I raced until 1994. I am in a picture showing my 2007 Mustang at a car show. I received a second place trophy for this in 2025.



Growing up in Northern New Jersey, we only visited Long Beach Island (LBI) a few times, since my family mostly went to Toms River where my uncle lived. I first drove to LBI in 1970 with friends for a day trip. In the 1980s, I visited LBI on weekends with family and friends. Starting in 1994, I began going with my second wife, who had been visiting LBI since she was 11 years old with a family friend. Each summer, we spent a week in Holgate, and by 2003, we extended it to two weeks. In 2019, the house in Holgate we had rented for a few years went up for sale. We made an offer—and it became ours. I love going to Barry's for food and ice cream, and sunsets are my favorite part of LBI. My favorite seasons are fall, winter, and spring. Sitting at the ocean is so peaceful.

When Patty and I started dating, I suggested we attend Holy Innocents' Episcopal Church, since my previous church, St. Paul's Episcopal in Montvale, had closed. We started going to Holy Innocents' in the fall of 2021. From the start, we were warmly welcomed by the congregation. We quickly felt at home and decided to continue worshipping there. Mother Caroline and the community provided incredible support to both of us, especially during the illness and passing of Patty's son. When Patty retires, we plan to spend more time at my home in LBI. I especially enjoy the music at Holy Innocents', although I am not a singer.
